Team Of Evangelists Will Conduct Holiness Emphasis Week Services

The Klamath Basin Holiness Association will sponsor the Fourth Annual Holiness Emphasis Week to be held April 28 through May 5 at the Salvation Army Hall, 408 Klamath Ave.

The five member churches of the Holiness Association are the Free Methodist Church, First Church of the Nazarene, Lakeside Church of the Nazarene, Weaver Memorial Pilgrim Holiness Church, and the Salvation Army.

Three personalities in the field of Christian evangelism will be featured at the services: Rev. Lester Moore of Portland, Rev. Max Morgan of Eugene, and Mrs. Alva (Beatrice) Yoakum of Medford.

Reverend Moore is the North-

west director and missionary evangelist for the World Gospel Missions, with the Northwest office in Portland. He is a member of the Evangelical United Brethren Church and has served as a pastor, evangelist, and Bible conference director in his denomination.

As the regional director for the W.G.M., Reverend Moore arranges the itinerary for missionaries touring in the nine western states and two western provinces in Canada, as well as arranging and conducting missionary revival campaigns.

Traveling in many countries of the world for missionary and evangelistic services, he has been to Alaska, Canada, Mexico, Honduras in Central America, Bolivia in South America, and the Kenya

Colony and Belgian Congo in Africa. He has also visited the Holy Land, Egypt, and several countries in Europe, taking color slides and movies of his trips.

The co-evangelist for Holiness Week, Reverend Morgan, is currently the pastor of the Evangelical United Brethren Church in Eugene. He has many years of experience serving as a minister, evangelist, and holiness expositor.

The third member of the visiting team will be the song evangelist, Mrs. Yoakum. She has been featured in numerous camp meetings and evangelistic campaigns as soloist and musical director, actively serving in this type of ministry since the age of 16.

Portland Pastor Accepts Klamath Lutheran's Call

Rev. Malcolm Unseth, currently pastor at the Mt. Olivet Lutheran Church, Portland, has accepted a call to become pastor of Klamath Lutheran Church.

The congregation of the church here met last Wednesday to cast its ballot on a new pastor and

unanimously voted to issue the call to Rev. Unseth.

A special meeting of the church's council, board of deacons and deaconesses, and call committee met with Rev. Unseth Monday evening in the educational unit and discussed the needs of the church.

Rev. LeRoy Redal, pastor of the church submitted his resignation in early March. He will become pastor of a church in Washington, and will be leaving June 1.

Rev. Unseth expects to preach his first sermon at Klamath Lutheran Church on Sunday, June 16. He is 38 and has been pastor of the Portland church for the past six and one half years.

Meeting with the officials of the church Monday evening, Rev. Unseth indicated that he was obligated to go through with his plans to attend the World Convention of the American Lutheran Church which will be held in Helsinki, Finland, and that he would be gone from mid-July to mid-August.

The Unseths have five children, ranging in age from four to 15, and will occupy the church parsonage at 112 Eldorado Avenue.

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UCW To Observe Fellowship Day

Dedicated to emphasizing Christian social relations, May Fellowship Day is traditionally observed by United Church Women in all parts of the world on the first Friday in May.

Klamath Falls United Church Women will meet in the Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church on May 3 for a potluck luncheon and program at 12:30 p.m. The theme for the day will be "One Family Under God—Genuine and Full Participation."

The luncheon will feature a skit to promote the organization's national magazine, "The Church Woman," followed by songs and a

worship service, according to the president, Mrs. Lewis Stork.

The program for the day will include a panel discussion moderated by Miss Arlene Skaugset of the First Christian Church. The discussion theme, taken from the United Council of Church Women's study booklet, will be "Claiming Our Inheritance—From Where We are to Full Participation."

Panel members will be Mrs. Carl Simmons, Church of the Brethren; Mrs. George McKinney, First Christian Church; and Mrs. Jack Hall.

Miss Skaugset said the discus-

sion will deal primarily with the race situation as related to this community and its immediate needs, pointing up the meaning of true fellowship and the willingness to offend and to be offended.

The panel members will relate specific actions being taken in other areas of the United States to promote fellowship and determine which of these actions might be applied locally, she said.

United Church Women in Klamath Falls is composed of representatives from 10 churches. These churches are First Presbyterian, Peace Memorial Presbyterian, St. Paul's Episcopal, Hope Lutheran, Klamath Lutheran, First Methodist, First Congregational, Kingsley Field Chapel, First Christian, and Church of the Brethren.

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Science And Religion Theme For Group Study

The young people of Suburban Christian Church will begin a series of meetings on the topic, "Science Returns to God," on Sunday, April 28, at 9:45 a.m. Mrs. Russell Raich, instructor of the church's high school group, said the study sessions will include experiments, films, and open discussions.

Teens throughout the country have planned similar meetings as part of a recommended study by the religious teen weekly, "Straight." The author of the series of articles from which the local youths will draw their program material is Dr. James H. Jauncey, minister of the First Christian Church of El Paso, Texas.

Dr. Jauncey, a scientist by training and experience, holds master's degrees in science and history and doctor's degrees in mathematics and theology. A native of Australia, he holds rank in the British Psychological Society, a fellowship in the Royal Geographical Society, and is listed in

"Who's Who in American Education." After coming to America, Dr. Jauncey served as an engineer at the White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico but later left this work for the ministry. He is the author of three books, "Science Returns to God," "This Faith We Live By," and "I Believe in the American Way."

The articles to be used in the young people's study include "The Scientists and Religious Faith," "Science, Experience and Faith," "The Authority of Christ," "Origin of Life," "Special Biblical Problems," and "The Conquest of Space."

According to Rev. Leo Shaffer, minister of the church, the class will be open to any high school young person interested in a stimulating consideration of science and God.
