Aluminum Price Hike Foreseen

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — The selective price increases in the steel industry "will psychologically be a plus factor in favor of better prices" in the aluminum industry, top officials of the Aluminum Co. of America hinted Thursday.

The subject of prices was brought up at the annual stockholders meeting and during a subsequent press conference.

"This cost-price squeeze remains the single most pressing problem facing the U.S. aluminum industry," said Alcoa Chairman Frank L. Magee.

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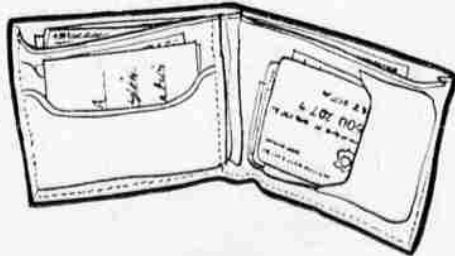
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
