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Tired Owls Use Five Pitchers

The Oregon Tech Owls, still smarting from a double loss incurred Tuesday at the hands of powerful Southern Oregon, were flat and tired Wednesday in dropping a 9-2 decision to a good College of Siskiyou team of Weed, Calif.

The Owls had no pitching left and the ones who did throw had pitched the day before. Coach Jim Partlow finished up the game by using five players on the mound, only two of which are listed as pitchers.

But it wasn't the pitching that hurt the Owls so much as it was the lack of hitting on their own part. The Mile High team could manage only four hits off a pair of Eagle hurlers and two of those came off the bat of first baseman Ed Appelman.

Fielding-wise, it was an excellent game. The Owls had one of their finest games of the season in the field in making no errors. The Eagles committed only one miscue and there were a few good fielding plays.

The Eagles opened right up off starter Marv Edwards. He struck out the first man but catcher Roger Pauletto poked Edwards' second pitch over the leftfield fence for a solo home run and the first tally. The Owls were able to get only one baserunner in the first two innings off the offerings of Jiggs Sage, the winning hurler.

The Eagles scored two more runs in the second to add to their total. Ken Moore got the

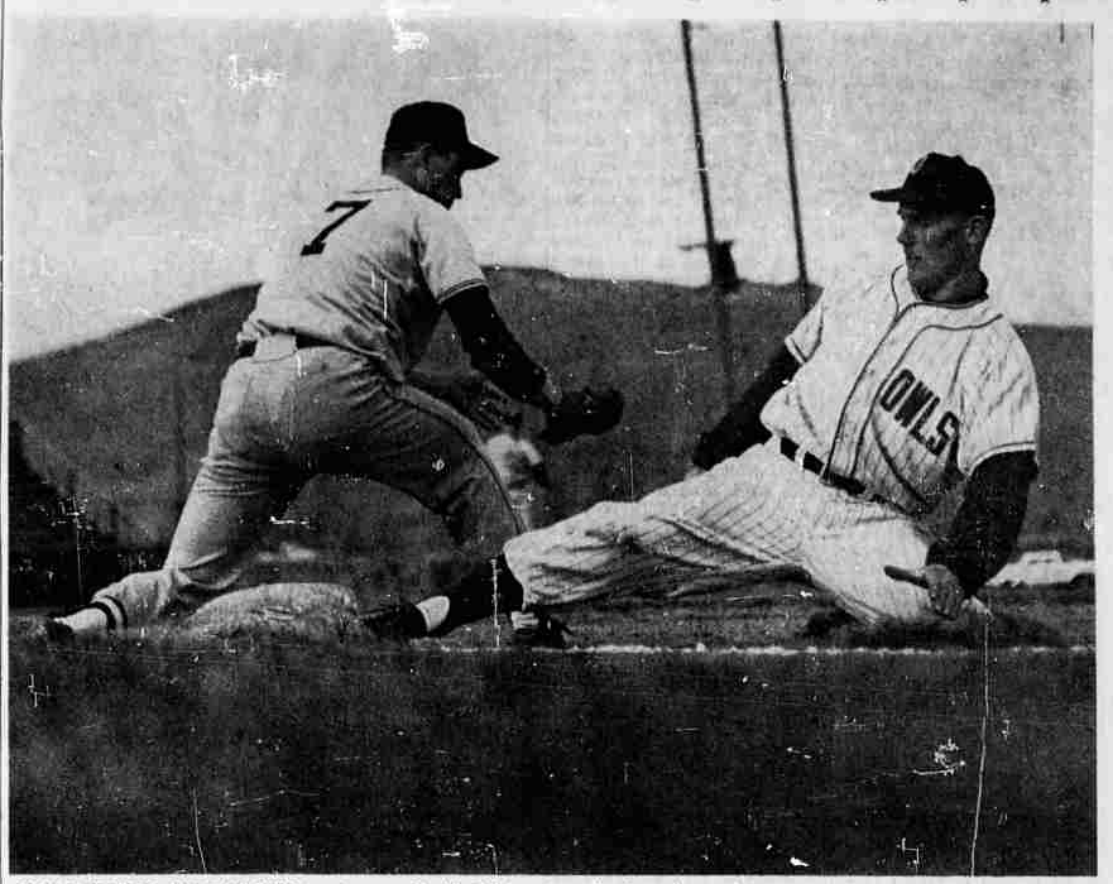
first of his four singles to lead off the frame and went to third on Bob Laustalot's single. Laustalot stole second and Gary Allen scored them both with a single.

Siskiyou chalked up another run in the third when Moore walked, moved to third on two infield plays and scored when relief pitcher Louis Hunter balked. The Owls rallied slightly in their half of the third with a tally when Appelman led off with a double down the rightfield line. He scored on Edwards' single. The fourth inning found the Owls' three batters standing and watching third strikes whip past them.

COS got another pair of runs in the fifth frame. Laustalot reached first on a fielder's choice with one out and Ed Fischer, Eagle third sacker, slammed a Hunter pitch far over the leftfield barrier for a two-run poke.

Two more runs were added in the sixth on a walk, stolen base, a triple by Doug DeBortoli to score one run and he scored on a single by Moore.

The Owls retaliated with a run in their half. Don Gresdel walked, took second on a passed ball, third on an error and scored on a passed ball. That was all the Owls' scoring. The Eagles tallied one more run in the eighth when Elvy Mazzoni tripled and raced home on a passed ball.

Balks Touch Off Riot In Cincy-Dodger Game

A widely-used four-letter word touched off the biggest hubbub of the baseball season so far.

The word was "balk" and it not only caused Cincinnati pitcher Jim Owens to blow his top but also produced probably the most violent demonstration ever at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles.

Owens hit the ceiling when three balks were called on him during the second inning of Wednesday night's game in which the Dodgers blanked the Reds 7-0.

The Cincinnati right-hander was so incensed and argued so violently that he was ejected from the game, but that was merely a prelude of what was to come.

As the umpiring team headed by Augie Donatelli summoned another pitcher from the bullpen, the angry Reds threw helmets and towels on the field until Donatelli emptied the Cincinnati bench. He told manager Fred Hutchinson he could bring in Cincy players from the clubhouse as needed.

Reliever John Tsitouris, taking his good sweet time, warmed up 10 minutes. All told, the game was delayed nearly 20 minutes while the 19,000 fans howled, partly in sympathy with the Reds, partly against them and mostly against the umpires, who called a total of five balks in the game.

Breaks National Record
Owens' three balks in one inning broke the National League record and all but overshadowed a fine three-hit performance by Dodger southpaw Johnny Podres, who had one balk called against him also.

With all the furor over the balks, three Dodger homers off Tsitouris were somewhat anticlimactic. John Roseboro connected in the fourth, Ron Fairly belted a two-run homer in the fifth and Frank Howard also hit one in the same frame.

In less violent NL games the Milwaukee Braves beat the Houston Colts 4-3, the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 6-4, the St. Louis Cardinals took over first place with a 4-3 win over the San Francisco Giants, and the New York Mets blanked the Chicago Cubs 2-0.

Kansas City's surprising A's climbed into first place in the American League with a 5-0 victory over Baltimore, the Detroit Tigers downed the Los Angeles Angels 4-3 in 15 innings, Cleveland shut out Boston 2-0, Minnesota defeated Washington 6-4, and Chicago hung one on New York 6-4 in 12 innings.

Spahn Wins Third
Warren Spahn won his third game of the season and 330th of his major league career with a seven-hitter over the Colts, who suffered their fifth straight setback. Eddie Mathews and Mack

Jones hit homers off loser Dick Farrell.

Roberto Clemente's two-run double broke a seventh inning tie between the Pirates and Phillies and helped Bob Friend to his third victory. Bob Bailey's three-run homer off loser Chris Short put the Pirates ahead 4-2 in the fourth and Wes Covington's two-run homer tied the score in the fifth.

Dick Groat's two-run double ignited a four-run sixth inning rally that beat the Giants and gave their Cardinals their fourth win in a row. Southpaw Curt Simmons gained his third victory with a nine-hitter while Billy Pierce was charged with his second loss.

Carlton Willey pitched the Mets to their first shutout of the season with a three-hitter over the Cubs. Rookie second baseman Ron Hunt hit his first major league homer off loser Bob Buhl.

Las Vegas Gets Title Fight

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Nevada gets its first heavyweight title fight in 53 years on June 27 when champion Sonny Liston and ex-champ Floyd Patterson meet in a return match at the Las Vegas Convention Center.

Their scheduled 15-round bout was announced Wednesday night by promoter Al Bolan of Championship Sports, Inc., after approval by the Nevada State Athletic Commission.
