WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — G. M. Loeb of E. F. Hutton & Co. believes that the character of the buying and selling and the psychological background currently are the dominant factors in the stock market.

Loeb interprets these two factors as pointing to higher prices. He says there is never anything definite or positive about stock valuations. In selecting individual issues, a favorable earnings trend is of greater importance than the current ratio of a stock's price to its earnings.

Equity Research Associates says that no industry can better claim the description of "growth" than the life insurance industry. The consistency of its performance in this century can be matched by only the electric utilities industry. In the years since the war the industry has approximately quadrupled the amount of life insurance in force and seen its annual premium income rise from \$8 billion to over \$25 billion.

With the flow of first quarter dividend and earnings reports still coming in strongly, Bache & Co. says it is likely that the market will continue active and steady over the near term.

Carrier Post Exams Planned

An examination for rural carrier for the post office at Bonanza will be open for acceptance of applications until May 21, the U.S. Civil Service Commission announced.

Applicants must take a written test for this position. They must have resided within the office delivery area for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one year.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C., and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

DA Files Contempt Charge On Sheriff

Two affidavits recommending that Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton be charged with contempt of court were presented by District Attorney Dale Crabtree to Judge David R. Vandenberg in circuit court early today.

The request that the sheriff be

cited was made in connection with alleged conversations between Britton and Irene M. Allison, juror, and Deputy District Attorney Robert Thomas, pertaining to "new evidence" that came to light last Friday in the case of Oregon vs. Robert Huitt, charged with

assault with a dangerous weapon. After the affidavits were presented to the circuit court bench this morning, Judge Vandenberg, acting upon the recommendation of Thomas, the defense attorney, and the latter's client, granted a mistrial for Huitt.

Judge Vandenberg deferred setting the dates for the new trial and a hearing charging the sheriff with contempt and then called District Attorney Crabtree to conduct an investigation of the alleged conversations initiated by the sheriff.

The affidavit filed with the County Clerk by Mrs. Allison, a juror in the Huitt trial, states that she had stepped into the elevator at the county courthouse to return to court following the noon recess when she was joined by Sheriff Britton.

As the elevator proceeded to the second floor, Britton pushed the "stop" button and stopped the elevator between floors, the affidavit states. He then disclosed a letter written by Huitt to Louise Jane, attorney at law, to Mrs. Allison and began discussing the case with her, the statement re-

marks further.

In the other affidavit, Thomas states that Sheriff Britton showed him the letter and offered it to the district attorney's office as evidence for the Huitt trial.

Thomas stated in the motion for contempt that he declined to receive the letter as evidence. Britton then related that he had made known the contents of the letter to Mrs. Allison, Thomas states in the affidavit.

Both Mrs. Allison and Thomas advised Judge Vandenberg of the conversations immediately following their talks with the sheriff.

The Huitt trial began in circuit court last Monday, April 22. The defendant is charged with wounding Howard Wise in the leg with a bullet fired from a rifle following a drinking party at the accused's Agency residence early this year.

Witness Says Communists Using Cuba As Revolt Hub

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI)—An American eyewitness to the Communist build-up in Cuba said in a copyrighted radio report today that high speed vessels are transporting "tons of arms" and men from Cuban ports to Latin American countries almost daily.

The report, copyrighted by Miami radio station WGBS and the Storer Broadcasting Co., also said the Fidel Castro regime has "at least" 1,000 missiles which can reach the U.S. mainland.

The American and his wife said they were residents of Cuba for more than eight years. They recorded their story for the radio station but declined to permit use of their names for fear of reprisals against friends on the island.

They said they have given complete details about everything they have learned about Castro's military strength to the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency, according to WGBS.

Their report challenged official assessments of Castro's arsenal and estimates of the Russian troop strength on the island by the U.S. government. Castro's power is constantly increasing, the American said, and he is literally exporting his revolution by shipments of arms and trained agents to other Latin nations.

Foreign troops from the Communist bloc nations and the U.S.S.R. now in Cuba total between 70,000 and 80,000 men, the American said.

In addition, Castro has about one-third of the island's population or a total of two million persons under arms, he added.

He and his wife also reported that: "At least" 1,000 two-stage, 45-foot rockets, with an estimated minimum range of 300 miles, are in Cuba, many of them stored in caves.

High-speed vessels, about 150 feet long and carrying no flag or insignia, are running small arms and trained saboteurs to Haiti, Guatemala, Venezuela, Chile, Peru and Argentina on a regular "schedule" of shipments.

Submarine "pens" have been built under the guise of "fishing ports" at Mariel, near Havana, and at Banes, in Oriente Province and service an estimated 50 Russian-bloc submarines operated in and around Cuba.

A new submarine base is under construction at the Isle of Pines "that will be the largest of its kind in the world."

The Soviets have cleaned out, reinforced and ventilated about 50 huge natural caves in Oriente and Las Villas provinces alone and are using them as military depots for tanks, rockets and planes.

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Two Motorists Injured In Pair Of Accidents

Two motorists were injured in the car as it rolled over twice before coming to rest in a ditch facing south.

The other motorists, Richard E. Allen, 20, Grants Pass, was released from the same hospital at 12:30 a.m. Monday, after he was treated for injuries he received when his car rolled over twice as the tires caught in a soft gravel shoulder on State 66, Milepost 32, near Bly Mountain.

Allen told state police he was eastbound on the highway and traveling at about 45 miles an hour. He said he slowed to about 32 miles an hour to round a curve and his tires went into the soft shoulder. When Allen turned the wheel violently the car jerked back onto the highway, but went into a roll.

Supervisor Explains Board's Stand On Sheriff

W. A. Barr, chairman of the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors, issued a statement April 23 explaining the board's stand in the controversy with Sheriff Al Cottar over the use of deputies.

In reviewing the budget requests submitted by the various county departments, Barr said the board sets the budgets on the basis of what is necessary to run a department and what the taxpayer can afford. The sheriff's request for four more deputies and a salary raise for those in his department was turned down because the board members felt the law enforcement was adequate and there was no need for additional services.

Barr stated that Cottar anticipated resistance from the board and about a month before the budget sessions started a campaign to promote his request. "He did this ahead of time, without knowing whether the board would rule in favor of him or against his proposed budget," Barr said.

"He urged everyone to write or talk to their supervisor to ask for more money for the sheriff's department."

According to Barr, the board has always been in favor of a shorter work week for the sheriff's men, at the sheriff's discretion, and suggested that he accomplish this by compensating the men with time off for overtime worked to hold down expenses.

At this point, Barr said, the turmoil began. "The sheriff has nearly always been granted favorable consideration on his past requests, and he was exceedingly disgruntled to be refused this time, especially so in view of the fact he had laid the groundwork through his so-called 'campaign' to the people. The board decided he would be treated just the same as any other department in spite of his vigorous campaign, and this is exactly what was done," he added.

"It was at this point that the sheriff committed what we believe was a grave blunder," Barr continued. "In an effort to harass the board, he locked up the Happy Camp jail and brought all his deputies into Yreka from the outlying areas. He left these areas without the protection he

Drummed Out War Hero To Attend Honor Meet

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Marine officer discharged from the service on charges of slaying a suspected Cuban spy is among Medal of Honor winners invited to a White House ceremony Thursday.

The officer, former Capt. Arthur J. Jackson, said Sunday night that he intends to attend the ceremony. Jackson is now a mailman at San Jose, Calif.

He said he and his wife will leave from Travis Air Force Base, Calif., Tuesday with 22 other Medal of Honor winners from California. He declined comment on the Cuban spy killing incident.

"When they (the Department of Defense) get ready for me to talk, I'll say something," he said.

About 250 of the 294 living Medal of Honor winners were expected to attend the reception, arranged some time ago.

Jackson was one of four Marine officers dismissed from the services because of the 1961 incident involving a Cuban employed at Guantanamo Naval Base.

One of the four, former Lt. William A. Szili, told newsmen Saturday that Jackson shot the Cuban in self-defense. Szili said he helped Jackson dispose of the body.

Szili said the Cuban was a Castro agent who was discovered prowling around a restricted powder magazine. He said he and Jackson sought to turn the prisoner over to the base police. The police declined to take him, Szili said, and told Szili and Jackson to take the Cuban to the gate and release him.

The gate was jammed by a defective latch, Szili said, and he went to get a sledgehammer to open it. While he was gone, according to Szili, the Cuban attacked Jackson, who fired in self-defense.

Szili said the body fell over a cliff and he and Jackson decided to say nothing because of possible international complications.

Grand Jury Indicts 13

The indictment further states that the two men entered Sellers' house with intent to commit assault and battery. Bond was set at \$3,000 each.

Bond was set at \$2,500 for Roach, who is in the county jail as is Blevins and Gregory.

Another man indicted on a similar charge was William J. Easter, who is on \$2,500 bail on each of two counts resulting from incidents which occurred Feb. 16 and March 21.

Judge Vandenberg deferred setting the time for the arraignments until later.

The grand jury returned not true bills against Lewis Harvey Gibbons and Henry Cole, both of whom had been on bail.
