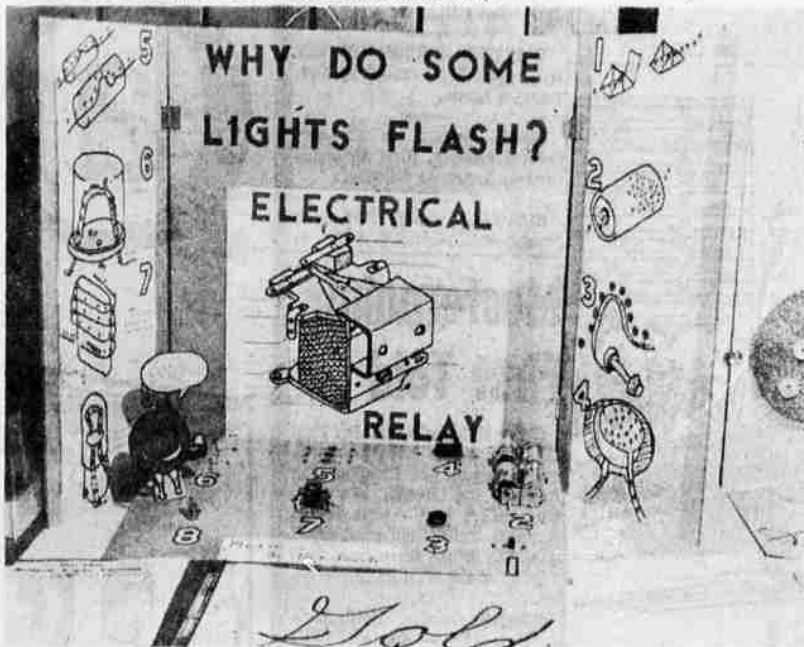
A discussion was held on the proposed budget for the new year and the new school system proposal of combining the city and county school systems. The general opinions expressed by members were against a one-unit system for the area.

Five Weekend Thefts Investigated

Five thefts, including the theft and recovery of a car owned by the Thomas Dodge Company, and a case of vandalism, were investigated by Klamath Falls police over the weekend.

A 1949 Chevrolet was taken from the Dodge Used Car Lot, South Sixth and Plum streets, Saturday night and found abandoned near Tulake Lake Sunday.

Alturas city police arrested Robert D. Medley, 18, and two companions, a juvenile boy and girl, for the theft. Medley told police the trio was traveling through Klamath Falls heading toward San Diego on the night of the theft.

He said he and his companions jumped into the car at the lot late Saturday night to get warm, but when they found the car's ignition could be turned on they decided to take the car and head south.

The trio got as far as Tulake Lake and ran out of gas. They then abandoned the car and hiked into Alturas where they were apprehended.

Gabriel Chabolla, 308 Broad Street, reported his car was seriously damaged by vandals Saturday night when they started smashing the vehicle with a heavy object. Chabolla told police the windshield and headlights were shattered and the antenna was torn off.

He said his car was parked on Klamath Avenue between South Seventh and Eighth streets.

Larry Cooper, Kingsley Field, reported that two tires and wheels valued at \$100 were stolen from his car while it was parked in the city parking lot at the air base Sunday at about 10 a.m.

City police indicated they have no suspects in the case.

The theft of a \$100 transistor radio from Montgomery Ward's was reported to police Friday afternoon.

Police said the radio was shoplifted from the store between 9:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. Store employees apparently can't remember anyone who was acting in a suspicious manner in the radio department during that time of day.

Police also investigated a report that a \$40 bicycle belonging to Steve Smith, 1336 Eldorado Avenue, was taken from the garage at his house sometime Sunday.

Patrolmen searched the neighborhood, but have not been able to locate the bike.

A \$30 ski jacket was reported stolen from a car owned by Quinn Millon, 2041 Homedale Road, at about 1:30 p.m. Friday. The vehicle was parked downtown at the time of the theft and apparently was left unlocked.

DA Awaits Autopsy Report In Death Of Beatty Woman

The district attorney's office late this morning was awaiting the results of an autopsy on the body of Mrs. Richard Biss, 37-year-old Beatty housewife, who was slain with a bullet fired from a small caliber firearm sometime last night. District Attorney Dale Crabtree has disclosed.

The body of the victim, a bullet through its head, was sitting upright in the rear of an automobile parked outside the Biss home when it was discovered by neighbors who came to visit the couple about midnight.

Richard Biss, husband of the victim, was asleep inside the house when the body of his wife was discovered. Biss told the district attorney that he had been in bed all day Monday recuperating from a severely infected foot and had last seen his wife alive Monday afternoon.

According to the district attorney's office, the body was found by a man named Cheb, who reported the homicide to Bill Walker, operator of a combination cafe and tavern in Beatty. Moments later, Walker telephoned Deputy Jack Hutton in Bly, who in turn summoned Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton. At 12:38 a.m. the sheriff, deputies, District Attorney Crabtree, and W. P. Kendall, Klamath County medical examiner, were en route to the scene of the shooting.

An examination of the body by Kendall indicated that the bullet which killed Mrs. Biss passed through the back of her head and exited through her cheek.

Meanwhile, sheriff's deputies were seeking to locate a number of suspects who were believed to have been engaged in a drinking party with the Bisses before the shooting, it was said.

Deputies are also seeking to find the murder weapon.

The district attorney did not indicate whether the victim was slain in the automobile or shot elsewhere and moved inside the automobile. Death apparently occurred instantaneously, he said.

Teacher Training Need Outlined At Tule Meet

TULELAKE—Dr. William McCann, Professor Teacher Training Dept., Chico State College, Chico, in addressing a capacity audience in the music room of the Tulelake Joint Union High School Monday night, stressed the need for "four years of sound, academic training, pointed toward higher training," for all teachers.

He spoke at the invitation of the Tulelake High School Parents Group, organized some months ago in the interest of improved student academic achievement and staff-superintendent-board relationships.

The meeting was presided over by Mrs. Kenneth Thomas, vice chairman of the Parents Group, in the absence of Chairman John S. Wynn, ill at home.

The speaker was introduced by Mrs. Burton Hoyte.

He spoke on the "terrific, growing teacher shortage, particularly in English, foreign languages, mathematics and science fields, where academic requirements are so high that many colleges are graduating teacher potentials into the better-paid industrial fields."

Mathematics teachers, he said, can start in the missile industry at double the salaries paid in the school room. Thirty large U.S. industries offer double and treble salaries of beginning math teachers.

As a result, larger school districts are prospecting in all parts of the U.S. for teachers, and salary structures are being increased in many states to meet the need to fill the school rooms with qualified teachers.

He pursued the principle of "merit pay" which he believed sound in principle but difficult to determine, and decided "merit pay in education" for which he found no excuse.

"Reduction of salary in the field of education," he said, "is not the answer to improved teaching capabilities or moral misbehavior."

He discussed annual pay raises, placement agencies, teacher qualifications, the Fisher Bill which will become law July 1, and its impact on the teaching profession, and other subjects pertinent to teachers, school boards and parents.

At the conclusion of his talk, a report on "Staff Relationships in the Tulelake Joint Union High School District, completed after a study by Erwin M. Howlett, California Teachers Association representative, was read aloud to the audience.

Plan Meet Scheduled

There will be an important regular meeting of the county planning commission tonight, April 23, at 7:30 in the council chamber of City Hall, Ken Blackman, planning consultant, announced.

Two large scale preliminary subdivision plans submitted by Klamath Falls Forest Estates will be reviewed at the meeting and there will be a period set aside for subdivision inquiries from interested ranchers, landowners and others.

There has been some concern voiced over the large subdivisions taking large sections of grazing land away from the ranchers and it is probable that the planning commissioners will discuss the adequacy of the county ordinance on subdivisions in regard to this concern.

One of the Forest Estates plans, an 11,500-acre tract on Bly Mountain, is divided into 1,100 lots with an average lot size of three acres.

The other plan is in the Sycan unit. The 7,920-acre tract is divided into 193 lots with an average lot size of 41 acres.

Also on the commission's agenda for Tuesday night will be a discussion of the Summary, Development Plan and the Commercial Area Study which has been approved by the city council.

Find Mass Graves

WARSAW, Poland (UPI)—Two mass graves of several thousand World War II Nazi victims have been found in Poland, the Polish news agency PAP said today.

PAP said both graves were found in forests near Lodz and that the victims probably had been Jews from Zadosz or the Lodz ghetto. They were believed to have been gassed in specially equipped trucks in 1942-43. An investigation was opened to determine the exact number of victims.

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Court May Drop Charge

Klamath County District Court was expected to drop the charges of assault with a dangerous weapon against Julia Ann Pruitt, 25, 804 North Second Street, in her preliminary hearing slated for 3:30 p.m. today, April 23, since subsequent investigation has disclosed new evidence in the case.

The matter will be turned over to the grand jury today.

Miss Pruitt was accused in the stabbing of James Tupper, 30, 1715 Oak Street, at about 3 a.m. Thursday at the residence of Lewis "Corkey" Gibbons, 205 West Oregon Avenue.

Tupper, who was released by the Klamath Valley Hospital Monday, stated that Miss Pruitt was not in the house at the time of the stabbing nor was she in the house any time that evening to the best of his knowledge.

Gibbons apparently was in the house at the time of the assault and he was charged with disorderly conduct and released on \$25 bail.

In a statement to city police, Miss Pruitt admitted stabbing Tupper, but after obtaining the victim's statement, police said it is apparent that the girl was "covering up" for someone else.
