Bids Asked For Water System Job

Bids for construction of a central water system to service the Forest Service recreation area at Lake of the Woods are being called for by the Winema National Forest.

The proposed water development will include a central pumping station, storage tank, and main distribution lines to service the Aspen Point, Rainbow and Sunset Campgrounds on the west side of Lake of the Woods.

Sealed bids for construction of this facility will be received by the Regional Forester in Portland not later than 4 p.m. Pacific Daylight time May 15, 1963.

Information concerning the proposed development may be secured from the Office of the Forest Supervisor, 411 Main Street in Klamath Falls.

Other recreation developments currently under contract at the Lake of the Woods area include a water distribution line in the Aspen Point Camp and six restroom buildings, also in the Aspen Point area. Work on these projects will be under way as soon as snow leaves the area. Work will be so scheduled as to interfere as little as possible with the use of the campgrounds. When completed the water system and related facilities will add greatly to the total recreation development at Lake of the Woods.

A Show-Me trip for interested bidders will be held Monday, May 6, starting at 10 a.m. The group will assemble at the Lake of the Woods Resort. The trip will provide an opportunity for interested bidders to review specifications of the proposed project.

Kennedy's Performance Rapped By Republicans

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck said today President Kennedy had broken so many campaign promises that "Apologists for the administration are running out of excuses."

He talked about the "gap between Kennedy's promise and Kennedy's performance" in a speech prepared for a session of the 11th annual Conference of Republican Women. About 2,000 delegates from throughout the country registered for the three-day meeting.

Halleck raked the administration's entire domestic and foreign program while, like other GOP speakers, attacking its failure to dislodge the Communist regime in Cuba.

He said there was a gap between promise and performance on such issues as unemployment, budget-balancing, "manipulated" news, Cuba, and relations with friendly nations.

Speaking of Cuba, he called the abortive Bay of Pigs invasion effort a "monumental disaster" and said the American people now would welcome assurances that Soviet troops were being removed from Cuba.

"Don't be too surprised if we get such assurances along about October of 1964, a month before the presidential election," he said.
