WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — Investors Research Co. says that despite the appearance of the popular market averages, "the stock market is not high."

The firm says the market is not high in relation to price peaks set in individual stocks during 1959-61 nor in relation to the level of earnings power likely to be attained during 1963 and 1964. Therefore, the firm concludes investors have a distinct advantage in income investing at this time "because they can also look forward to capital growth."

International Statistical Bureau Inc. sees a temporary pause in the market now that the averages are close to their 1961 highs. However, the bureau points out, "Such a pause would not imply that the year's highs have been seen." The firm believes the averages will surpass the 1961 peak but only by a small margin unless there is a greater gain than currently indicated.

Harvey Deutsch and Edward Gillard of Purcell, Graham & Co. look for the market to thrust into new high ground in the coming months, but believe that some correction or consolidation is needed to assure "a better footing for the assault." The two analysts believe public buying is creeping back into the market and although it has been confined mainly to the blue chips it could spill over into the secondary or more speculative issues.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stocks inched slightly higher today.

Ford dropped 1 while Chrysler picked up 1 1/2 in a mixed auto session. Rohm & Haas was a standout in a firm chemical section with a 2-point gain. Firestone added nearly 1 in the rubbers after reaching a tentative agreement on a new contract with the rubber workers.

read to the group, supporting the amendments. Langset is currently in Alaska on an assignment of the Post Office Department.

Sen. Clair Engle, California, defended his bill to stabilize the Klamath and Tule Lake wildlife refuges as being designed to end a "pointless controversy."

Testifying before the subcommittee, he said his bill would be a "concession" to agriculture. He added, "but it is a minor concession and a proper one," terminating it a "small price to obtain united support at last."

The other Senate bill, introduced by Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, California, differs from Engle's bill in providing for maintenance of Tule Lake water levels by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Engle said his bill would preserve four national wildlife refuges in the area, stop further homestead entry on the lands and maintain the Tule Lake water area at 13,000 acres.

He denied that his bill would give the Tule Lake Irrigation District "arbitrary control" over water levels on the lake. He said some opposition apparently was based on a 1959 incident in which the lake was pumped below "a reasonable level" before the Interior Department stepped in to maintain the level high enough to preserve nesting areas of ducks and geese.

He said the irrigation district had violated its contract, but that such "maladministration" had not occurred since and the person responsible was no longer with the district.

Engle urged government recognition of its contract with the irrigation district and said this would "not hurt the basic objective of preserving the habitat for migratory waterfowl using the Pacific flyway."

Man Jumps Into Path Of Bullets

A Klamath Falls man in satisfactory condition Wednesday at Klamath Valley Hospital after being shot twice by his wife with a .25 caliber pistol after he apparently jumped into the path of the bullets to protect a woman who was assumed to be the object of the assault.

The shooting occurred at The Office in the Broker Restaurant, Tuesday at 10:02 p.m., when according to witnesses Esther Bell Latches, 39, 2205 Patterson Street, came out of the restroom and started shooting at Phoebe Foster, 2212 Reclamation Avenue, who was standing at a booth talking to her ex-husband, Daily Latches, also of 2205 Patterson.

Latches, who jumped between the women when the shooting started, was hit in the forearm and upper abdomen as his wife, Esther, shot three times.

Mrs. Latches is being held in the city jail on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon.

When city patrolmen arrived at the scene they were met outside the restaurant by Miss Foster who told them Mrs. Latches had just attempted to shoot her, but that Latches jumped in the way and was shot instead.

According to police, Mr. and Mrs. Latches and William R. Gilroy, Anchor Hotel, were sitting at a table in The Office when Miss Foster came in and started talking to Latches.

Gilroy told police he and Mrs. Latches got up to leave the room at the same time. He said he was right behind Mrs. Latches as she came out of the restroom and started shooting.

Gilroy said before he could grab her arm and throw the gun aside three shots were fired. Police recovered the gun from Gilroy's pocket when they questioned him at his hotel room shortly after the shooting.

Arrest Made In Stabbing

City police arrested Lewis "Corky" Gibbons at his home, 205 West Oregon Avenue, Tuesday on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon in connection with the stabbing of James Tupper, 30, 1715 Oak Street, on April 19.

Charges against Julia Ann Pruitt, 25, 804 North Second Street, in connection with the same crime, were dismissed in district court Tuesday afternoon.

Subsequent investigation by the city police and the district attorney's office disclosed that Miss Pruitt was not present at the West Oregon Avenue residence at the time of the stabbing.

Miss Pruitt previously claimed that she had stabbed Tupper to protect herself from his improper advances.

Tupper, who was released by the Klamath Valley Hospital Monday, said that Gibbons stabbed him with a hunting knife after they had been sparring around at the house after a drinking bout at several local taverns. Both men had been amateur boxers in Utah before coming to Klamath Falls.

Tupper indicated he had knocked Gibbons to the floor twice in their friendly scuffle and that Gibbons said they'd better quit their sparring.

In describing the incidents that followed, Tupper told police Gibbons sat back in a chair glassy-eyed and immobile and as Tupper passed Gibbons to go into the kitchen Gibbons lunged out and stabbed him in the abdomen.

The victim was taken to the Klamath Valley Hospital after he ran out of the house and sought help at one of the houses in the neighborhood.

When Miss Pruitt "confessed" to the stabbing police charged Gibbons with disorderly conduct. Police later indicated it was apparent that the woman was "covering up" for Gibbons.

A preliminary hearing will be held at 10 a.m., April 29, in district court on the charge against Gibbons.

Officers Seek Identity Of Slayer

Officers of the sheriff's department and the district attorney's office were moving closer to the identity of the gun slayer of Mrs. Richard Biss, 37, of Beatty, today as the result of conversations they had yesterday with neighbors of the victim and her husband, deputy Lou Bogart said Wednesday.

The body of the victim, a bullet through its head, was sitting upright in the rear of an automobile, parked in front of the Biss home on Plante Road, when discovered by neighbors who came to visit the couple about midnight Monday.

Investigation by deputy Bogart and John Webber, special investigator for the district attorney, indicated yesterday that the shooting followed a three-week drinking party in which the Bisses and several others were participants.

Duties today were seeking to locate the people who had been present at the drinking bout and were attempting to uncover the murder weapon, believed to be a small caliber firearm.

While deputies Jim Conroy and Jack Hutton, both of Bly, were checking out leads, Bogart and Webber established that the shooting occurred inside the automobile. A spent bullet, with particles of Mrs. Biss's hair attached to it, was discovered on the rear seat next to the victim.

The sequence of events which occurred shortly before and after the body was discovered, as pieced together by Bogart from statements he received from neighbors of the victim, is as follows:

Sometime late Monday night, Mr. and Mrs. Thornton Baker, neighbors of the Bisses, called at the Biss home to obtain clothing for the children of Mrs. Mildred Chavez who were to stay overnight with the Baker family. Mrs. Biss, aunt of Mrs. Chavez, had been caring for the children.

When they arrived at the Biss dwelling they found Mrs. Chavez at the house and Richard, husband of the victim, in bed with an infected foot. Meanwhile, Mrs. Chavez's young daughter wandered outside and several moments later went back into the house.

"Mommie, Eunice is out in the car and doesn't look very good. She has blood on her," the girl said.

Mrs. Chavez rushed outside and seconds later returned screaming to the house, "Eunice is dead!"

About this time, Leroy "Bone Crusher" Godown, of Beatty, drove up to the Biss house in his automobile and learned of the slaying. He rushed to a local cafe and reported the incident to Bill Walker, operator of the establishment, who in turn contacted sheriff's deputies.

The district attorney's office reported Tuesday that one of three people was suspected of the shooting. The list of suspects apparently had been pared to two as of Wednesday morning.

Dr. J. Martin Adams, who performed the autopsy at Ward's Klamath Falls Funeral Home Tuesday, stated that the bullet struck Mrs. Biss on the right cheek and passed through her head, severing the neck cord. Death came instantaneously, he said.

Term Meted In Burglary

Robert Leon Chocktoot, 19, who received probation for two burglaries before being apprehended by police for committing another burglary the day that his probation went into effect, was sentenced by Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg to serve a term of not more than five years in the Oregon State Penitentiary, it developed in court Wednesday.

Chocktoot, who had been given probation for the burglary of two Klamath Falls business establishments earlier this year, pleaded guilty in circuit court Friday to burglarizing the dwelling of Erven Savario, 3339 Shasta Way, last Feb. 14.

He will be transferred to the penitentiary when the circuit court releases a commitment order to the sheriff, the sheriff's office reported.

All members of the party were hospitalized in the Battle Mountain Hospital following the one-car wreck caused by a back tire blow out. Mrs. Cofer, who was driving at the time, remained in the car. The others were thrown out as the car rolled over twice.

The family was en route to Oklahoma to be present for honors to be extended to Backes' 90-year-old mother who was to ride in a parade with Oklahoma's governor, Henry Bellmon.
