ATLANTA (UPI)—Georgia Attorney General Eugene Cook Thursday released a report on his efforts to determine if any big bets were placed on last year's Alabama-Georgia football game. The report indicated that Cook's findings into the gambling angle of the Butts-Bryant controversy were not conclusive.
