Commissioner Ford Frick Enters Fast-Growing Balk Controversy

NEW YORK (UPI) — Commissioner Ford Frick entered the growing controversy over the balk rule for the first time today and indicated it will be revised shortly following the latest flare-up—most explosive one yet—in Los Angeles.

"We have a major league executive council meeting scheduled shortly and the rule will be discussed," Frick said after National League President Warren Giles told him that he had indicated he would move to ease the balk rule.

Something obviously has to be done, and quickly, too, or there

could be a repetition of the angry demonstration which took place Wednesday night in Los Angeles. The game between the Cincinnati Reds and Los Angeles Dodgers was delayed 18 minutes by a violent argument over three balks called on Cincinnati pitcher Jim Owens in the second inning.

Protest Brings Ejection One balk had been called on Dodger pitcher Johnny Podres earlier and after the umpiring team of Augie Donatelli called three more on Owens, the Cincinnati pitcher objected so heatedly he was ejected from the game.

The Reds showed their displeasure by hurling helmets and towels onto the field. Donatelli, steaming himself by then, banished the entire Cincinnati team but said manager Fred Hutchinson could summon the Reds' players as needed.

As matters now stand, National League umpires are enforcing the rule rigidly—the Donatelli team has called 32 balks so far—while American League umpires are virtually ignoring it.

From his office here, Frick, who stayed out of the general controversy until now, said he wanted the rule to be "interpreted the same way for both major leagues" if it remains in the book.

"My chief concern is uniformity," he said. "At the executive council meeting we'll simply have to determine what is meant by 'stop.'"

Frick was referring to that portion of rule 8.05 which says a pitcher must come to a full one-second stop in his pitching motion when he is delivering the ball with a runner on base.

"I'm in favor of enforcing the rule," Frick said, "but it's nonsensical to think any man can get to time a second."

Loosely translated, that means the rule may remain in the book but probably will lose all its "teeth" when stop is revised to pause or some other word that will prevent the umpires from calling so many balks.

Actually, the only time Frick would be called upon to interpret the balk rule would be when teams from the two major leagues met each other, such as the All-Star Game or World Series.

Otherwise, it's the league presidents' headache although Giles says he doesn't make the rules, the rules committee does.

Giles Conducts Survey Bowing to the avalanche of criticism from all sides, Giles said he would have to "consider what steps to take" after he is

through conducting a current survey among managers, pitching coaches and players.

Giles is a cinch to find an overwhelming majority of National League managers want the rule scrapped entirely or at least revised so the pitchers are not penalized so frequently.

Casey Stengel of the Mets, Paul Richards and Harry Craft of the Colts, Johnny Keane of the Cardinals, Gene Mauch of the Phillies and Hutchinson already have protested strongly against the rule.

Giles finds himself with a tiger by the tail.

Admittedly, he told all National League umpires to enforce the balk rule while the teams still were in spring training. It would not look quite right for him to tell his umpires now "forget it, fellows," nor is he willing to increase the chaos the rule has caused up to now.

"Rules are in the book to be enforced," Giles said, "but I have to examine the entire situation."

Frick also wants the rules enforced, but like Giles, he doesn't particularly care to live with any rule that could make baseball a farce.

American League President Joe Cronin is sitting pretty. He has no balk problem at all.
