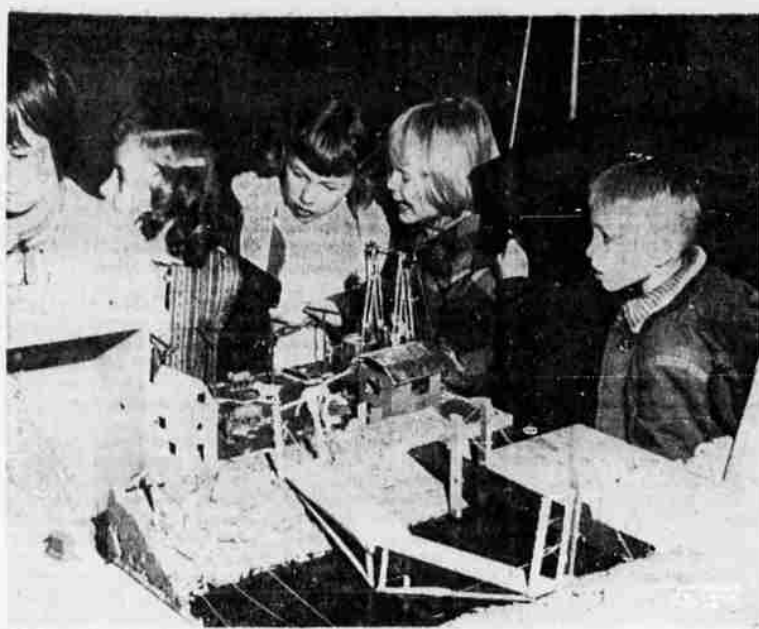

Ambulance Need Told Chamber

MOUNT SHASTA—At its regular meeting April 25, Mount Shasta Chamber of Commerce heard a report from Frank Melo regarding the necessity of obtaining an ambulance for the Mount Shasta area. Plans are being made to meet with Dunsuir and Weed representatives to perhaps form a three-town ambulance district.

Melo stated the fire district was willing to contribute \$1,200 a year towards the support and maintenance of an ambulance, if the plans go through, to supplement assistance from the cities. An ambulance can be obtained through Civil Defense. He also said the police department was the logical group to handle ambulance service as it has direct contact with California Highway Patrol and an alarm system was preferable to a standby system in the operation. A complete report will be ready for the next chamber meeting. Members endorsed the program 100 per cent.

Dr. William B. Strickland, president of the board of directors, and William Smith, administrator, Mount Shasta Community Hospital, have stated the hospital would house the ambulance and keep it equipped with oxygen, linen, medical supplies, and a resuscitator.

Melo also told the group that E. A. Christensen of Shasta Dairy Locker and Ice Company, Dunsuir, had absorbed the entire cost of printing and production of 10,000 ice-litter bags, advertising Southern Siskiyou County, and to be distributed throughout the community.

In other business, M. W. Tonkin, chairman of the Merchants Committee, announced plans for a town-wide Dollar Day promotion sale on May 31 and June 1. Plans are under way to form a United Merchants Association.

It was decided to have a representative from the chamber present at Board of Supervisors meetings whenever an issue the chamber is interested in is involved. James P. Hennessy Jr. reported signs on the highway in town indicating the route to the hospital had been erected.

In further business, Gino Marconi, Martin Cooper, James Shiro, and Hennessy were appointed to investigate legislative bills or action relative to the lumber industry and recreation in this vicinity. It was announced that Mount Shasta will have its annual July 4 fireworks display and will sponsor a booth at Siskiyou County Fair next fall. On July 28, Mount Shasta will be represented in the Lumberjack Fiesta parade in McCloud, with a float, possibly the 1913 fire truck, Lulu Belle.

The meeting was conducted by the president, David E. Otis, and a large group attended. Next meeting at which various committees will give reports is scheduled for May 9 at the Lamplighter at noon.

Cashiered Marine Officer Claims Spy Caught Prowling

WASHINGTON (UPI) — One of four Marine officers thrown out of the corps for involvement in the slaying of a Cuban spy at Guantanamo said Saturday the Castro agent was discovered prowling around a restricted powder magazine.

Details of the incident were given newsmen Saturday by former Lt. William A. Szili who said the only thing he did wrong was get caught helping Capt. Arthur J. Jackson dispose of the body.

News stories Friday said Jackson shot the suspected agent, Ruben Lopez, in self-defense.

The Defense Department has declined comment on the shooting incident of October, 1961, and its aftermath that saw Jackson, Szili and two other officers forced out of the Marine Corps.

But Szili, a 31-year-old Pennsylvanian, told newsmen he probably would decide again, as he and Jackson did to dispose of the slain Cuban's body without making any report.

They did so, with the help of two other officers and three enlisted men, he said.

Szili said he was thrown out of the corps without presentation of charges despite his plea for trial.

Szili gave this account: Jackson, his superior officer, caught Lopez, a Cuban bus driver employed on the base, in a restricted powder magazine area on Leeward Point near the fence separating Guantanamo from Cuban territory.

The time was around midnight, and the area was one where the Cuban had no business.

He and Jackson arrested the Cuban, and sought to turn him over to base police. The base police, however, declined to take the man into custody or make

charges against him. They told Szili and Jackson to take Lopez to the gate and release him.

They found the gate jammed by a defective latch, he said. He went for a sledgehammer to get it open. While he was gone, Jackson was attacked by the Cuban and fired in self-defense. The body at that point had fallen over a cliff onto rocks beside the sea.

By this time the sound of the shot had attracted base guards and others. He and Jackson decided that international complications might result and that their best course was to say nothing until they could talk the matter over.

Later, they decided that their initial decision was right. With the help of the two other officers and three enlisted men they recovered the body, left it be found by a Cuban patrol, and buried it secretly on the naval base.

Szili said he and Jackson decided against reporting the incident to their superiors because they feared Fidel Castro would whip the matter into an international propaganda barrage.

Prompt Treatment Can Prevent Cancer Deaths

About 25,000 women will die of breast cancer—the leading cause of death from cancer among women—during 1963.

Although the figure is alarming, this great loss of life could be largely prevented, Mrs. John Dickinson, chairman of the Klamath County Unit of the American Cancer Society, disclosed Friday.

April has been designated as the month of the American Cancer Society's annual fund drive.

The cancer society says that 82 per cent of all breast cancer patients are saved when the disease is detected and treated while it is still localized. If the cancer has spread to other regions, the chance of cure is only 48 per cent.

According to the Klamath County Medical Society, "treatment too late" is the chief cause of death from breast cancer today.

They added that "women should realize that their best protection is to alert themselves about the disease so they can be treated at the earliest possible moment."

Because the possibility of cure in cancer of the breast is so great, the Klamath County Medical Society stresses two protective actions to be taken by women:

1. Self-examination of the breasts once a month for possible irregularities or lumps.
2. A health checkup once a year, including an examination of the breasts by a physician.

The American Cancer Society has published a leaflet on breast self-examination which illustrates the steps to be taken to discover possible thickening or lumps in the breast. The society will send a copy free upon request.

Also, the society has produced a film for women which illustrates the techniques involved in

self-examination. The society will arrange to show the film before any women's group wishing to see it and also provide a physician to answer questions.

The Klamath County Medical Society said that any thickening or lump in the breast "calls for an immediate examination by a physician."

The society explained that breast cancer, once considered an almost hopeless disease, is potentially highly curable. "More breast cancers are being detected early when they are most curable," the society said.

"A great deal, however, depends upon the woman herself. A physician can be of no help unless he is given a chance. A few precautions by a woman can increase the odds which are already in her favor."

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — A young Navy wife, who started a collection for the families of victims from the submarine Thresher, said Saturday she has received \$174.

Mrs. Louise Sebasta, 23, who started the fund drive the day af-

ter the atomic submarine sank, said she received some encouraging responses from groups in California and Texas that would like to aid in the drive.

"The biggest problem is that people think each crewman was insured for \$10,000," she said, explaining the government ended its insurance coverage for servicemen in 1957.

Mrs. Sebasta, whose husband, Frank, is a sonarman aboard the Polaris submarine Thomas Jefferson, said the money will be given to the navy chaplain who has charge of the area where families of the Thresher's crew live.

May 10 is the deadline for entries. In the future the Cow Belles plan to award one \$100 scholarship a year, and the deadline will be May 1 from now on. The award is planned as part of the association's annual program.
