

Red Leader Plans Visit In Cambodia

TOKYO (UPI)—Red China announced Saturday that Chairman Liu Shao-chi will visit North Viet Nam and Cambodia.

At almost the same time, the chief of staff of China's Red Army, Gen. Lo Jui-ching, warned that events in Laos are of "grave concern" to the Peking government.

The brief announcement by Radio Peking that Liu was going to Cambodia and North Viet Nam did not say when the visits would take place.

Gen. Lo, who also holds the rank of vice-premier in the Peking government, declared Red China "cannot but show grave concern about the U. S. imperialist scheme directing the Laotian reactionaries to kindle new flames of war."

New China news agency said the Red army chief warned the United States that "your scheme of war provocation certainly will meet with ignominious failure as they have in the past."

The announcement that Liu is going on the road again underscores Red China's continuing intention to play a strong role in the Indo-Chinese peninsula.

North Viet Nam is a country ostensibly at peace, but actually deeply involved in the support of Communist rebellions in South Viet Nam and Laos.

In the ideological quarrel between Russia and Red China, Hanoi's Communist rulers, headed by President Ho Chi-minh, have tried to stay on the fence.

The Chinese have given them repeated public assurances of Peking's backing in their adventures in South Viet Nam and Laos.

Liu has just returned to Peking from a diplomatic tour that took him to Indonesia and Burma.

In Cambodia, Liu will be on a fishing expedition.

Cambodian ruler Sihanouk has accepted economic aid from both sides in the cold war. The volatile prince sometimes has seemed to sympathize with the West sometimes with the Communist bloc.

Universities Censured For Firing Professors

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Firing of college professors at three schools has drawn the wrath of the American Association of University Professors.

The AAUP Friday voted to censure the University of Illinois in the case of Dr. Leo Koch; Grove City College in Pennsylvania for the discharge of Professor Larry Gary; and Alcorn Agricultural and Mechanical College of Lorman, Miss., for the dismissal of Professor Corinne T. Carpenter.

Dr. Koch was suspended in July of 1960 after writing a letter to the campus paper in which he condoned pre-marital intercourse for "those sufficiently mature to engage in it without social consequences and without violating their own codes of morality and ethics."

Two weeks after he was suspended by President David D. Henry, Koch was officially dismissed from the faculty by the Board of Trustees.

The professors, representing a membership of 35,000 at about 1,450 institutions, voted the censure at their 49th annual convention here Friday on the ground that the university showed "grave deficiencies in academic due process" and then resorted to the "drastic" measure of dismissal.

Dr. David Feldman, chairman of the Committee on Academic Freedom, submitted the committee's recommendation for censure which stated Koch was the victim as a "prejudgment" by the Illinois president, which "inescapably handicapped" the biology professor in stating his case.

In Urbana, Ill., Dr. David Dods Henry, president of the University of Illinois said today he had no comment regarding the AAUP's censure.

Dr. Gara, head of the history department at Grove City College, was informed last year that he would not be reappointed for 1962-63.

The college said it has no tenure program, but the association said that, under the standards it supports, Gara had tenure status and was subject to dismissal only for stated cause and a hearing offering academic due process.

Leaves Note

HOOD RIVER (UPI)—The Hood River County sheriff's office said Friday that a teen-age boy missing last Sunday from his home south of here may have taken a bus out of the area.

The office said that the bicycle belonging to James Thomas Akins, 16, Parkdale, was found on a knoll with a note attached saying he felt he should leave home and did not want anybody to come after him.

Colorado River Power Allocation Given Okay

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Interior Department today approved allocations of hydroelectric power to be generated by plants of the Colorado River Storage Project to more than 100 municipalities, government installations and cooperatives in Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming, Utah, Arizona, Nevada, and California.

The first block of power will be available in September. The allocations were made upon recommendations of the Bureau of Reclamation.

The allocations were made under marketing criteria approved March 9, 1962, by Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall. In general, they follow closely the tentative allocations of storage project power announced in January. The department said there were some minor changes in the tentative allocations originally suggested, because of comments received from potential customers.

As a result of the changes, customers in the Northern Division will receive a net increase of 5,750 kilowatts of winter season power over the previously announced allocations; and a net increase of 10,000 kilowatts in the summer season.

In the Southern Division, changes in individual allocations were accomplished with no net change in the total tentative amount of power to be marketed in the area.

The Northern Division of the marketing area includes all of Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. The Southern Division includes all of Arizona, the three southeastern counties of Nevada, and the areas of Southeastern California contiguous to the Lower Colorado River.

The market year is divided into summer and winter seasons to take advantage of the diversity of seasonal power requirements between the two divisions.

Allotments to both divisions total 994,750 kilowatts of power in the winter season, and 971,510 kilowatts in the summer. These amounts exceed the 961,000 kilowatts originally estimated as the firm capability of Colorado River Storage Project power plants by mid-1966. However, the generating capability of the CRSP's Curecanti Unit has been revised upward since the original estimate was made, and the extra allocations are further covered by the likelihood that some allotments in both divisions probably will not reach the contracting stage.

The Northern Division is to receive the bulk of CRSP power, with the Southern Division having a permanent allotment estimated at about 20 per cent of the project's summer capability and 7 per cent of its winter capability. However, the Northern Division now is unable to use its full entitlement, permitting larger blocks of power to be marketed in the Southern Division on a temporary basis. This power can be recaptured by the Northern Divisions, as needed, on three years' notice.

First CRSP power will come from the Flaming Gorge Power Plant in Northern Utah. Initial generation at Glen Canyon Power

Plant in Northern Arizona, which eventually will become the major power-producer of the system, is scheduled for June, 1964. Power from the Curecanti Unit on the Gunnison River in Colorado will not be available until the summer of 1966. Fontenelle Power Plant, on the Seedskadee Participating Project in Wyoming, will add a small block of power to the CRSP system beginning in 1965.

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African Peace Corps May Teach In America

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Peace Corps Director Sargent Shriver, just back from Africa, said Saturday he would like to see an African Peace Corps come to the United States.

He said Americans have an "amazing" ignorance about Africa, and that African teachers might be able to help correct this.

"There is a likelihood that Ghana might be interested in sending to the United States teachers of African culture, history," Shriver said in an interview.

Shriver returned Friday from an 11-day trip to Senegal, Sierra Leone, Liberia and Ghana.

Shriver, brother-in-law of President Kennedy, said he spent about 45 minutes with Ghanaian

President Kwame Nkrumah, whom he described as the first head of any foreign state to endorse the U. S. Peace Corps.

Shriver emphasized that the possibility of sending Ghanaian teachers to the United States was not discussed with Nkrumah but added:

"I personally think it would be desirable if they did come, and would not displace teachers here. I am sure they would not because we have a shortage of teachers in other cultures."

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Youth Held For Thefts

TOPEKA, Kan. (UPI)—A 26-year-old bandit caught here Friday who admitted a spree of robberies that spanned half the United States was held in city jail today on \$15,000 bond.

Lourence Hilton Morris, Jr., was apprehended at Topeka's municipal airport Friday afternoon less than 20 minutes after one of the town's banks was robbed of \$7,500. The money was recovered and Morris signed a statement admitting the robbery.

Police said Morris' tale of banditry stretching from Seattle, Wash., to Dallas, Tex., and Topeka appeared to be substantially the truth. On the basis of information supplied by Morris, detectives estimated he netted about \$2,000 in robberies in recent months.

Morris admitted committing robberies in Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Fair Sex Admitted

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (UPI)—Texas A&M College today gave in to the fair sex and agreed to admit women students on a limited basis starting June 1.

The school's board of directors voted to open the college to women ending 92 years of tradition as a military and mechanical college for men.

Clyde Thompson of Diboll, a member of the board, said women students will be admitted to the graduate school and the school of veterinary medicine. Wives and daughters of faculty members, of students in residents and women staff members will be admitted to the undergraduate program.

There are some 1,000 married male students attending Texas A&M.

The board was unanimous in its decision to admit women.

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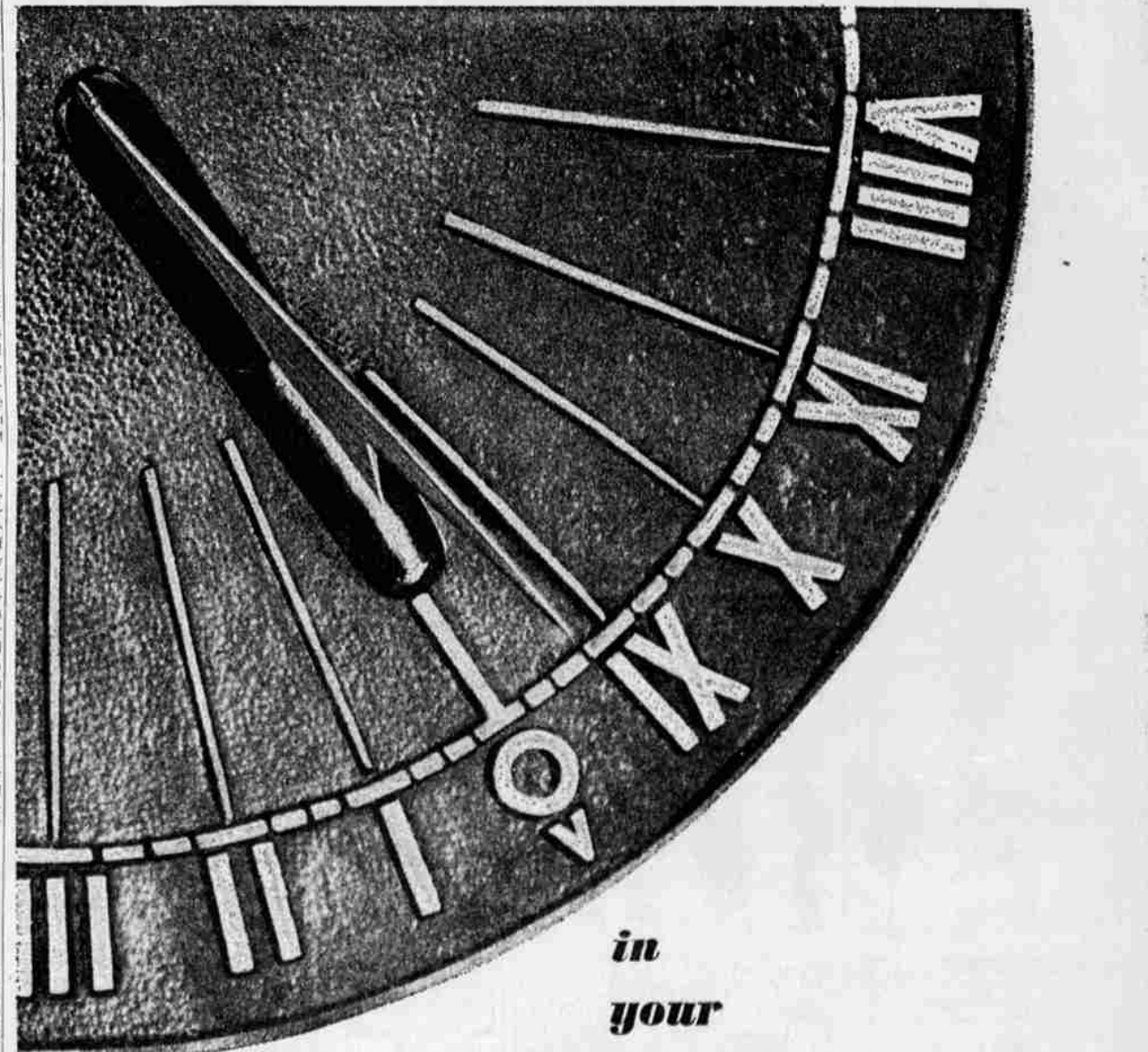
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
