GILCHRIST — The Gilchrist clockings, Jack Hazlewood copped the half mile run in a fairly slow 2:15 with Bend's Shepard winning the mile in a slow 5:12.4.

Matt Koski won the 120-yard high hurdles for the Grizzlies in 1:48 and Hazlewood took the 180-yard low hurdles in 2:34. Bend's Stockdale captured the shot put with a fine 41-3/4 effort. Fredrickson of Bend was the javelin winner with a fine toss of 162-7.

Paisley got its only first in the high jump where Dave Brattain won at 5-4. Bend's Nicholson won the pole vault at 10-6 and Gilchrist's Koski won the broad jump with a leap of 19-4. Gilchrist, with Lyles, Donny Jennings, Koski and Dan Hoff running legs, won the 800-yard relay in 1:41 flat.

Coach Jerry Bennett says that his team is improving all the time and believes that the Grizzlies can push Bonanza for the league title. Their chances were hurt, however, when Bob Mayfield broke some bones in his foot last week in practice.

Owl Booster Club To Meet

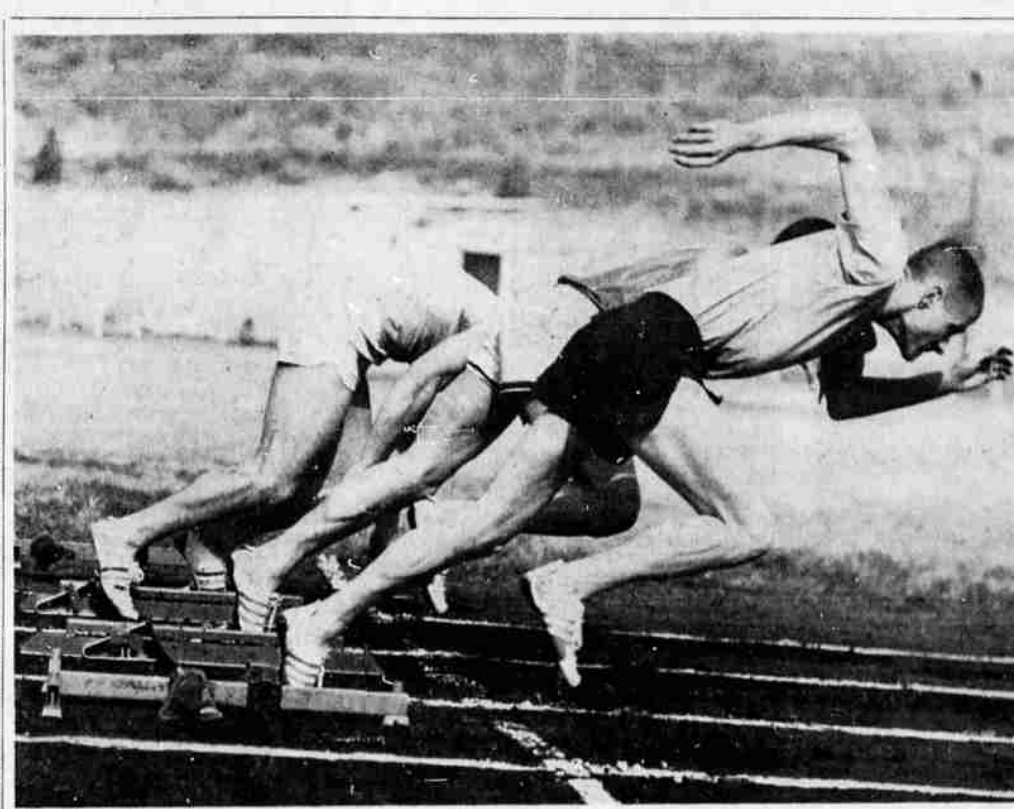
The Owl Booster Club will meet Monday night at the Brainerd Restaurant at 6:30 with the election of new officers to headline the meeting.

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Hurlers Have Hot Duel In Second

ASHLAND—The Klamath Union Pelicans split Saturday's double-header with Ashland as the Grizzlies got some measure of revenge for the twin no-hitters thrown against them in the two opening games of the Southern Oregon Conference.

The Pelicans had to go nine innings to down the pesky Grizzlies in the first game, 4-2. The Whitebirds dropped the second game in a brilliant pitching duel between hard-luck Gary Benson and John Rhodes. Each hurler spun one-hitters with Benson taking the heart-breaking loss.

The split left the Pelicans in sole possession of second place with a 6-2 record while Medford remains the king of the hill with a 6-0 mark. Crater, which could be a big darkhorse in the league, is third with a 4-4 record. Ashland is 2-6 and Grants Pass is winless in eight games.

The Pelicans banged out 12 hits to only four for the Grizzlies in the first game and still had to go extra frames to win. They also had to rally for the victory.

The Grizzlies took command in the third frame with one out. Catcher Bob Deboer walked and took second on a passed ball. Jan Susek fled out to left and Rhodes, playing first in the first game, singled to score Deboer.

Klamath tied the game up in the sixth on a single by Lanny Guyer. Pel second sacker, another single by centerfielder Larry Smith, a pair of fly outs and a single by third baseman John Parisotto for the run. Ashland came right back in their half, however, to regain the lead. Bill Tifford walked, went to second on Dean Samuelson's walk and to third on the base-filling walk to Rick Pierce. A ground ball by Bob Manz scored Tifford for the second run.

The Pelicans rallied in the top of the seventh to knot the score. Pinchhitter Rich Bath led off with a single and was sacrificed to second by pitcher Rick Jackson. Guyer hit his third of four singles but Bath held up at third. He scored on a passed ball.

The Pelicans won the game in the ninth on three straight singles by Larry Binney, Rick Horn and Jay Paxton. Binney was called out on a technicality of leaving the bag too soon but Horn scored on Jackson's sacrifice fly to center and Guyer singled Paxton home.

Ashland got its lone winning run in the second game in the fourth inning. Tim Thompson led off with a walk. Deboer struck out. Pierce drew a walk and Samuelson hit a shot down the first base line which the Klamath players said was foul by feet but was ruled a fair ball. First baseman John Gray made the play on the ball and missed it and was thus charged with an error when the ball was ruled fair and the run had scored, the winning run.
