Keller Absorbs Heartbreaking Loss On Homers

Oregon Tech and Southern Oregon College locked horns in a typical rival baseball game at Gem Stadium Tuesday. The game had all the ingredients of a Floyd Patterson - Ingemar Johansson fight. It was a farce at times and a real Pier Six brawl at other moments.

Incidentally, the final score found the Red Raiders on the long end of a 15-14, but it took them 13 innings (that's right) to win the game.

It took back-to-back home runs by Bill Bailey and Manard Frank in the top of the 13th inning to pull the game out of the fire for the dazed Red Raiders who had

led by as much as 12-1 at one point in the game.

The Owls staged one of the most amazing comebacks seen at Gem Stadium in many moons when they clawed their way back from almost impossible odds only to lose in the fatal and, for Oregon Tech, unlucky 13th. But they almost pulled the game out even then when Marv Edwards, the Owl batting hero, slammed a

home over the leftfield screen to send the Owl hopes soaring once again.

It was a real heartbreaking loss for Jim Keller who lost his first league game. He came on in relief in the first inning and went the rest of the way. Coach Jim Parlow started Don Gresdel to pull the game out of the fire for the dazed Red Raiders who had

getting only one out. Keller took charge on the mound and after a couple of shaky innings, settled down to pitch very good ball until the back-to-back homers in the 13th when he was so tired he could hardly lift his right wing.

Dave Hughes, the mound mainstay of the Red Raiders, got the win. It took a good effort on his part, also. The brilliant SOC athlete caught the first nine innings and pitched the final four frames to gain the nod. The Red Raiders used four hurlers.

There were 32 hits in the game and exactly half of those bases were for extra bases. There were five home runs hit in the contest, three by Oregon Tech and the first three this season. Ed Appleman and Don Gres-

del hit the other two. There were five doubles and six triples.

The Owls, while trailing 12-1 going into the bottom of the sixth, raked relief hurler Larry Carr and Bob Burwell for six runs in that frame. They knotted the score with three runs in the seventh and three more in the ninth after the Red Raiders had tallied one other in the top of the ninth.

The three runs in the ninth was anticlimactic in itself to tie the game. Edwards walked and Dennis Carlson and John Crumrine made outs and the cause seemed hopeless. But Curt Graf got his third hit of the day, a triple, to score Edwards. Gresdel then slammed Burwell's three-two pitch over the leftfield barrier for a two-run homer to tie the game. The Owls loaded the bases up again but couldn't score.

The 10th, 11th and 12th innings were fast ones and well played ones. Keller was saved in a couple of spots by some great fielding. Gresdel made a sensational catch in center and Edwards a great stop at third.

The Owls blew their chances in the 11th probably. With two out Gresdel tried a double to leftfield. He laced it stretch it to third when he saw the fielder hobble the ball. But he was cut down at third and the all important runner at second became the third out.

Knicks Draft Heyman, Harkness Into Pro Fold

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Knickerbockers have taken measures toward quitting the National Basketball Association cellar by landing blue-ribboned catches Art Heyman of Duke and Jerry Harkness of Loyola's NCAA champions in the annual college draft.

The teams selected in inverse order of the finish during the regular season, New York picking first and Boston last.

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Heyman and Harkness, both All-Americans and natives of the New York area, were two of 63 collegians selected by the nine NBA clubs Tuesday in one of the briefest draft round-ups in league history.

The teams went through seven rounds before calling it quits. The Knicks, with the worst record in the league last season, had first crack at the pickings and selected Heyman of Rockville Centre, N.Y. Harkness, of the Bronx, was on tap when the second round opened and the Knicks promptly nabbed the 6-2 star.

Coach Ed Donovan of the Knicks rated Harkness good defensively and a player who rarely takes a bad shot.

Player Of Year
Donovan then heaped praise on the 6-5 Heyman, the United Press International college Player of the Year for 1963.

"He's a fine playmaker," Donovan chortled with enthusiasm. "He should fit right into our backcourt."

The Cincinnati Royals was the only club to exercise its territorial draft rights, selecting All-America Tom Thacker of the University of Cincinnati and thus giving up their regular first round draw.

The Zephyrs, whose franchise was shifted from Chicago to Baltimore for the 1963-64 campaign, drafted Rod Thorn of West Virginia in the first round. San Francisco then picked Nate Thurmond, 6-11 Bowling Green center, and Detroit chose Eddie Miles of Seattle University.

St. Louis grabbed Jerry Ward of Boston College and Syracuse claimed Tom Hoover of Villanova, whose college class became eligible for the draft this year.

Los Angeles, Western Division champion, picked up Roger Strickland, a small college All-American from Jacksonville (Fla.)

Simmons Pitches Cards Into NL's First Place

Take all those reports that Curt Simmons is washed up, wring thoroughly and then hang them out to dry.

Someone apparently made out the wrong laundry ticket on the 23-year-old St. Louis Cardinals' southpaw.

Simmons underwent the first crisis of his career when he mangled two toes on his left foot while moving his front lawn in 1963.

Some felt he was through when he was sent back to the minors in 1959 and most experts were sure of it when he drew his unconditional release in 1960 after 13 seasons with the Phillies.

But along comes this same Simmons with his fourth straight victory Tuesday night and pitches the Cardinals into first place in the National League by beating the Milwaukee Braves, 2-1.

The veteran left-hander no longer owns the blazing fast ball that brought him a \$65,000 bonus from the Phils 16 years ago but he still has enough stuff to make the Cards happy they signed him as a free agent three seasons back.

Allows Four Hits

Simmons limited the Braves to four hits and fanned eight in going the distance for the fourth time. His current 4-0 start is in keeping with his break from the barrier last year when he won his first five straight games.

Bothered by arm trouble down through the years, Simmons was hardly bothered at all by the Braves as he turned in the 14th.
