

Groups Plan Coordinating Meet On Higher Education Building

SALEM (UPI) — On a cordial note, the Ways and Means Education subcommittee and the State Board of Higher Education moved Saturday to coordinate their positions on higher education building.

At the request of the legislative committee, a special board meeting was planned May 6 to comment on actions tentatively taken by the committee on the board's college building budget.

Charles Holloway, vice president of the board, expressed willingness to hold a special meeting. Chancellor R. E. Lieuaen said, "I think you'll find them willing to work toward the goals you've outlined."

What it seemed to mean is that the board will take another look at building needs in terms of financial limits indicated by the committee.

The committee, in turn, will listen to the board's expression on how priorities and funding should be handled.

The committee recently gave tentative approval to instructional projects worth \$25 million during the 1963-65 biennium—some in a bonding, self-liquidating category, and others in a general fund category.

Flexibility Eyed

The board was asked specifically if it would like more flexibility in setting priorities than the separate categories would allow.

The committee indicated it is open to further consideration of three projects it omitted that were high on the board's priority list: Library construction or remodeling at Oregon State University, the University of Oregon, and Oregon College of Education.

At the special meeting, the board also will have a chance to comment on bids for development of the Oregon Technical Institute campus that are to be opened Thursday. The committee is working to see the amount.

Rep. John Mosser, R-Beaverton, suggested the board also might want to comment on whether some of its "B" budget items for improving education might take priority over some building requests.

The meeting ranged over several subjects:

—The subcommittee rejected a suggestion that higher education donate \$6,000 for planning of a private graduate study center in the Portland area. Private colleges already have donated such a sum. Members warned it would set a precedent in favor of further state support of the proposed center. Said Rep. Stafford Hansell, R-Hermiston, of state aid, "now is the time to knock it in the head."

—On campus growth, Sen. Alfred Corbett, D-Portland, suggested another effort be made to work out a plan for letting the University of Oregon expand onto part of the Pioneer Memorial Cemetery at Eugene, a subject of considerable controversy.

—The subcommittee received a report from the state system indicating its decisions to date are equivalent to a net \$1.8 million reduction in the governor's proposed \$32 million higher education budget. The main decisions are a change in the student-teacher ratio and a reduction in out-of-state students.

Board Mulls Voting Date

The board of directors of Elementary School District No. 1 and the Klamath County School District will hold a joint meeting Monday, April 29, at 8 p.m. in the city school Administration Building, 475 South Alameda Street, for the purpose of considering a date for a special election on the petitions calling for a single county-wide school district.

Both boards last week received petitions with over 100 signatures asking that the KU district be dissolved and the city elementary and county districts join to form one single school district in Klamath County.

Under state law an election must be held to consider these petitions within 90 days after they have been filed with the respective school clerks.

In such an election, the city residents would vote together as a separate unit and the suburban and rural residents would also vote together as a separate unit.

Police Catch Wanted Men

Two men sought by the Klamath County Sheriff's Office on charges of larceny were apprehended during the weekend by police in other states and are being held for local deputies, Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton said Monday.

In custody of the sheriff's office at Monroe (Green County), Wis., is Ed Marsh, sought in connection with the theft of an automobile which was stolen locally about a month ago.

Meanwhile, Memphis police were holding William Harold Medders, about 29, sought by Sheriff Britton, on a larceny charge involving the theft of clothing.

The sheriff said early Monday that he was preparing papers for the extradition of Medders, since Memphis police indicated that the latter had refused to sign a waiver of extradition.

Grass Fires Trip Calls

Suburban firemen were summoned to extinguish two grass fires in as many vacant lots during the weekend, resulting in no damage, the fire department reported Monday.

At 5:18 p.m., Saturday, firemen went to Altamont Drive and Johns Avenue where a fire started after flames from a burning rubbish pile were blown onto the lot. The property belongs to L. A. Scott, fireman said.

Wind was also blamed for the other fire which started in the rear of a dwelling occupied by Glenn Inselman, 3440 Altamont Drive. Firemen said that winds blew burning trash from an open barrel onto the lot, setting it afire. Allen Klus is the owner of the property.

Soldier Held For Murder

MEDFORD (UPI) — Harold Bibeau, a 20-year-old soldier, was being held in the Jackson County jail today on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the slaying of an Ashland theater operator.

Russell Osborn, 36, was found shot to death at his home at Ashland Saturday. He had been shot in the head, and was bound and gagged.

Bibeau who apparently was on a furlough from the Army, was arrested at a Portland area motel by state police Saturday night. Osborn's 1963 model car was found outside the motel. A pistol was discovered in the vehicle.

Bibeau was taken to Medford Sunday where he was brought before Circuit Judge Edward Kelly. Kelly appointed attorneys Stanley C. Jones Jr. and Joel Reeder to represent him.

Kelly continued the arraignment until today.

Dist. Atty. Alan Holmes said the cause would be presented to the grand jury Wednesday.

Osborn's body was found by Roy Carrier of Yreka, Calif., the victim's half-brother. He had arrived for a visit.

New Tax Trial Judge Named

PORTLAND (UPI) — Federal Judge James Carter of San Diego has been named to preside over the new income tax evasion trial of Portland attorney Rueben Lense here, it was announced Friday.

He is expected to arrive in Portland Tuesday to make preparations to get the new trial under way.

Federal Judge John Ross of Carson City, Nev., who was presiding over the lengthy trial, died of a heart attack Monday.

Lense was arrested and was given a mistrial because of Ross' death.

Boeing Strike Appears Imminent

SEATTLE (UPI) — A strike of 40,000 workers appeared imminent today in the long, drawn-out labor dispute between the International Association of Machinists and the Boeing Co., makers of the Minuteman missile.

The only question remaining appeared to be when the strike will come.

That may be settled at meetings of 600 shop stewards and IAM local leaders which the union has scheduled across the nation for 6 p.m. PDT today.

If the strike date is set it would mean that 26,000 production workers at Boeing plants in the Seattle-Renton, Wash., area and 14,000 more at Wichita, Kan., and

Minuteman installations at 12 Air Force bases across the nation would be poised to leave their jobs.

Twice before the union has threatened to strike in the dispute. A strike was averted Jan. 25 when President Kennedy, acting in what he said was the interest of national defense, invoked the Taft-Hartley Law and obtained an 80-day cooling off injunction.

A strike was set again for April 16, the day after the injunction expired, but it was called off when the company made a new contract offer.

That offer was rejected by 877 votes in a nationwide election earlier this month.

Senate Faces Big Test On Budget Cut Effort

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congressional activity increases this week as the House acts on a series of bills and the Senate faces a major test on Republican efforts to cut spending.

The House is scheduled to act on bills giving employers a minor tax break, keep public health, education and federal labor activities rolling and to pump an additional \$2 billion into lending authority of the Export-Import Bank.

Various House committees will be considering President Kennedy's \$5 billion omnibus aid-to-education bill. The measure contains 24 different forms of federal aid ranging from grants to grade schools to help for school library service. Major education groups have endorsed the bill but it is opposed by leaders of the Roman Catholic Church because it excludes aid to parochial schools below the college level.

Kiwanis Officials Off On 17-Day Europe Tour

Three local residents departed Saturday on a once-in-a-lifetime adventure. Gus Vlahos, vice president of the Klamath Falls Kiwanis Club; Gene Favell, Pacific Northwest District chairman of boys and girls work, and Winifred Favell will be privileged to live Kiwanis history as it is made.

The group is headed by the president of Kiwanis International, Merle Tucker, from Gallup, New Mexico, and assembled at the Americana Hotel in New York City on Sunday, April 28.
