

County Track Meet Slated On Modoc Field Tonight

The County Track Meet, being put on by the Klamath Union High School and Pelican Booster Club, gets underway today on Modoc Field with preliminaries beginning at 3 p.m. and the finals slated tonight so that the townspeople will be able to see it.

Preliminaries in the shot put, discus, javelin, broad jump, 120-yard high hurdles, 100-yard dash, 440-yard dash, 100-yard high hurdles and 220-yard dash will be run off this afternoon beginning at 3 p.m.

Finals of the pole vault, shot put, javelin, high jump, broad jump and discus will begin at 6:30. Every school in the county has been invited to attend the meet and the field is hoped to be a big one. Each school is allowed to enter up to three competitors in each event and one relay team.

This meet is being run on an individual basis and no team points will be kept. One of its purposes, besides the promotion of track and field in this area, is to determine who are the best individuals in each event. Ribbons will be awarded the first five place winners in each event.

The Pelican thincled team is expected to have its share of individual winners, but also is expected to find some individual troubles along the way from some of the county schools.

Bonanza is one of the stronger schools in the county and Gilchrist is another strong club. Bonanza's Monty Burnett has by far the top time in the century with a clocking of 9.9. Tom Sanders of Henley has a good discus toss of 143.4.

Some of the top boys for the Pelicans tonight are expected to be Walt Smith in the javelin, Bill Mills in the shot and discus, the relay teams, Ron Thorne in the pole vault, Bob Scholl in the mile, Don Piper in the 800 and 440-yard runs, and Don Graham in the hurdles. Terry Eccles leads the Pelicans in the high jump and broad jump.

There also will be an added attraction. Some members of the Oregon Tech track team and members of the newly-formed Klamath Basin Athletic Association will take part in some open events. Norm Johns will put on an exhibition of the discus throw. Johns is expected to be among the leaders in that event in the Oregon Collegiate Conference this season.

There also will be some runners in a special 330-yard dash.

Cheney Stops Angels On Four Hitter, 4-1

Tom Cheney seldom is bothered for his autograph.

The kids generally pass him up because he doesn't look much like a ballplayer. He's balding and skinny and he's the type who studied veterinarian's medicine in college.

But he happens to be one whole of a pitcher and if you doubt it, just inquire around the American League.

The 28-year-old Washington Senator right-hander turned in his second straight superlative game in a row Monday night with a

four-hit, 4-1 victory over the Los Angeles Angels.

The only run off the soft-spoken 165-pound Georgian—who tossed a one-hit shutout in his only other previous start this season—was unearned.

No Earned Runs

His season record now stands at two victories, no losses, no earned runs and only five hits allowed in 18 innings.

Cheney, who throws a little bit of everything—knucklers, sliders, fastballs, curves and even an occasional screwball—achieved his greatest prominence last Sept. 12 when he set a major league record by striking out 21 batters during a 16-inning game with the Baltimore Orioles.

His record last year was a modest 7-9, but here's a tip to the kids:

Better start getting his autograph. He could turn out to be one of the league's finest pitchers this year.

Shortstop Eddie Brinkman's sixth inning error helped the Angels to their only run Monday night but the Senators had all their runs by then.

A's Beat Detroit

Chuck Hinton homered off loser Ken McBride in the first inning and the Senators came up with three more in the fourth when Brinkman singled two runs across and Chuck Cottier doubled for another.

Kansas City shaded Detroit, 6-5, in the only other AL game played. The scheduled game between the Cleveland Indians and Chicago White Sox was postponed because of cold weather.

Wayne Causey, installed at shortstop for the A's because Dick Howser was injured, made the most of it with a triple, a double and a pair of singles against the Tigers.

In the National League, the Philadelphia Phillies ended the New York Mets' four-game winning streak, 8-6; the Pittsburgh Pirates blanked the Chicago Cubs, 2-0; the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Houston Colts, 5-2; the Cincinnati Reds beat the San Francisco Giants, 7-4, and the Milwaukee Braves walloped the Los Angeles Dodgers, 10-2.

Ben Kerner Raps Territorial Draft

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Ben Kerner, owner of the St. Louis Hawks, took a swipe at the National Basketball Association (NBA) territorial draft rule, saying "This is the worst rule we have in effect and we should do everything possible to abolish it."

Kerner Monday night referred to the rule allowing a team to select a player on the first round draft who has attended a college or university within a 50-mile radius of the team's city with no other club having a crack at him.

Kerner said the rule was put in the books 17 years ago when the league was formed with the purpose of boosting attendance in the cities where a specific player "had built a reputation."

Kerner amplified the situation by showing that New York has 10 top-flight basketball schools in their territory. He said it was almost a certainty that they will take Barry Kramer of NYU as a territorial pick in the 1964 draft.

Kerner asked "what chance do clubs like Syracuse, Detroit and ours have when year in and year out, schools in these areas have some of the top collegiate players in the country?"

Strong Get Stronger

The Hawk boss said "This outdated rule defeats that purpose and it has allowed those clubs with collegiate cage powers in their territory to get stronger without giving the weaker teams a chance to get better."

Kerner pointed out the rule failed to help attendance in the two cities that used it the most in previous years.

"Minnesota had three territorial selections — Whitey Skoog, Dick Garmaker, and Vern Mike — and was forced to move to Los Angeles as attendance dipped," Kerner stated.

He pointed to Philadelphia's move to San Francisco despite the fact that four of their territorial choices — Paul Arizin, Wil Chamberlain, Tom Gola and Guy Rodgers — were top-rated All-Americans in college.

"We're in a situation now where three teams—Boston, Cincinnati and New York — have a preponderance of college basketball powerhouses in their immediate area and could get immeasurably stronger without going through the true nature and intent of our draft," he said.

Royals' Feeding Ground

Kerner referred to the University of Cincinnati as a "virtual feeding ground" for the Cincinnati Royals. He said the University of Cincinnati has won the NCAA title for two of the past three years and will be in contention next year, along with other Royal area clubs — Xavier and Dayton.

He pointed out the Boston area includes Holy Cross and Providence, and with Bob Cousy coaching Boston College next year, "that school is certain to become a basketball power."

Boosters Meet Wednesday

The Pelican Booster Club will hold its weekly meeting Wednesday night at the Broiler Restaurant, beginning at 6:30.

Coaches of the baseball, track and tennis teams will speak on their sports which, of late, have been having trouble getting into competition because of the weather. Coach Bill Mansfield, Coach Jack Peterson and Coach Gil Boyd will speak on their respective teams.

United States Grabs Five Gold Medals, More Expected

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—The United States, with five gold medals already won after only two days of competition in the fourth Pan-American Games, was expected to add four more today when its record-setting swimmers compete in their finals.

Yank swimmers broke three more records and tied another Monday in trial heats, making it a total of six records set in two days.

Thus, when Steve Clark of Los Angeles, Calif., Charles Bittick of Long Beach, Calif., and Kathy Bittick of Indianapolis, Ind., splash into the Pacemakers Olympic pool tonight, they will be favored to win their events and give the United States four more gold medals and perhaps even new records.

Clark, Bittick and Jastremski set records for the 100 meter freestyle, 100 meter backstroke and 200 meter breaststroke, respectively, in trial heats Sunday and Miss Ellis, who equalled the games record for the women's 100 meter freestyle Monday, has a better than even chance against Canada's Mary Stewart in the women's 100 meter butterfly.

The United States baseball team, humiliated by Cuba, 13-1, on Sunday, plays Venezuela today while the women's volleyball team takes on Mexico. Action also is scheduled in pistol shooting, fencing, tennis, yachting, equestrian, and cycling.

The United States picked up two gold medals Monday, when its men's shooting team scored a near perfect 2,349 out of a possible 2,500, and Anthony Garay of York, Pa., won the lightweight weight-lifting title with a total hoist of 847 pounds.

The Yanks won their first baseball game, beating Mexico, 5-3, but suffered a major jolt when Frank Froehling III of San Antonio, Tex., America's second ranking player, was upset by Juan Arrendondo of Mexico, 6-3, 8-6, 6-2.

However, swimmers Carl Robie of Drexel Hill, Pa., and Terry Lee Stuckles and Arthur Schollander, both of Santa Clara, Calif., came through with record-breaking performances to more than make up for Froehling's stunning upset. Roy Saari of El Segundo, Calif., and Roby Whipple of Los Altos, Calif., also came through with top-flight performances to make it another banner day for Uncle Sam's swimmers.

Fine Swim Show

Robie, Luiz Nicolao, the world record holder for the 100 meter butterfly, and Canada's Daniel Sherry put on a fine show in the men's 200-meter butterfly with Robie winning in the games record time of 2:14.5. That eclipsed the old record of 2:18.8 held by David Gilianders, another Yank. Nicolao finished in 2:17.4 and Sherry in 2:17.6.

Miss Stuckles won her heat in the women's 100 meter freestyle in the record time of 1:03.3. That beat the mark of 1:03.8 set by Christ Von Saltza and tied earlier Monday by Miss Ellis.

Schollander set the third record when he won the men's 400 meter freestyle in 4:29.4 to wipe out the old record of 4:31.4 held by George Breen. Both Miss Von Saltza and Breen are Americans.

Saari qualified for the men's 400-meter freestyle by winning his heat in 4:38.3 and Miss Whipple advanced to the women's 200-meter breaststroke final by winning her trial heat in 3:06.6.

Other Yank swimmers qualifying for finals were Fred Schmidt of the University of Indiana and Alice Driscoll of Louisville. Schmidt won his heat in the 200-meter butterfly in 2:16.7 and Miss Driscoll took her heat in the 200 meter breaststroke in 2:38.2.

U.S. Soccer Team Loses

The United States soccer team suffered its second straight defeat when it bowed to Argentina, 8-1, by the quarter of M-Sgt. Ed Cayle, Lt. Lonis Wigger, Sgt. Gary Anderson and M-Sgt. William Krilling came through to take the team title in small bore rifle shooting; Albert Axelrod of Scarsdale, N.Y., and Herbert Cohen of New York City finished second and third, respectively in fencing; the U.S. men's volleyball team scored a 3-0 win over Uruguay; the women's basketball team downed Chile, 72-44, and defending champion cyclist James Ross of Chicago qualified for Wednesday's semifinals in the 1,000 meter scratch race.
