In as much as this visitation should represent an ideal school situation, parents are asked to bring their children promptly at 12:15 and leave them in care of the first grade teacher. While the children are visiting in the first grade rooms, the parents are to meet in the gym for a discussion and pupil registration period.

Parents are reminded to bring their children's birth certificates with them. The state law requires a child to be six years of age on or before Nov. 15 of the school year to be eligible to start school.

## Lost Forest Seen Part Of State Park Program

FORT ROCK—A visit April 18 to Oregon's "Lost Forest" by state and federal park planners was a step toward possible designation of the federally-owned tract as one of the state's recreational spots.

Initial steps toward the preservation of approximately 37,000 acres, which include the isolated ponderosa pine forest, shifting sand dunes which lie adjacent, and Fossil Lake, was made last year by the Harney Chapter of the Isaac Walton League. The group directed its plea to Sen. Wayne Morse, and through the Department of the Interior, he requested that a study be made.

The Christmas Valley development is a part of the privately owned land surrounding the proposed recreational area. Cattle from nearby Viewpoint Ranch graze the region seasonally.

Victor Ecklund of Portland, park planner with the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Department of Interior, is coordinator for the consideration of whether state or federal administration would be feasible. A chief concern, the party on the trek agreed, would be to provide good access. Two four-wheel drive vehicles easily traversed roads covered with a fresh light snowfall, but puddles hid rough spots on the return trip.

The pine forest, which covers some 9,000 acres, is located 18 air miles from Christmas Valley Lodge and 17 air miles from Highway 20, opposite Stauffer. The latter area has almost no population while Christmas Valley has a potential local settlement.

Concern was felt that grazing should be retained on this large area as it is a resource that affects the local economy. Many wilderness areas eliminate all uses.

## Board Eyes Efficiency

DUNSMUIR—The Dunsmuir Elementary School board approved three measures to step up efficient use of school funds at its April meeting.

The school telephone system will be modified to eliminate several trunk lines and establish a cordless switchboard in the school office. This will cut the monthly basic phone bill about 47 percent, and installation costs will be offset by the lowered bills in the first two months of service, the board estimated.

Assistant custodial work will be put on a work schedule basis, with part-time help on an hourly basis eliminated. This will save the school an estimated \$1,200 next year.

School first aid supplies will be bought in quantity on contract, and joint buying in bulk with the high school will be sought to further reduce costs.

Albert Kempton, school superintendent, reported first aid supplies sufficient for three to five years will cost \$169 if bought jointly with the high school as compared with \$90 in incidental purchases for the first seven months of this school year.

Reflooring the kindergarten room with asphalt tile at a cost of \$321 was also approved by the board.

## Oregon Drivers Rate Selves Up

Driver confidence runs high in Oregon.

The Department of Motor Vehicles Traffic Safety Division, which recently polled Oregonians on traffic safety attitudes, says that only 115 of the 10,305 people it polled rated themselves as "below average" in driving ability.

On the other hand, 3,025 said they considered themselves "above average" in driving ability and 6,679 considered themselves "average" drivers.

Safety officials said the results remind them of the oft-repeated statement that almost everyone believes safety appeals are aimed at the "other guy."

except recreation. It was assumed that continued BLM administration would safeguard other land uses. The "Lost Forest" was partially logged under BLM supervision around 1949.

Paul Arrasmith of Portland, recreation specialist with the Bureau of Land Management; Dick McCosh, Oregon State Park Commission, Salem, and Clifton Lemons, Portland office of the Oregon Game Commission, were among the conferring group. Henry Greer of Burns represented the Isaac Walton League.

Lakeview BLM personnel, more familiar with the region, were George Lea and Tom O'Kelly. They were accompanied by Harold Baughman of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Kenyon Morehouse, who has studied the area since moving here in 1960, lives near the dry Christmas Lake and is familiar with surrounding countryside. She led the party to a prominent rock outcropping which permits a panoramic view of the region.

Adding interest to the group was Ken McLeod of Klamath Falls, who has studied the region since 1936 from an ecological standpoint. His statements are borne out by a recently published thesis by Dick Berry, now assistant professor of forestry at the University of Arizona, Flagstaff.

In his study of plant and animal life and their relationship to environment, he conducted that the sands encroaching in the forest area hold the moisture and are responsible for allowing the forest to maintain itself where precipitation is sub-marginal for the ponderosa pine.

The travelers Thursday convened at Christmas Valley Lodge where Edwin Cater, member of the staff, hosted the group and assisted with the tour in the absence of project manager, Warren Morton.

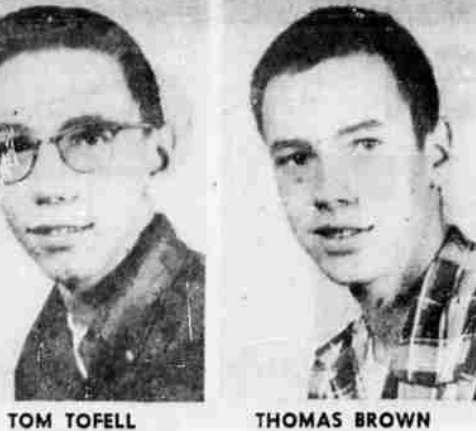
The accident occurred at 8:40 p.m. Witnesses described Miss Ramer's vehicle to investigating patrolmen and the girl was picked up a short time later.
