Three Persons Injured In Weekend Accidents

Three persons were injured and two cars received major damage in two crashes investigated by Klamath Falls police over the weekend.

Receiving treatment at Klamath Valley Hospital for cuts and bruises were Fred Jones Jr., 32, 432 Broad Street; Lavern Davis, 19, 1212 Adams Street, and Lester Tecumseh, 26.

Jones and Miss Davis were taken to Klamath Valley by Peace Ambulance. Tecumseh was taken to the hospital by the investigating patrolman.

Jones was cited for violating a basic rule after his car slammed into a light pole at 8:03 p.m. Saturday on South Sixth Street near Market Street. The car was demolished in the crash.

The driver was knocked unconscious when he was thrown from the vehicle upon impact with the pole, but apparently the extent of his injuries was not serious. Miss Davis, a passenger in the car, also suffered cuts and bruises.

The investigating patrolman said that Jones had been driving at a high rate of speed before the car slammed into the pole. Exactly what caused the accident was not determined.

In another crash Saturday a vehicle belonging to Lester Tecumseh, received major damage when it slammed into a parked truck owned by Wayne Croxel, Dorris, and then traveled another 134 feet and crashed into a house at 903 Owens Street, owned by Mrs. Ruby McCall.

Damage to the house and the parked truck was moderate, according to the police report.

The car, which was driven by Larry Herrera, address unknown, was traveling at such a high rate of speed that it tore the flat bed off the truck, which was parked on Owens Street near Darrow.

When police arrived at the scene there were no occupants in the wrecked car. Tecumseh was found wandering around the intersection and police arrested him for being drunk.

Herrera has not been located yet, Tecumseh told police he had been drinking too much so he let Herrera drive. He indicated Herrera had been drinking too.

Attack Kills AF Sergeant

Sgt. Lewis William Carson, 40, Kingsley Field, died about 6:15 a.m. Sunday, April 21, while on duty in the Fighter Operations Building, apparently following a heart attack. An autopsy is to be performed to determine cause of death.

The officer had served with the 400th Fighter Squadron at the air base for some time. His home was in Milwaukee, Wis.

Survivors include the widow Maxine Ann, daughters, April L., Melanie E. Karen F., a son, Lewis W. Jr., all of this city; father, Earle F. Carson, Los Angeles, Calif.; and mother, Mrs. Myrtle I. Wall, Chicago.

Burglar Hits Trailer Park, Robs Coin Boxes

Hatfield Calls Chances 'Moot' On Veep Effort

PHOENIX (UPI)—Western governors were warned today they must act to straighten out a "crazy quilt" of traffic laws or face federal "incursions" into the field.

The warning came from Robert Montgomery Jr., Washington, D.C., executive director for the National Committee on Uniform Traffic Laws and Ordinances before the opening session of the three-day 1963 Western Governors' Conference.

"Governors, individually and collectively, must assert more affirmative leadership in traffic safety efforts, particularly in the field of uniform traffic laws," Montgomery told the 11 state executives.

Gov. Grant Sawyer of Nevada, another opening day speaker, called for federal legislation to open federal land readily to take care of expanding urban and suburban areas and for private industrial and agricultural developments.

Politics Are Discussed

For the past two days, as the governors arrived at the conference site at nearby Scottsdale, they talked politics—particularly about the possible 1964 Republican presidential nominee.

Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield, a youthful Republican often mentioned as a vice presidential candidate, met newsmen Sunday to say that New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller would probably be the nominee—if the election were held now.

However, he said Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona was the "no 1 preference" of party leaders. He refused to dismiss the chances of Michigan Gov. George Romney and Pennsylvania Gov. William Scranton.

He called his chances of being "moot" but did not remove himself from contention. "I would give consideration to any invitation given by anyone to serve," he said.

More Hatfield Views

Hatfield characterized the Republican party's rank and file as "pretty much the middle of the road" and included himself in that political category.

He described former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, defeated last year in a bid for the California governorship, as "a man of influence" who should be encouraged to continue to speak out on issues of national importance.

On the subject of Nixon's call in Washington before the American Society of Managing Editors for unleashing the Cuban exiles, Hatfield said: "Such statements are necessary in order to focus attention on a very basic lack in our foreign policy. We have not had a grand design."

Cat Control Bill Passes

SALEM (UPI)—A bill authorizing local programs for control of stray cats was forwarded today to the governor's desk after the House agreed to Senate amendments.

Although the subject of some levity during its course through the legislature, the bill is meant to deal with a serious stray cat problem in some areas, such as Jackson County.

Counties say they now lack authority to conduct control programs.

The measure also clears up another point that has been clouded in present law. It makes cats personal property.

The bill contains a requirement that impounded cats must be held and given food and shelter for at least 10 days.

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
