

Bonanza's Burnett Shines In County Track Meet

The first annual Klamath County Track Meet, sponsored by the Pelican Booster Club, was a big success time-wise at Modoc Field Tuesday night despite clear, but cold, weather.

The meet was highlighted by the outstanding performance of Bonanza's fine Monte Burnett.

who won the 100-yard dash, the 440-yard dash and finished third in the 880-yard relay with his teammates. He was clocked in 10.2 in winning the 100 and a good 51.8 in coping the gruelling 440-yard scamp.

His, however, wasn't the only lights shining. Walt Smith and Bill Mills, both weightmen of

Klamath Union, set new school records in their specialties. Smith unleashed the best javelin toss in the state thus far this season with a brilliant heave of 208 feet 6 1/2 inches for a new school record.

Mills set a new school record in the shot put by heaving the iron ball 50 feet 8 1/4 inches. Mills

also was a double winner. He took the discus throw with a toss of 140-4.

Klamath Union and Bonanza athletes dominated the meet. There were no team scores kept. It was strictly an individual meet with the top five finishers in each event getting a ribbon.

The times were almost as brisk as the weather, some exceptionally good for running in such cold weather. Burnett's time in the 100-yard dash was one of the best of the night. Kim Hale of Chiloquin surprised for second place and beat out KU's Gerritt

DeGroot for that spot. John English copped the 180-yard low hurdles in the time of 22.7. The 220-yard dash was captured by another Bonanza runner. The Antlers' Robert Rice won the event in a strong clocking of 22.2 with KU's Arie DeGroot second and Grover Dahn of KU third.

The pole vault finished in a five-way tie. All five of the finalists went out at the 11-9 mark. Bud Lummus, a sophomore, was judged first on fewer misses.

Brent Hicks and Les Thurman were tied for second and third and Ray Thorne was fourth.

The high jump probably was the biggest surprise of the night. A freshman, Kurt Peterstetter, outdistanced his KU teammates to win the high jump at 5-8 1/4. Steve Baker was second, Dick Scott, third, Fred Kelley fourth and Henley's Earl Albritton fifth.

Dahn took the broad jump with a 19-3 leap in the closest field event of the day. Teammate Terry Eccles was second with a jump of 19-2 1/4. He was ahead of third place Wilcox of Henley who jumped 19-2 1/4.

Mills captured the discus and Henley's Tom Sanders was second and Sherm Kalina of Malin third.

Don Graham took the 120-yard high hurdles in the relatively slow time of 16 flat. He has a clocking of 13.4 in the event. Fred Kelley was second, Bonanza's Ricky Steber third and Maxwell of Henley fourth. Ted Rober of Merrill was fifth.

The open 300-yard dash, run by five members of the Klamath Basin Athletic Association, was won by Willie Anderson in the fine time of 35.8. Ed Cecil was second in 36 flat. Then came John Maricich, Bob Bryant and Wayne Dennis.

KU Pelicans Club Cavemen In Twin-Bill, 6-3, 4-3

The Klamath Union Pelicans made a stronger bid toward the lead of the Southern Oregon Conference baseball race at Gem Stadium Tuesday afternoon with a doubleheader win over the Grants Pass Cavemen in a re-

scheduled set of games which was to have been played April 9. The Pelicans, behind the fine pitching of Gary Benson, won the first game, 6-3, despite a last inning spurt by the Cavemen. The second game was tighter with Rich Jackson going the distance

to win it, 4-3, thanks to a fine play by catcher, Vern Petrick. The White Birds had the initial game in hand virtually all the way. They tallied in their half of the first inning when Larry Guyer reached first on an error and took second on the over-

throw. Larry Smith lined out to centerfield and Mike Kitching singled Guyer home.

Smith started the rally in the third with two outs when he surprised the Cavemen by laying down a bunt and beating it out. He tallied when Kitching golfed a double to left center for the second run.

Coach Bill Mansfield's club tallied two more in the fourth when John Parisotto led off with a base on an error. Larry Binney singled to center and Dave Johnson got a bunt single to load the sacks. Rick Horn lifted a fly to right and Parisotto scored after the catch. Benson lifted a long fly to center and Binney scored easily after the catch.

The final two Pelican runs came in the sixth. Binney walked, stole second, took third on a fielder's choice by sliding under a tag, and pulled off a double steal with Johnson for the run. Johnson was tagged out at third and Horn, who had reached first on a fielder's choice, scored on Benson's double to left center.

The Cavemen rallied in the seventh and it looked bad for the Pelicans. They began to hit the tiring Benson. After two were out Pete Hardin singled to center. Jim Morrow had a bunt single and Lyman Kelsacker doubled to score both runs. He scored on a single by Rich Wolney for the third run. Benson had given up only one hit going into the seventh frame. Jackson came on in relief and threw one pitch to get the side out and halt the threat.

The second game was a scorcher, too. The Pelicans scored twice in the first frame again. Guyer led off the game with a triple and Smith singled him home with the first run. He scored on a single by John Gray. The winning runs came in the second when Marvin Yunk single, was sacrificed to second by Jackson, Petrick walked and Guyer doubled them both in.

The Cavemen had a rally going in the fourth inning with two runs across and two out when a throw into Petrick to cut down the tying run was high. Petrick, in front of the plate, had to jump to catch the ball. He did so and was practically nailed to the cross while in the air. But he held onto the ball, tagged the runner and saved the tying run with another runner still on second.

The Pelicans will take on Ashland in a doubleheader in Ashland Saturday. They are now 5-1 in league play.

Don Carter, Smith Will Roll Today

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI) — Two St. Louis pros—Don Carter and Harry Smith—meet today in a match that will hand one of them his first defeat in the American Bowling Congress masters tournament.

The two emerged Tuesday night as the only survivors of the winners' bracket as the double elimination matches ground into the semifinals. The winner of their match will face the losers bracket survivor tonight to determine the masters champion.

Carter put on a show Tuesday night as he racked up a four-game 1017 to give him his fifth straight victory. He was like a machine against Bobby Meadows of Dallas, who managed a respectable 793. Carter's total was the third of his career over 1,000. He holds the four-game record of 1004.

Smith earned his fifth straight success against Jim Stefanchik of Joliet, Ill., Tuesday night, 929 to 729.

In late action Pete Tomantas of Calumet City, Ill., eliminated Billy Welu of St. Louis, 822 to 792, while Bill Lillard of Dallas cut Joe Joseph of Detroit, 904 to 856.

Earlier, Bus Oskay of Fort Wayne, Ind., eliminated defending champion Billy Golembewski of Detroit, 816 to 795, before falling to Lillard, 798-776.

San Francisco Drops Buckaroos

It's the San Francisco Seals and Seattle Totems in the finals of the Western Hockey League playoffs.

Rookie goalie Jimmy McLeod was the hero Tuesday night as the Seals fought their way into the finals with a 3-1 decision over Portland before a disappointed crowd of 10,548 at the Glass Palace.

McLeod was under fire all night and turned in 41 saves with only Tommy Mcvie sneaking one past him. McLeod was toughest when it counted. He made 18 saves in the second period—many of them when Len Haley was in the penalty box on a five-minute major penalty.

He had 12 saves in the first period and 11 in the third.

The Seals hit a goal in each stanza, Oran Kurtenbach, Danny Belisle, and Nick Mickoski tallied the Seals goals with Belisle, hero of the whole playoff battle against Portland, hitting the key go-ahead tally.

Haley was given the major penalty for slashing defenseman Jack Bionda of the Bucks on the head with his stick in the closing seconds of the period. Bionda suffered a four-stitch wound.

Portland goalie Don Head also was impressive with 34 saves, 15 in the final period.

Seattle, which like San Francisco finished second in its division in regular season play, bumped Vancouver 8-2 Monday in their seventh game to win the Northern Division.

Miss Wright After Golf Title Again

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—Mickey Wright will try for her third straight victory when the 24th women's Titleholders' championship begins at the Augusta Country Club Thursday.

The Titleholders is the ladies' version of the Masters.

Miss Wright, who plays out of Dallas, Tex., won the tournament in 1961 and 1962. If she wins this year she will be the first to make it three straight since Patty Berg (1937 through 1939).

The durable Patty, 20 years older than most of the other entries, will be back this year and is considered a serious threat. All told, she has won seven championships.

Nevertheless, Miss Wright is the favorite, having won two tournaments this year — the Sea Island Invitational and the St. Petersburg Open.

Another favorite here through the years is Betsy Rawls of Spartanburg, S.C., winner of the Sunshine Open.

But this tournament is to Betsy what the U.S. Open is to Sam Snead. She always manages to share part of the lead and usually finishes high but she has never won the tournament.

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
