School Boards Eye Date For Election

The city elementary and county district school boards failed to agree Monday night on a mutually acceptable date for an election on the proposed plan for a single county-wide school district for Klamath County.

At Monday night's joint board meeting at the city school administration building the county board members unanimously agreed that May 27 would be the best date for the election.

Paul Fairbro, acting county board chairman, said the county wants to get the election over as soon as possible so they can move ahead with their building program immediately if the proposed reorganization fails to get the support of the people.

The city board members decided to postpone their decision on an election date until a special board meeting to be called at the earliest possible time. The board decided not to act in the absence of board member, Mrs. Clara E. Moore.

If the May 27 date was agreed on by both boards, and in the event that the majority of the voters in both districts favor consolidation, the consolidation would be effective 30 days after the election, or June 25.

Arraignment Scheduled In Courts

Two people indicted Monday by the grand jury for first degree murder were scheduled for arraignments in Klamath County Circuit Courts sometime today, it developed following arraignments of six others charged with lesser crimes.

Zelma Joan Ochilho, 42, accused of the gun slaying of Florence Baker Huitt, 26, at the home of a friend on Commercial Street, March 19, appeared for arraignment in the court of Judge David R. Vandenberg this morning but the jurist transferred the matter to Judge Donald A. W. Piper's court.

On the other murder indictment, Judge Vandenberg continued the arraignment of Archie Emil Foster, accused of the gun slaying of Mrs. Richard Biss, 37, year-old Beatty woman, last April 22, until 2 p.m., today. Foster approached the bench this morning and advised the judge that his attorney practiced law in Salem and was not present in court.

The bailiff contacted the attorney and Judge Vandenberg reset the arraignment until this afternoon to permit the lawyer time to arrive here from Salem.

The judge also set 10 a.m. May 3 as the time he would receive entries of plea from five others indicted by the grand jury.

They were: Harvey Blevins, 21, 817 Main Street, and Raymond Orville Gregory, 27, 2610 Alamo Drive, charged with complicity in the burglary of a dwelling belonging to Gene Autry Sellers, 128 Martin Street; Ellis Ray Roach, 27, accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor on March 16; Russell Wayne Long, 22, attempting to cause an escape of a man taken into custody by a city policeman, April 23; John Arthur Phillips, 37, obtaining money and property by false pretense involving the issuing of a fictitious check during March of last year.

The other person arraigned was Esther Lotches, 29, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, who is to enter a plea to 10 a.m. Tuesday, May 7.

In circuit court Monday, Judge Vandenberg received a plea of not guilty from Byron Patti, charged with assault and battery by means likely to produce great bodily injury, and set Thursday, May 16, as the date for the trial.

In addition, the judge arraigned William J. Easter, accused of two counts of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and set Monday, May 6, for receiving an entry of plea from the defendant.

Vote Slated At Bonanza

BONANZA—A county director and two school board members will be elected at the Bonanza School on May 6. The polls will be open from 2 to 8 p.m.

Nominees for the position of county director are Ivan Bold and Louis Randall. The two vacancies on the local school board include the posts of Carolyn Dearborn, whose term expires, and Jean McFall, who was appointed.

Other issues on the ballot will be the measure to exceed the six per cent limitation and the measure to authorize a continuation of the serial levy.

Interchange Given Okay

DUNSMUIR — Acceptance of the Highway 99 interchange in north Dunsmuir and conversion of a portion of the highway from an expressway into a full freeway was advocated by the board of directors of the Dunsmuir Chamber of Commerce at its last meeting.

The board voted to conform to the thinking of the north Dunsmuir business people in approving the plan presented to the city council by the state division of highways last month. The downtown Merchants' Association has gone on record opposing any interchange construction for the next five years.

The chamber of commerce secretary has been asked to write Herbert Miles, district engineer, Redding, of the chamber's stand. The board voted to ask only for assurance of good lighting, good signing, and modifications of the plan to insure free-flowing traffic to all commercial areas of the city.

At the next chamber meeting, Wednesday, May 8, a new set of bylaws will be introduced and Leslie Lenton, president, will name a nominating committee to present a slate of candidates for the June chamber election.

AID FROM GOVERNOR CINCHES SIGN — Mrs. Irene Lupinski, operator of Irene and Lee's Cafe at Chemult, observes three letters she received from Gov. Sign At Weed Junction Supported By Governor

A chance meeting between Gov. Mark O. Hatfield and the operator of a Chemult cafe last March has resulted in an assurance from the California State Department of Highways that a billboard would be erected at Weed directing tourists to Portland via Highway 97—a project that various associations located along the highway have been promoting for a number of years.

Merchants along U.S. 97 in Klamath Falls and north of that city have claimed that the wording on the sign at the junction of Highways 97 and 99 has been diverting traffic from the Klamath Falls route to Highway 97 at a considerable loss to Eastern Oregon businesses.

One of the billboard messages shows an arrow directing traffic to Portland via Highway 99, while the other reads Highway 97 to Klamath Falls.

Businessmen along the Eastern Oregon route have argued that the route to Portland via Highway 97 is just as direct and more scenic than the other highway, but the wording on the present sign implies that the only way to reach Portland is via Highway 99. Merchants on the Eastern Oregon route have sought to urge California Department of Highways to include "Portland" on the U.S. 97 sign, as on the other.

Mrs. Irene Lupinski, operator of Irene and Lee's Cafe at Chemult, told the Herald and News that the subject of changing the sign at the Weed Junction was brought up accidentally during a conversation she had with the governor and his wife at the cafe last month. The governor and his party were southbound when they stopped at the cafe for refreshments, Mrs. Lupinski said.

Soon after, a member of the party introduced Mrs. Lupinski to the governor and the two began discussing a mutual friend, Grace Oliver Peck, state legislator for Multnomah County and a cousin of Mrs. Lupinski.

"Before I realized it, we were talking about the sign at the Weed Junction. The governor expressed considerable interest in the project and said that he would 'see what he could do,'" Mrs. Lupinski said.

About one week later Mrs. Lupinski received the first of three letters from the governor indicating that he was working in earnest on the project. Governor Hatfield wrote that he was interested in the project to program a new sign at Weed and promised to contact her when he "received a report on the project."

On April 12 she received another letter from the governor in which he enclosed correspondence from J. C. Womack, state highway engineer of the California State Highway Department.

Womack had written that erection of a sign at the junction of U.S. 99 and U.S. 97 at Weed was feasible, but added that the "highway department would have to re-examine the matter when the interstate freeway is completed and the permanent signing at the freeway interchange is effected."

Two weeks later Mrs. Lupinski received the last of three letters from Governor Hatfield which included another note from Womack, this one assuring the governor that the signing at the junction would be revised as recommended.

Womack wrote that "steps are being taken to change the sign at the junction of U.S. 99 and U.S. 97 to read, 'U.S. 99 and Portland' with a left arrow and 'Portland via Klamath Falls, U.S. 97' with a right arrow."

"Following the junction there will be a three-line sign indicating mileage to cities ahead which now include Portland on Route 99. We are taking steps to include the mileage to Portland on a comparable sign on Route 97," Womack concluded.

tribe, such rights may not be diminished or destroyed by Congressional action.

"Dates of valuation are crucial in this litigation for the reason that in the period between 1955 and 1961 (the date when the forest area was taken), timber values declined drastically.

"This is illustrated by the fact that in 1958 the realization value for the Klamath Reservation was appraised by a firm engaged by the management specialists at about \$121,000,000, while in 1962, the realization value, under the new appraisal, amounted to some \$80 million—a decline of about \$41 million. "It is against this background that counsel for members of the Crawford group argues that individuals must be compensated for the diminution of their vested interest caused by Congressional action delaying the sales of portions of the Klamath forests and other lands set aside for them."

The commissioner's "Recommendation and Conclusion of Law" establishes three pertinent factors:

A. The right of the individual Indian to sue in his own behalf.

B. The commissioner could find no statutory authority for the tribe to maintain the present suit; that provision was made to allow the tribe to continue to prosecute pending claims before the Indian Claims Commissioner.

C. No similar right is provided by the statute for the tribe to maintain suit in respect to claims arising under the termination legislation.

Contrary to the commissioner's conclusion, Donald C. Gormley requested the individual withdrawing member to sign an authorization designating them as their legal representative.

Gormley's letter to the withdrawing member states:

"We want you to know that we do not request any additional money from any member either for attorney fees or litigation expenses. These have been provided for in the contracts under which we already represent the tribe and its members."

Gormley's fee for the tribal suit he has filed in the court is a flat nine per cent of the recovery.

Wade Crawford stated to the press: "There is nothing for free under the sun. In my opinion, Gormley is soliciting clients and he has solicited some of Klamath's clients."

There is no authority in P.L. 587 which provides for "attorney fees" or "litigation expenses" for the individual member to sue in the Court of Claims.

Furthermore, there is no legislative act granted to the Secretary of the Interior to retain and control \$350,000 tribal funds by the secretary is arbitrary administrative action which will have to be adjudicated in the court. Neither can it be found anywhere, authority for the Secretary of the Interior to favor the Wilkinson law firm and pay "attorney fees" and "litigation expenses" of the individual withdrawing member.

Crawford stated in conclusion: "Thank God we live in the United States of America where we have courts of justice. Our attorneys are prepared to go through the Court of Claims in this case, if necessary, to the U.S. Supreme Court. There are finances available to do it, paid out of our own pockets."

Efforts of the group will center on the Christmas Store and the Christmas Clearing Bureau. The store, successfully operated in the past, permits parents to buy new clothing and toys for children on a point system.

The Clearing Bureau handles requests for aid and offers of assistance to coordinate efforts of organizations and individuals during the Christmas season.

Dr. Everett Peery, chairman of the Christmas Center Committee with Mrs. Isabelle Brinxer, conducted the meeting. Other members of the committee include: Norma French, Frances Hall, Myrtle Caldwell, Jack Lyons, Julius Guntioni and Capt. Dale Johnson. Ruth King will serve on publicity for the Herald and News.

Jack Lyons will chairman publicity. Myrtle Caldwell will chair the committee for the Christmas Store. Guntioni will be in charge of the toy division; Mrs. French, clothing and Mrs. Hall will represent the Clearing Bureau.

The next meeting of the Christmas Center Committee will be June 3 at Molitor's.

Deadline Set On Absentee School Vote

Harold Ashley, city school clerk, reminded residents who will be out of town, May 6, the date of the school board election, that they must apply for absentee ballots no later than Wednesday, May 1.

Application must be made at Ashley's office in the school Administration Building, 475 South Alameda Avenue.

Dale Goode, county school clerk, said application for absentee ballots in the county district must also be made within five days preceding the election, or on or before Wednesday. The county district school offices are in the Klamath County Courthouse.

Residents who wish to vote on an absentee ballot must be registered voters in their respective districts prior to April 6 and must be legal residents of the district at least six months prior to the election.

There are two ways residents can get absentee ballots after the normal five day limitation before the election. In case of emergency a sworn affidavit must be filed with the school clerk any time prior to the election date, and on the day of election a resident can vote on an absentee ballot if a physical disability certificate signed by a doctor is filed with the clerk on that day.
