LA Batting Slump Ends In Doubleheader Sweep

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The big batting slump appears over for the Los Angeles Dodgers who broke out with a deluge of 23 base hits while sweeping their first doubleheader of the season against the Houston Colts Sunday.

Hometown favorite Ron Fairly led the outburst with five hits in nine times at bat. In the second game he hit a two-run homer in the fourth inning and drove in the winning run with a single in the ninth.

Big Frank Howard hit safely in both games to run his hitting streak to 10 games and Bill Skowron, although he did not start either game, had three hits in five times at bat.

The Dodgers sent 10 men to the plate in the first inning of the first game and scored five runs on their way to a 11-3 victory. In the second contest, they had to come from behind for a 6-5 win.

Pitchers Praised

"You're liable to lose to anybody if you're in a slump," manager Walt Alston commented. "If you're hot, it doesn't matter if you're playing the top teams or not."

And the manager singled out several excellent pitching performances for praise, including Bob Miller's first victory in Dodger livery in the opener although he lasted only five innings and then was belted hard. In the second game Larry Sherry hurled 4-13, winnings of scoreless ball during which he gave up only one hit (and Ed Roebuck who worked the

Final Two Innings Got Credit for Win

Fairly, the center of attention after the lengthy doubleheader, modestly said, "A guy has to get lucky sometimes." He said he hit curve balls for both his homer and the game-winning single in the ninth.

US Athletes Drop Game, Head Field

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—United States athletes, although irked by a loss to Cuba in the baseball tournament, were occupying their accustomed front seat today in the Pan American Games.

The Yanks' baseball team, made up of collegians and service personnel, dropped a humiliating 13-1 decision to Cuba in an opening round game Sunday. The Cubans collected 15 hits, including a pair of home runs by Pedro Chavez, one of them a grand slam.

However, the U.S. still dominated the first full day of competition by winning three of the five gold medals decided, the Yank basketball team opened defense of its title with a 93-65 victory over Puerto Rico, and U.S. swimmers smashed four records in trial heats.

Wins Judo Medals

Ben Campbell of San Jose, Calif., and George Harris of Travis Air Force Base, Calif., won gold medals in judo, a sport new to the games this year. Campbell walked off with the open (unlimited weight) crown and Harris captured the heavyweight title.

Toshiyuki Seino, an Air Force serviceman from Los Angeles, gave the U.S. another first place in judo when he beat Jorge Yamashita of Brazil in the lightweight division. However, no gold medal was awarded in this event because Seino and Yamashita were the only entrants.

The Other U.S. Gold Medalist

Sunday was Isaac Berger of York, Pa., who broke his own games record in successfully defending the featherweight crown in weightlifting. Berger hoisted a total of 797.5 pounds, far exceeding his games mark of 723.5 set at Chicago in 1959.

Set Game Records

In swimming, Steve Clark of Los Altos, Calif., Charles Bittick of Long Beach, Calif., and Chet Jastrzemski of Toledo, Ohio, set games records and Ed Bartsch of Philadelphia broke a South American record.

Clark won his heat of the men's 100-meter freestyle in 54.7 seconds. Bittick clocked 1:03.3 in winning his heat of the 100-meter backstroke. Jastrzemski took his 200-meter breaststroke heat in 2:37.4, and Bartsch won his heat in the 100-meter backstroke in 1:03.7.

The Yanks also gained a good start in the tennis tournament. Albert Fox of Los Angeles whipped Robert Russell of Jamaica, 6-0, 6-1, in the men's singles while Darlene Hard of Los Angeles eliminated Mexico's Rosa Palafox, 6-2, 6-1, and Carole Caldwell of Santa Monica, Calif., downed Elena Subirats of Mexico, 6-3, 6-3, in the women's singles.

Hank Aguirre Has a One-Track Mind

"I have to prove to myself," says the Detroit Tiger southpaw, "that I'm not a one-year flash." Maybe the 31-year-old change-up specialist from Azusa, Calif., hasn't convinced himself of that yet, but he's starting to make a dent on the rest of the American League.

Aguirre enjoyed his greatest year in baseball last season when he turned in a 16-8 record for the Tigers and a 2.21 earned run average that stamped him the most effective pitcher in the circuit.

So far he has been even better this year.

His 5-3 victory over the Boston Red Sox Sunday was his third route-going triumph without a

Loss and his earned run average stands at a remarkable 1.40.

Aguirre, who struck out seven and gave up eight hits, held the Red Sox scoreless until the seventh when Bob Tillman nicked him for a two-run homer. The Tigers had clinched the victory before then, however, on Norm Caschis three-run homer off Bill Monbouquette in the fourth. The win snapped Detroit's three-game losing streak.

Indians, Orioles Split

The Cleveland Indians ended Baltimore's four-game winning streak with a 3-0 nightcap victory after the Orioles won the opener, 7-0. The New York Yankees shaded the Washington Senators, 7-6; the Los Angeles Angels downed the Kansas City A's, 6-2, and the Chicago White Sox beat the Minnesota Twins, 8-0, after losing the opener, 7-0.

In the National League, the New York Mets swept a twin-bill from the Milwaukee Braves, 8-5 and 9-2, and the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Houston Colts twice, 11-3 and 6-5. The Chicago Cubs defeated the San Francisco Giants, 4-1, but lost the nightcap, 3-2; the Philadelphia Phillies downed the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3, in 10 innings, then dropped the second game, 10-5, and the Cincinnati Reds overcame the Pittsburgh Pirates, 8-3. EUGENE (UPI)—Oregon could come up with some surprise points when it defends its NCAA championship in two months.

John Burns, a 21-year-old senior from Central Point, threw the javelin 230-1/2 Saturday for the Ducks' top performance as they defeated Brigham Young 36-49 in a dual meet.

The effort erased the Hayward Field and Oregon school records. Burns' previous best was 236-11 last season.

Mel Renfro and Dave Blunt each scored double wins for Oregon.

Renfro won the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.3 and the broad jump in 23-3/4. Blunt captured the 100-yard dash in 9.9 and the 220 in 22.3.

Keith Forman turned in another top performance by capturing the two-mile in 8:58.4.

Oregon will meet Washington State at Pullman next Saturday.

Oregon State defeated Washington State 92-53 and topped Idaho 119-20. The meet was not scored on a three-way basis.

Norm Hoffman won the mile in 4:08.9, Morgan Groth captured the 800-yard in 1:51.1 and Tom Wyatt took the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.3. Wyatt's time tied the OSU record.
