# Isle Of Rhodes Greek Church Visited By Reed On Good Friday

Rhodes, Easter. No doubt like us you read in school about the Colossus of Rhodes, one of the seven wonders of the world. It was the huge statue of a man made of bronze that stood astraddle the entrance to the harbor. It was tall enough for ships of that day to pass between its legs. It was built in the first century A.D. and stood commanding the harbor for some 70 years until destroyed by an earthquake.

Some years later it was fished up by Pirates and sold to a Jew who packed it away on 300 camels, no one knows where. Today two tall pillars mark the spot, a bronze stag on top of one and a bronze camel on the other.

On Good Friday we took a trip to the small town of Lindos on the southeast end of the island. Our driver was one of those

Greeks who make you ashamed of your ignorance. He had gone to sea at 15, sailed around the world 29 times while learning to speak five foreign languages. Once he had crossed the United States by bus from New York to San Francisco to tranship.

At Lindos the tiny church was so crowded with worshippers that we could not go in to look at the icons and murals, so our driver took us to visit his friend, a Mr. Conrad, a most interesting old American who had lived in Lindos for six years. We called on him at his home which was full of pictures he painted and relics and other curios he has collected.

He told us that he settled in Lindos because it was so quiet and peaceful and the people were so friendly and that he had been

everywhere and seen everything and he was tired of roaming.

He had once been a landscape architect in Philadelphia and was now in his middle 70s. He had a young American couple living with him for a few days who had been seeing Rhodes on a motor scooter. He just happened to meet them, he said, and invited them to stay as he often did with young people who liked to have around.

He told us much about Greece as he had been all over and was very spry physically and mentally—a most interesting man.

In Lindos we had lunch at a small cafe overlooking a lovely little bay. High above us on the mountain we could see the ruins of another ancient acropolis but as our legs were wooden from climbing to such places and we did not care to ride a donkey that was available, we just sat for a change. Before lunch we went into the kitchen and picked out the fish we wished cooked for us. It was almost wiggling fresh and was excellent.

During the day we drove through many fig and orange groves. We shall never forget the Greek oranges. They are sweeter than even the best from California no doubt because they are tree ripened before being picked. Everywhere through the groves

ablaze, lighting the murals of the Bible history. In various places throughout the church there were huge candelabras where worshippers kept placing their lighted candles that they purchased on the way in. The church was packed solid with people, several thousand we are sure for it is very large.

For over an hour a mixed choir of very fine voices chanted wonderful music from the choir loft at one end above us, while from time to time there was the response of a fine male voice from the other end of the church. During this time the church dignitaries were performing various rights which we could not see as we were so far away. Then an archbishop, accompanied by a small boy carrying a tray with flower blossoms and a vial of holy water, walked up and down the aisles of the church, scattering holy water and flower petals over the congregation.

Then came the procession, lead by five archbishops in their magnificent robes, tall hats and
