WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate planned to begin debate today on a \$1.4 billion catch-all money bill including a crackdown on lobbyists for Philippine damage claims.

Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee urged approval of a rider reversing the 1962 Philippine War Damage Act to pay \$73 million directly to the Philippine government, instead of to individual claimants.
