

Special Programs Cut From Basic School Aid

SALEM (UPI) — The Senate Education Committee Tuesday stripped special programs from the basic school support fund, changed the school census age and rejected a plan to place the basic school fund on a biennial appropriation basis.

The bill was forwarded to the Ways and Means Committee with the recommendation that the amount of basic school support be increased.

Ways and Means will determine the amount of any increase.

The Senate Education Committee made six policy decisions regarding the state's basic school support program:

—Maintain the present continuing appropriation.

—Maintain the present equalization features.

Red Fights Over Merits Of Doctrine

FREDERICKSBURG, Va. (UPI) — A museum executive and a Soviet diplomat verbally clashed over the merits of the Monroe Doctrine Tuesday during a tour of the James Monroe Memorial Foundation.

Lawrence G. Hoes, foundation president and a great grandson of Monroe, presented a copy of the doctrine to Ignor Kolosovskiy, counselor at the Soviet Embassy in Washington, and asked that it be given to Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The Russian told him that the Monroe Doctrine, pledging American might against foreign imperialism in this hemisphere, was "completely dead," said Hoes.

"I told him the doctrine is very, very much alive," Hoes said, and handed the document to Kolosovskiy.

"Mr. Kolosovskiy was very, very startled," Hoes said. "Then he managed a smile and took the copy."

The museum official said he told the Russian that "it was the Monroe Doctrine that got your missiles out of Cuba."

"He sort of recoiled as if I'd socked him," Hoes said.

He said he told another member of the party of 40 to 50 persons he believed the doctrine eventually would force Russia out of Cuba.

"Well, we'll let history be the judge," the Russian replied.

Firm Plans Expansion

PORTLAND (UPI) — Plans for a \$3 million expansion program were announced today by OMARK Industries, Inc.

John D. Gray, president, said manufacturing operations would be consolidated in a new 200,000-square foot plant in nearby Milwaukie. Work will start late this year.

Gray said present facilities would be sold. He said growth of the company's business volume has outstripped capacity of the present facilities.

OMARK now has more than 800 employees, including 475 in Oregon. Sales exceeded \$15 million in the fiscal year ending last June 30.

The firm started in 1947 and has grown into one which manufactures saw chain products, tools, welding equipment and diamond blades and drills. OMARK also has plants in Canada and Sweden.

Vandals Break Tractor Gauges

'Citizens' Party Talked By Romney

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Michigan Gov. George Romney said today the nation desperately needs a "citizens" political party that will not be limited to the views of business, labor, or any other single group.

"This is the basic route we must take if we are going to save America from federalization," the Michigan Republican told the annual meeting of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

Romney said businessmen should become involved in politics "as citizens—not as businessmen."

"We need a political party that is going to say to business if business is wrong, 'you're wrong,' and if labor is wrong, 'you're wrong,'" Romney said.

"We desperately need in this country a party that the people will identify as a citizen's party, that is controlled and financed by the citizens."

Delegates to the chamber's 51st annual meeting stood and applauded the Michigan governor both before and after his address.

Walter F. Carey, the chamber official who presided, introduced Romney as the man who "personifies the kind and quality of personal responsibility that marks this country's real strength."

The Michigan governor stressed that government is becoming involved in too many activities which should be left to the individual. This, he said, actually is retarding individual responsibility.

"We are beginning to realize that some of the problems that we are trying to solve with this massive government can't be solved this way," Romney said. "To reverse this trend in this country we've got to find more citizens who are willing to involve themselves in helping others," Romney said.

He said another problem of contemporary society is the capacity of "massive employers and union bargaining groups" to shut down the industry of the nation if they get involved in a dispute.

"This conflict in national economic policy must be removed if we are going to have adequate economic growth," Romney added.

Jayne Mansfield Back In Pink Love Palace

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Actress Jayne Mansfield was back home in her "pink palace built for love" today—minus a husband.

The glittering blonde returned with her rumored third husband, Nelson Sordelli, after signing a "quickie" divorce papers Tuesday in red ink in Juarez, Mexico. The divorce from Hungarian strongman Mickey Hargitay took five minutes.

Miss Mansfield and Sordelli, a multi-lingual singer-actor of Italian extraction born in Brazil, flew together from Texas to Mexico and then on to Los Angeles the same day. They had spent the night with Miss Mansfield's stepfather and mother in Dallas.

But the pair dodged questions from newsmen about when, and if, they would marry.

"I only got my divorce several hours ago," said Miss Mansfield after stepping from a jetliner carrying her pet chihuahua, "Gallina." "I think it's a little premature to say anything now, don't you?"

Sordelli was more effusive in his remarks at the time of the Juarez divorce.

"We love each other and hope to marry," he was quoted as saying.

"She plays on the strings of my heart," Sordelli told Judge Miguel Gomez Guerra of the First Civil Court that she and Hargitay already had made a property settlement and arranged for custody of their two children, Miklos, 4, and Zoltan, 2.

Miss Mansfield also has a daughter, Jayne Marie, 12, by her first husband Paul Mansfield, a public relations man. The children, she said, would "live with me, darling."

Miss Mansfield, who gave her age as 28, divorced Hargitay, 32, on grounds of incompatibility. She said she simply could not get along with him.

Land Probe Claim Denied

SALEM (UPI) — Investigation into subdivision land promotion in Oregon was started some time ago, a state official said Tuesday.

Nunn issued a statement following a charge by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton that the governor has refused to give him authority to investigate.

Nunn said the probe was started by Oregon Real Estate Commissioner Robert Jensen. "The governor long ago directed... Jensen to make any investigation necessary and to report any apparent violation of existing statutes to the attorney general," Nunn said.

"The investigation showed the current problem is one of lack of adequate regulatory law," he said.

Fire Destroys Market In Stewart-Lenox Area

Fire of undetermined origin broke out in Andy's Market on the Green Springs Highway about 2:30 a.m. today engulfing the building in flames and threatening to set afire another market and other buildings located across the street from the burning structure, the Stewart-Lenox Fire Department has reported.

Firemen received the report of fire at 2:50 a.m. and arrived at the scene about three minutes later, but it was already too late to save the building, it was said.

As firemen arrived in front of the grocery, flames burst through the roof amid a roaring "whoosh" of air.

The heat from the flames was so intense that it cracked windows in buildings located across the street from the burning building. When it became apparent that the grocery was a total loss, firemen turned their hoses on other buildings nearby to prevent them from igniting as a result of the intense heat.

Firemen were also alarmed that three gasoline pumps located in front of the store would explode, but the explosion never came off.

Frank Snyder, a Stewart-Lenox fireman, said he drove past the store about 2:20 a.m. and saw no evidence of flames at that time.

The full crew of the Stewart-Lenox Fire Department — consisting of approximately 20 men — were summoned to the fire and received assistance from a crew and truck dispatched by the county fire department.

The first report of the fire came from either a timekeeper at the Weyerhaeuser Company or a grocery clerk who observed the flames from his apartment nearby.

Andy Zudell, part-owner of the store, was believed to have been out of town when the fire started. A reliable source stated that it was the third time fire had been reported at the store in recent years.

In another fire, a crew from the Klamath Falls substation was dispatched to 2882 Radcliffe Avenue in the Shasta View Housing Project, where a chimney fire was reported blazing. Firemen extinguished the blaze which resulted in no damage, it was said.

Navy Fights Meningitis

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — Two medical experts were at the Naval training Center here today to aid in combating an outbreak of meningitis which has claimed 17 victims since March 9. Three have died.

The two latest cases were detected Tuesday morning, shortly before the arrival of Cmdr. Jack W. Millar, director of the preventive medicine branch of the Navy Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, and Dr. Carl Silverman of the Public Health Service Communicable Disease Center at Atlanta, Ga.

The latest outbreak came only a few days after Navy doctors claimed 100 per cent effectiveness for a newly instituted mass medication program. All recruits at the base were required to take sulfadiazine tablets under close supervision.

In another effort to combat the disease, the Navy Tuesday reduced the number of recruits living in each barracks by half. The moving of about 4,250 men was expected to be completed today.
