Soviet Jets Circle U.S. Helicopters

BERLIN (UPI)—Two Soviet jet fighters circled two U.S. Army helicopters over Berlin today, apparently to underline Russia's contention that the helicopter flights were illegal.

An Army spokesman said the jets approached within 500 yards of the helicopters but took no aggressive action.

One of the helicopters was over East Berlin and the other was flying along the West Berlin side of the East-West city border, the spokesman said.

Western officials noted that the Russians never before had sent up aircraft when American helicopters were in the air although the Soviets maintain helicopter flights over East Berlin are illegal.

The officials said 500 yards was not too close to approach another aircraft.

Witnesses said one of the MIG jets flew into West Berlin to circle five times a helicopter clearly over West Berlin territory.

The helicopter over East Berlin also was circled several times, witnesses said.

The helicopters were flying at a height of about 250 yards. Both landed safely in West Berlin.

The Soviets long have denounced helicopter flights over East Berlin as illegal, and have even warned they might shoot them down.

However, the Western Allies assert they may fly anywhere in Berlin, East or West.

Woman Found Dead In Cabin

Mrs. Lyons was found dead April 22 in a cabin on Oak Street. She came to Klamath Falls recently from California and has no known friends or relatives.

Mrs. Lyons was a native of Rhode Island and had lived at one time in Oroville, Calif.

Death was reported to be from natural causes.

Constitution Revisers Plan Extra Meetings

SALEM (UPI)—Chairman John Dellenback of the House Constitutional Revision Committee said today extra meetings are planned in an effort to get a proposed new constitution to the floor for action in a week.

The House committee and its Senate counterpart have been meeting together all during the session.

The constitution was introduced on the House side, however, and would have to return to the Senate committee if it won the two-thirds House vote needed.

Signs are the House committee may make a few final decisions alone, leaving a handful of differences with the Senate committee to be resolved.

The two committees have agreed on most sections.

They still faced Thursday, however, to resolve two important issues: Legislative apportionment and selection of judges.

The Senate committee voted Thursday in favor of electing judges as at present. The House committee voted against the present plan. Some members said they favor initial appointment of judges, with subsequent election.

The House committee in a separate meeting, voted to restore the constitutional prohibition on

against lotteries that was taken out by earlier joint action.

The House committee approved articles 7-12 on an elective "watch dog" secretary of state, local government, public officers, taxation and finance, governmental activities, and amendment and revision. The action ratified material for the most part, approved earlier by both committees.

Both committees also have given final approval to other articles.

The House and Senate committees disagreed Thursday over whether use of gas tax money for highways only, not athletic facilities, should be spelled out.

Some legislators from Eastern Oregon have objected to suggestions the gasoline tax revenues might be used as well to build facilities in the Portland area for possible Olympics use.

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Rockefeller Sees Chaos In JFK Policy

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller said Thursday night that President Kennedy's European nuclear defense policy will lead to "chaos" and proposed, instead, one of his own.

Rockefeller, who many believe will face Kennedy in 1964 as the Republican presidential candidate, urged the United States to help Europe create a nuclear arsenal

and strategy that can be coordinated with our own.

He called for "a North Atlantic political arrangement within which nuclear weapons can be controlled and deployed for the common good of all free peoples."

Such an arrangement, he said, could be achieved through creation of a "genuine political partnership of strong and independent nations committed to sharing agreed nuclear responsibilities for the common defense of the Atlantic area."

Rockefeller, in a dinner address to the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association (ANPA), said the Kennedy administration "has talked a great deal about partnership, but it is treating our friends of the Atlantic alliance as dependent allies rather than independent partners."

"The administration in its policies and actions has, in fact, been extremely ambivalent: in the economic field, it has talked of equal partnership; in the importance of European integration and of common European action, but in the nuclear field, it has discouraged the emergence of any European identity."

The GOP governor said the administration has tended "to blur the realities with which we must deal, to obscure the problem of proud and strong allies seeking a

Dunes Park Plan Talked

SALEM (UPI)—The State Highway Commission announced Thursday it is willing to develop the Oregon Dunes Seashore area as a state project.

It suggested state development as a compromise solution to the battle raging over the proposed national seashore area in western Lane and Douglas counties.

Commission Chairman Glenn Jackson said his agency is not opposed to federal development and does not plan to push the idea, but it is "ready and willing" to help if called upon.

Jackson made the surprise proposal to fellow commission members David R. Simpson and Kenneth B. Fridley at the request of the commission's Parks Advisory Committee. He pointed out the state already operates Honeyman and Umqua Lighthouse State Parks in the area.

Bills providing for development of the Dunes by the National Park Service have been introduced in Congress by Sen. Maurice Neuberger, D-Ore., and Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore. They differ mainly in boundaries.

FIRE TRIGGERS CRASH

LONDON (UPI)—Nine fire engines raced to a blaze at Westminster Abbey Thursday. Two collided with two cars and a bus in Parliament Square.

The blaze turned out to be a man burning rubbish in an incinerator. There were no injuries in the collisions.
