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United States Team Runs Away With Pan American Games

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—The United States added six gold medals to its total Tuesday in the Pan American Games in what is beginning to shape up as a run-away for Uncle Sam's athletes.

The United States now has won 11 gold, 6 silver and 6 bronze medals since the games opened last Saturday. No other team has won more than one gold medal.

The six gold medals picked up Tuesday were awarded for U.S. victories in swimming and pistol shooting by Air Force Capt. Franklin Green.

Today's activity for the American forces is limited to a pair of basketball games against Canada, a baseball game with Brazil, cycling, weightlifting, tennis, wrestling and yachting.

The American baseball team nipped Venezuela, 5-4, in 11 innings Tuesday for its second straight win following a disastrous opening-game loss to Cuba, and U.S. girls led advances in tennis, diving, fencing and an equestrian event. However, local fans and observers still were buzzing today over the strength the United States has shown in swimming.

U.S. Sweeps Swimming

There were four finals contested in swimming Tuesday, and the U.S. took all of them — three in games record times.

Pelican Net Team Whips Cavemen

The Klamath Union Pelican tennis team remained unbeaten in league play at the Moore Park courts Tuesday when it defeated the Grants Pass tennis team, 6-1.

The Pelicans won all of the singles matches and lost a double bout. Larry Tice stopped Roger Ramsey in the top seeded spot, 6-1, 6-0. Tom Cole, the second seed, beat the Cavemen's Steve Swearingen, 6-0, 6-1. Terry Cole defeated Jim DeCourcy, 6-2, 6-3. Doug Stiles halted Dick Bishop, 6-3, 5-7, 6-2 and Allan Clark stopped John Bassford, 6-1, 7-5. In another single match which didn't count in points, Gary Vaughn beat Don Sprinkle, 6-3, 4-6, 6-4.

Larry Tice and Tom Cole teamed to down Steve Swearingen and Jim DeCourcy in the first doubles, 6-1, 6-4. Grants Pass won the second with Roger Ramsey and Bassford teaming to stop Terry Cole and Brad Finch. Another match which didn't count points found Hal Holman and Doug Stiles teaming for a win over Bishop and Sprinkle, 8-6.

The Pelicans will take on Medford today in Medford.

Chet Jastremski of Indianapolis, Ed Bartsch of the University of Michigan and Kathy Ellis, an Indianapolis high school student, were the record busters, while Steve Clark of Santa Clara, Calif., tied a fourth.

Jastremski, holder of all world breaststroke records for men, took the gold medal in the 200 meter event in the games record time of 2:35.4. Bartsch followed with a record-breaking 1:03.2 in the 100 meter backstroke and Miss Ellis made it a third record with a 1:07.6 clocking in the women's 100 meter butterfly. Clark took the 100 meter freestyle in 54.7.

Capt. Green showed the way earlier in the day when he won the 50-meter free pistol event with a score of 547 out of 600 and the U.S. captured the team event when S-Sgt. Allen Merx of San Antonio finished third with a score of 541.

Tri-City Belts Yakima, Salem Edges Eugene, 4-3

The U.S. is heavily favored to pick up two more gold medals in these events.

In fencing, Harriet King of New York, Janica-Lee Romary of

Woodland Hills, Calif., and Bonnie Linkmeyer of Sherman Oaks, Calif., advanced to the women's foil fencing quarterfinals, and Patricia Gavin of San Francisco nailed down at least a second place in the women's dressage equestrian event by reaching the final against Francisco Dalexandre of Argentina.

Tennis Disappointing
Thus far the U.S.' biggest disappointment has been in tennis where first Frank Froehling III of San Antonio was ousted from men's singles and then Allen Fox of Los Angeles bowed to top-seeded Carlos Fernandez of Bra-

zil, 6-2, 6-0, 3-6, 2-6, 6-4. The Yanks kept on gaining ground in wrestling Tuesday with Dan Brand and Jim Ferguson of San Francisco. Joe Fitzgerald of Ann Arbor, Mich., and Joe James of Stillwater, Okla., scoring victories.

The track and field events, which do not get underway until Saturday, are expected to be dominated by the Yanks about on a par with the swimming. Today is an off day in swimming but five more finals will be decided on Thursday, with only Canada given any sort of chance of breaking the U.S. grip.

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
