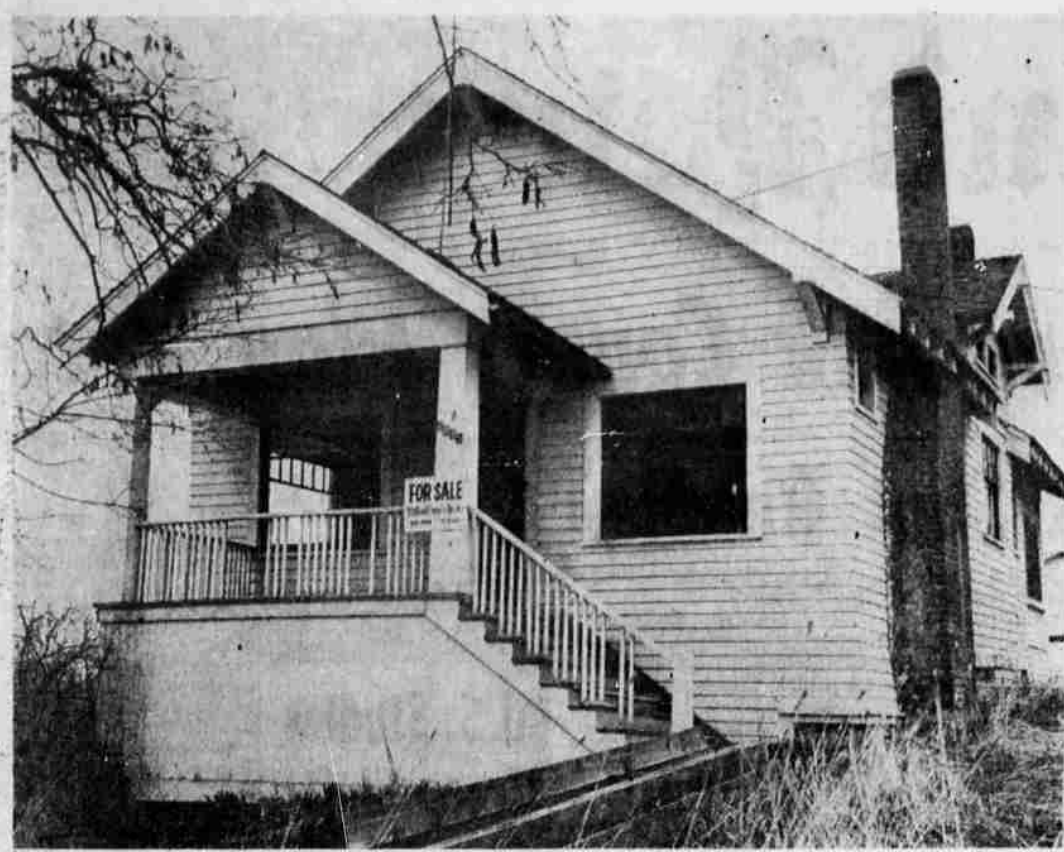




PARENTS SHARE RESPONSIBILITY — The parents of the youngsters who vandalized this vacant home at 2035 Auburn Street, undoubtedly share in the responsibility for the wanton damage, to the tune of about \$7,000. The house, which is the property of June Emerson, a resident of Utah, has been empty for some time and

has been subjected to damage from young vandals for many months. City police juvenile officer, Ray Howard, said about six months ago he apprehended two juveniles who had been hurling rocks through the windows. The home is being offered for sale by the Midland Empire Realty and was formerly assessed for about \$9,000 at the county assessor's office. Real estate agent Clem LeSueur indicated it would be difficult to get \$2,000 for the house now.

Adult Course Roll Reported

LAKEVIEW—A total of 63 adult students were registered for adult courses during the winter semester and 32 received their course completion certificates, according to Bob Elden, adult director.

The courses completed were farm art, welding, farm law, millinery, and Bishop II and III.

Plans are now being prepared to offer an upholstery course during the summer. No specific date has yet been set, but it will probably start the first or second week of June. 2nd Trick Tells Story

One thing a par contest teaches is that care and planning are essential to successful play as declarer. The following hand is another in the intercollegiate series.

If South gets to three no-trump he has no worries, but normal bidding will get him to four hearts and careless play will cost him that contract.

West opens the ten of clubs. East takes his ace and returns the queen and now it is up to South to take care. He must let the queen of clubs hold the trick.

Once he does this there is no way for East and West to beat the contract. The best defense is to lead another club. South will have to play his king. West will ruff and return a spade and South will go right up with dummy's ace. Then he draws trumps, ruffs a club to set up dummy's last club for discarding purposes and get rid of his last spade.

If South plays his king of clubs at trick two West will ruff and lead the spade as above, but now South will not be able to establish his discard in time and will lose a spade in addition to two clubs and a ruff.

While there is no trouble reaching game in spite of East's opening bid, note North's bid of two clubs. He has a very big hand and shows this by bidding the opponent's suit even though he has no high card in it.

Morse Raps Tongue Point Sale Offer

SALEM (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., says the General Services Administration (GSA) does not plan to sell the Tongue Point Naval Station to an Astoria group for slightly under \$1 million. Morse addressed some 300 Democrats Saturday night.

The Oregon Democrat said he was informed in a letter from the GSA that the agency now intends to put the abandoned \$14 million naval station on public sale about June 24.

Morse said he will continue to battle for a federal use for the property and buildings. He served notice that he will carry his fight to the floor by trying to attach riders to appropriations bills calling for new buildings where Tongue Point might be used instead.

He said the GSA told him that it felt it would be abusing its authority by selling Tongue Point to Astoria for \$920,000 since the city intends to relay it immediately to a private group.

Morse said he will try to postpone the June 24 date for public sale in order to "exhaust all possibilities for federal use."

In reply to some criticism, he said he has been active in the Tongue Point situation from the beginning.

Morse said "any time it is proposed to dispose of a \$14 million property for less than \$1 million, there exists the ingredients of a scandal."

House Retains Full Crew Rule

SALEM (UPI) — The House passed and sent to the governor Saturday bills strengthening the anti-pollution law and retaining the railroad full crew law.

They were about the first major pieces of legislation to go to the governor since the legislature's pay raise early in the session.

The action on a total of 26 bills came at the first Saturday session of the house. The Senate did not meet Saturday.

The pollution bill would make it possible for the State Sanitary Authority (SSA) to shut down promptly a flagrant polluter, without going through the present lengthy hearing procedures.

It also authorizes local units to contract with each other for anti-

pollution programs.

Rep. Richard Kennedy, D-Eugene, praised the bill but said he was disappointed it did not include new controls on agricultural burning.

Rep. Sidney Barrett, R-Grants Pass, said the bill sent to the governor would let the SSA take action to halt present dumping of sewage into the Rogue River.

The railroad full crew law, a total victory for the unions, whipped through 48-9 without debate.

It not only retains the law requiring six crewmen on long freight trains in Oregon, but also modernizes it by deleting its reference to "steam" trains.

The house sent several other bills to the governor.

One would permit the use of highway gas tax money to match federal money in repaying the expenses of persons who are displaced by new highways. Most of it would apply in the Portland area.

Another would let the state health officer shut down an unsanitary farm labor camp where the county officer can't or won't.

Another would exempt Japanese-Americans from taxation on the money they receive for damages caused by wartime relocation in this country.

The House passed and sent to the Senate a bill to let a junior high or high school student finish in the same school despite reorganization.

Timber, Brush Fires Claim High Toll In Lives, Homes

Timber and brush fires still flared across the eastern half of the nation today while weary foresters tallied a weekend toll high in human lives, homes and woodland.

Three persons were dead and more than 200 injured in the series of fires which swept tinder-dry forests and fields, factories and urban areas.

Marines, sailors, policemen, homeowners and students joined battle with fire-fighters and for-

esters against the ravaging flames.

"It's so extremely dry that the leaves are just like gunpowder," said one Virginia forester. "All it takes is a spark."

Rangers fought through the night to contain spectacular blazes in Virginia and West Virginia.

A fire in Morgan County, W.Va., raged out of control and swept eastward. Authorities said no communities were in immediate danger.

A blaze in Panther State Forest destroyed more than 1,000 acres of timber by today. A flaming ridge-to-ridge inferno near Welch, W.Va., was reported under control and another fire on the 7,000-acre forest property of the famed Greenbrier resort at White Sulphur Springs also was contained.

Shenandoah National Park in Virginia was declared on a fire emergency status while hundreds of volunteers, including soldiers, sailors and Marines, were aided by six airplanes in fighting about 250 fires throughout the state.

Foresters said some 10,000 acres of Virginia woodland were destroyed during the weekend.

Hundreds of persons were left homeless when flames raced through pine forests in three New Jersey counties. Fire officials reported 236,000 acres destroyed.

Two persons died fighting the towering flames 98 were injured and 245 homes were consumed.

Fire ravaged three factories and six homes at Bayonne, N.J., Saturday, injuring 27 firemen and

touching off violent explosions.

"It looks so bad, you'd think the bomb had been dropped," said a policeman who had been at the site of the fire for 15 hours.

A blaze in a natural gas well at Gray, Okla., stormed out of control for 24 hours, killed one workman and injured two others before being brought under control Sunday.

Some 118 forest and brush fires swept Massachusetts during the weekend. Firefighters battled 110 separate blazes in Kentucky and Gov. Bert Combs was asked to close to the public the state's easternmost forest areas.

One of the worst fires of the weekend swept a 10-mile square area of Staten Island, off lower Manhattan, Saturday. More than 100 homes and buildings were destroyed and much of the island's wild life died.

More than 70 per cent of New York City's fire-fighting equipment was called out to battle the Staten Island blaze, a fire in Brooklyn and flames which swept five buildings in Queens.

Gila Monster Observed By Klamath Traveler

Art Cole, Klamath Falls, is one of few travelers in recent years to see a gila monster alive outside a zoo. The animals are becoming increasingly rare.

He was 30 miles south of Kingman, Ariz., on Highway 93 when the two-foot long reptile started to cross the highway. He stopped and made preparations to capture it when a passing motorist ran over the colorful "monster."

Cole reported the shiny black skin had brilliant orange markings with a "beaded look."

The gila monster has no fangs like a snake but emits poison from lower back teeth. To kill its prey it rolls over on the back and chews the unlucky captive to poison it. It can strike a distance of only about six inches. The reptile eats bird and snake eggs and small rodents, moves slowly and lays from eight to 12 eggs in the sand which are hatched by the sun. Eggs are about one and one-half inches long.
