Rodgers Wins Texas Open; Celebrates With Vacation

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI) — Phil Rodgers, savoring his first tournament victory in more than a year, flew home to California today to take a week's vacation in honor of his winning the 1963 Texas Open.

Rodgers, a former NCAA champion from the University of Houston, sliced five more strokes off par Sunday with a closing round 66 to take a two-stroke victory over Johnny Pott with a 72-hole total of 16-under-par 168. It was worth \$4,300.

Bogey Hurler — Pott, from Gulf Hills, Miss., nearly matched Rodgers, but he bogeyed on the 17th hole and a par on the 18th left him with a 68 and a total 270. It was worth \$3,000 to him.

Rodgers, playing out of Perdido Bay, Fla., started Sunday's final round tied with Pott for the lead. He cut two strokes off par on the front nine with a bogey on No. 3 and birdies on 4, 8 and 9.

Rotund Phil two-putted from 45 feet out for a birdie on 10, sank a 25-footer for a birdie on 12, two-putted from 60 feet for a birdie on 15 and sank an 18-foot birdie putt on 17 to wrap up his title.

It was his first win since he took first place in the Tucson, Ariz., open last year.

Palmer Solving Problem — Arnold Palmer, the pre-tournament favorite who came to San Antonio seeking his fourth consecutive Texas Open championship, finished in a tie for ninth, 8 strokes off the pace.

Palmer had trouble with his irons in the first three rounds, and by the time he straightened his problems out for a final round 67, it was too late to seriously challenge.

But Arnie was cheered by his final round, and said he now believes he has his iron game troubles solved. "At least back to where I have a chance to win,"

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WALNUT, Calif. (UPI)—C.K. Yang of Nationalist China broke the world decathlon record of former UCLA teammate Rafer Johnson Sunday by amassing 9,121 points and he may get as much as 34 points more for his pole vault performance.

Officials at the Mt. San Antonio Relays awarded Yang the maximum 1,515 points for his pole vault. But Yang cleared 15 feet, 10 1/2 inches—4 of an inch higher than the present decathlon point system for the pole vault figures points for.

The 6-foot-1 athlete barely missed on his third attempt to clear the bar at 16 1/2—which would have been the third world record shattered at the three-day track meet at the Mt. San Antonio Junior College Stadium.

Other Marks Set — New marks were set in the discus event and the mile relay Saturday. Al Deter of New York hurled the discus 205 feet, 5 1/2 inches to break his own year-old record by 7 inches. Deter had five throws over 200 feet for an unprecedented achievement.

The Saturday crowd of 12,500 saw the Arizona State University quartet of Mike Barrick, Henry Carr, Ron Freeman and Uis Williams streak to a world record of 3:04.5—bettering the 1960 U.S.A. Olympic and national team record of 3:05.6.

Carr of Detroit, Mich., had the fastest leg, sprinting the second one in .45. Carr also pressed Bob Hayes of Tallahassee, Fla., to a record 100.9 seconds in the 100 meters, but it was disallowed because of an 11 mile per hour wind. Carr was second in .10 flat.

Only 1,200 fans watched Yang surpass Johnson's 1960 decathlon mark of 8,633 points in the second day of the competition.

Record Javelin Throw — The 23-year-old Yang said he was "disappointed" in his first day performance when he was behind Johnson's pace, 4,750 points to 4,543. But Sunday Yang ran 14 seconds flat in the 110 meter high hurdles; hurled the discus 134 feet, 6 inches; got the maximum allowance in the pole vault, but got cramps in both his thighs and calves before the ninth event—the javelin.

UCLA Coach Ducky Drake rubbed him down and after a delay of 30 minutes Yang threw the javelin 235 feet, 5 inches to better Johnson's record, then added 245 points by running the 1,500 meters in 5 minutes, two seconds to crack the mythical 9,000-point "barrier."

Mark Broken By Burleson — Former Oregon star Dyrrol Burleson shattered his own record for the mile run in the Drake Relays at Des Moines Saturday. He won the race in 4:05.4 to break his meet mark of 4:06.7 set in 1959.

Oregon State's two-mile relay team of Jerry Brady, Jan Underwood, Iain Colpitts and Morgan Groth came in first in 7:31.3.

At Walnut, Calif., in the Mt. San Antonio Relays, Oregon's Ray Van Asten ran second in the 880-yard run in 1:49.9 behind Jim Dupree of Southern Illinois. Dupree's time was 1:49.4.

Gary Stenlund of Oregon State finished third in the javelin with a throw of 242.2.

In the decathlon at Walnut, Oregon State's Steve Paul finished fifth with 6,969 points in the two-day, 10-event grind. C.K. Yang of UCLA smashed the world record with 9,121 points.

In the Penn Relays at Philadelphia, the Beavers picked off a second in the sprint medley, a fourth in the 880-yard relay and a fifth in the mile relay.

Frank Marsh of Oregon State finished fifth in the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.6.

Split Ends Salem Sken — The other doubleheader went to Tacoma. The Giants defeated the Dallas-Ft. Worth Rangers 6-2 in the first game, then came back to take the nightcap by a 3-1 score.

The two extra-inning contests saw Salt Lake City shade San Diego 3-2 in 12 innings, while Portland got the better of Denver, 6-5 in 11 frames.

In the Seattle-Hawaii doubleheader, Paul Smith's sacrifice fly with the bases loaded in the ninth inning drove in the deciding run after the Islanders' Duncan Campbell had tied the score with a two-

run homer in the top of the ninth. Both clubs were held to seven hits. The victory went to Bob Hefner, who hurled shutout ball for eight innings. Ramon Fernandez was tagged with the loss.

Wilbur Wood turned in a three-hitter in the seven-inning finale. He struck out seven and walked two while recording his second win. The Rainiers got only five hits off Dick Snyder, but one of those was a solo home run by Bobby Gene Smith in the second, and that proved to be all that was necessary.

Joe Grunzuda twirled a neat two-hitter in the nightcap to give Oklahoma City its sweep against Spokane. The 88ers could reach young Joe Mueller for only two hits, but one of them, a double by Von McDaniel, scored Jim McDaniel, who had walked to open the second inning.

The 68ers made the most of 11 hits in the first game, winning the contest in the top of the ninth on a pair of runs. Gordon Jones, the second of three Oklahoma City pitchers, got the win, his third against three setbacks.

Right-hander Gerry Thomas scattered seven hits to get the win in the finale at Tacoma. The Giants broke open a scoreless pitcher's duel in the first game with two runs in the sixth inning, then added four more in the seventh to ice it.

At San Diego, Curt Jensen singled in the winning run in the 12th to give Salt Lake City a sweep in the three-game series. Gordon Seyfried threw the distance for the Bees, gaining his first win after two setbacks. The Padres' Sammy Ellis pitched excellent ball for the first 1 1/2 innings but was lifted in the 12th when he tied.

The Portland-Denver contest was decided when Ken Harrelson ripped a three-run homer in the bottom of the 11th. The win went to Moe Drabowsky, who came on in the sixth. He held the Bees scoreless and gave up only four hits.

Moyer Faces Dubas In Title Defense

NEW YORK (UPI) — Two interesting fights stand out on this week's boxing schedule:

—At New Orleans, Monday night, Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., defends his world junior middleweight (134-pound) crown against Ralph Dupas of New Orleans.

—At Las Vegas, Nev., Saturday night, light heavyweight (175-pound) contenders Wayne Thornton of Bakersfield, Calif., and Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach meet in a nationally televised match—their third.

Moyer, 23, is making his second defense of the title he won by outpointing Jey Giambra last Oct. 20. Despite Denny's youth and ability, however, veteran Dupas is expected to be favored slightly at the bout.

Thornton will be favored at about 7-5 because he outpointed Pastrano in their first fight at Madison Square Garden, on Feb. 9, although held to a draw by dancing Willie in their second encounter at the Garden, March 23.

Both of those bouts also were televised nationally by ABC.
