Third Hand Rule Ducked

The rule for third hand high is, "Third hand should play high unless he has a definite reason." West opens his seven of spades against the three no-trump contract and South plays the ten from dummy.

East should play the nine of spades, not the king. It takes a lot of intestinal fortitude to give up an immediate sure trick, but if East wants to beat three no-trump he had best do so.

Assuming that East plays the nine of spades, South will win the trick, go to dummy with a heart and lead the jack of clubs. East will duck and South will finesse. The king play will do him no good. West will be on lead with the queen of clubs and will play his second spade.

This will knock out dummy's ace and establish the rest of the suit for East who still holds the ace of clubs as a sure entry.

If East clatters up with the king of spades at trick one and leads the suit back, South will still take and lose the club finesse, but West won't have a spade to lead and there will be no way to beat the contract.

Service Station Melee Sparks Arrest Of Four

Four men were arrested Tuesday by city police after breaking up a restroom at a service station at the corner of South Sixth Street and East Main streets and getting into a fight with three patrolmen trying to make the arrest.

Charged with drunk and disorderly conduct were, Russell Wayne Long, Route 2, Box 562; Everett Wayne Dixon, Route 2, Box 550A; and Phillip W. O'Neill, Box 3867, Kingsley Field. Mike W. Murray, Box 3024, Kingsley Field, was charged with disorderly conduct.

When one of the patrolmen arrived at the scene, the service station attendant told him eight or nine men had just left after causing a disturbance in the restroom.

The attendant said shortly before the disturbance one of the men approached him and said if he heard noise in the restroom "just disregard it."

The patrolman called the police station for assistance when he spotted five of the men walking down South Sixth near Radcliffe.

While questioning the men the patrolman observed two of them had blood on their jackets. When Dixon became abusive during questioning the patrolman attempted to arrest him for being drunk, but Long grabbed the policeman and they started grappling.

The fight subsided temporarily when two more patrolmen arrived at the scene. One of the patrol-

men took Larry Eglund, who's former address was 1642 Nimitz Street, back to the service station to get washed up. He had been badly beaten about the head and face.

Eglund said he had been assaulted by an Indian while in the restroom.

While Eglund was being taken care of the light broke out again on the street between the four men and the two remaining patrolmen.

When the third patrolman got back to the scene of the fight he called the station for more help and several more policemen came to break up the fight and take the four men to the station to be charged.

Murray, however, was able to slip away in the confusion, but was apprehended Wednesday afternoon.

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JFK Tells Cuban Policy Critics To Stop Sidestepping

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy says he is doing everything possible to combat the Communist regime in Cuba except take steps that would trigger violence and bring "world-wide difficulty."

The President challenged critics of his Cuban policy Wednesday to be more precise in their proposals and to stop "sidestepping" the issue of whether the United States should go to war over Cuba.

Kennedy discussed the Cuban situation at a wide-ranging news conference, his first in three weeks. He also dealt with Laos, a nuclear test ban and birth control among other subjects.

Asked if he would like to answer criticism by former Vice President Richard M. Nixon and other Republicans of his stand on Cuba, Kennedy listed steps he said had been taken against the Castro regime.

He said free world trade with Cuba had been cut from \$800 million to \$80 million in the past three years, Castro had been "almost diplomatically isolated" in this hemisphere and steps were being taken to cut off guerrilla activity from Cuba.

Laos—He was sending Undersecretary of State W. Averell Har-

man to Moscow Thursday to discuss the Laos crisis. Harriman carried a "short message" from the President to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Test ban—He and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan have for an accord.

Suggested new proposals to Khrushchev in an effort to break the deadlock over a nuclear test ban treaty. But Kennedy was not overly optimistic about prospects for an accord.

Summit—There are no plans for him to meet with Khrushchev and it did not seem that such a conference "would be useful unless we were in agreement upon a test ban, which we are not now."

Birth control—He favors increased government support of basic research on human reproduction. But he declined to take a definite stand on a Catholic doctrine's proposal that the federal government underwrite a massive research program aimed at developing new methods of birth control acceptable to all religious groups.

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
