NEW YORK (UPI) — Kenneth Ward of Hayden, Stone & Co. says that although the Dow-Jones Industrial Average has picked up about 20 points, and the rails average has picked up about 10 points in the past ten trading days, the market has given no indication of having reached a top.		
Ward considers the "new momentum" being generated among many relatively unexploited groups and individual stocks "as continuing to keep the over-all upward trend very much in force."		
G. S. Colby of Colby & Co. Inc. sees the market as "a little overbought," although, he points out, it is as yet unconfirmed by reliable technical indicators. He looks for the market to "become more irregular, or undergo a price correction that will be somewhere between the limits of minor and secondary importance."		
The Spear & Staff Science & Electronics investment letter says that while science stocks as a whole have been lagging behind the rest of the market, the recent strong action of the aerospace and other selected issues indicates a reawakening of investor interest. It continues to feel that the interest will carry over and spark a broader advance in the group later in the year.

Ousted Marine Officer Declines JFK Invitation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Marine captain ousted from the Corps for the shooting and secret burial of a suspected Cuban spy has declined attending a White House reception for Medal of Honor winners for fear his presence would embarrass the President, it was announced today.

The White House said, however, he would always be welcome there.

Capt. Arthur J. Jackson, San Jose, Calif., said in a telegram to President Kennedy that his presence at the White House "at this time might possibly be an embarrassment to you." The telegram was released today by Pierre Salinger, White House press secretary.

Jackson previously had accepted the invitation to the reception Thursday evening along with nearly 250 other Medal of Honor winners. About 45 others previously declined invitations.

"We respect his decision," Salinger said. "Capt. Jackson and his wife will always be welcome at the White House."

Jackson told Kennedy, "I have the highest regard for you and your office and sincerely hope you'll understand why we must decline your kindness." The telegram ended "With deep regret, Arthur J. Jackson."

Jackson and three other Marine officers were reported to have been forced out of the service for their alleged part in the Castro spy incident in September, 1961, at Guantanamo Naval Base in Cuba.

Jackson's telegram was sent from Campbell, Calif., Tuesday. Until the White House announced this morning that it had received the telegram, it had been understood that Jackson was coming.

Jackson, 38, is the father of five children.

The reception for Medal of Honor holders, to be held on the south lawn of the White House, is an annual affair.

Jackson won the Medal of Honor for bravery during retaking of the island of Peleliu from the Japanese during World War II.

Supervisor Takes High School Post

Howard Bingham, who has been county school supervisor of secondary education for the last six years, will be leaving Klamath Falls at the end of the school year to accept the post of principal at Myrtle Creek High School.

Cliff Robinson, county school superintendent, said Bingham has been an excellent supervisor and has shown leadership that fostered a number of improvements in the school district.

Bingham will certainly be missed in the county school district, Robinson said. The superintendent indicated he plans to fill the post from among the district's supervisors.

A native of Utah, Bingham took his B.S. at Utah State and his M.S. at the University of Utah.

His first teaching post after schooling was that of English teacher at Bly High School. He was at Bly three years before he was given the post of supervisor.

As secondary school supervisor, Bingham's duties were to supervise the classroom activities in the secondary schools and coordinate the athletic, speech and science programs on the high school level.

Bingham also supervised the children from Kingsley Field and was chairman of the Able and Gifted Children Committee.

He said he has become very attached to the Klamath area, its people, climate and scenery and he is reluctant to leave, but he indicated he always has planned to go into administration and couldn't pass up this opportunity.

Myrtle Creek High is a four-year school with about 400 students. The town's population is about 2,450.

Bingham has a wife and four children and is a member of the LDS Church. He is now serving on the church's Stake High Council.

Nurse Back From OLPNA Conference

Mrs. Helen Dwyer, Klamath Falls, president of the Oregon Licensed Practical Nurses Association, has returned from Portland where she attended a meeting of the OLPNA, National Federation Representative Harriet Meggatt of New York City was present for the sessions.

The 1964 National convention is to be held in Portland.

With the critical shortage of nursing personnel today, and in the future, the delegates were interested in the recommendation of a greatly expanded program of federal aid to nursing education, service and research as published in a report released recently by the Public Health Service, U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare.

The publication entitled, "Toward Quality in Nursing—Needs and Goals," is the report of the Surgeon General's Consultant Group on Nursing, of which two members are licensed practical nurses: Mrs. Lillian E. Kuster of New York City, and Mrs. Mildred Lipstauer of Cleveland, Ohio.

The report points out "that the need for both professional and practical nurse services far exceeds the supply to such an extent that hospitals are employing nurse's aides, many of whom have insufficient training." This has produced an alarming dilution of the quality of service," the report indicates.

In some hospitals the use of auxiliary workers has reached such extreme proportions that nursing aides give as much as 80 per cent of the direct services.

The practical nurse training provisions of the George-Barden Act have been extended to 1963, authorizing \$5 million a year, and the Manpower and Development and Training Act of 1962 provides additional aid for practical nurse education.

"On the basis of the limited knowledge of age distribution of practical nurses," the report explains, "it can be estimated that there will be approximately 330,000 licensed practical nurses in 1970. Such a supply would make possible a considerable shifting of care from marginally trained aides to licensed practical nurses. To the extent, however, that the goal for professional nurses is not achieved, the demand for well prepared licensed practical nurses will be substantially larger."

The Consultant Group strongly supports the position of the nursing profession that no person should be permitted to practice nursing for compensation without a license.

Four Face Circuit Court Arraignment After Grand Jury Indictment Tuesday

Four people named on indictments returned by the Klamath County grand jury to Judge David R. Vandenberg in circuit court late yesterday, were arraigned by the same jurist in court early today.

In its report yesterday, the grand jury returned one true bill and three secret indictments.

Arraigned in court today were William J. Easter, named on a true bill charging him with obtaining money by false pretense, and three others charged with the larceny of two saddles and personal property belonging to Louis Hutchinson. The trio includes Wilbur Hixson, 42; Thelma Huitt, 26; and Perry Chocknot, 30, all of whom appeared before Judge Vandenberg and were instructed to enter a plea to the alleged larceny, 10 a.m. Wednesday, May 8. The arraignment of a fourth person named on the indictment, Everett Decker, 19, was continued until later.

Easter, accused of filing a fraudulent claim in the amount of \$125 to a fire insurance company last Feb. 25, was instructed to enter a plea to the complaint 10 a.m. Monday, May 6.

Named on the second of three secret indictments was Wilma Williams, 15, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon which developed after she threatened State Police Officer Larry Bergmann with a loaded rifle as he sought to arrest her brother, Archie Emil Foster, Wednesday, April 24. Foster was sought in connection with the gun slaying of Mrs. Richard Biss, 57-year-old.

Besty woman, and was indicted by the grand jury on first degree murder earlier this week.

Miss Williams appeared in court with the others today, but Judge Vandenberg transferred her arraignment to the court of Judge Donald A. W. Piper, who was presiding on another case at the time.

The other secret indictment returned by the grand jury has not yet been served, the sheriff's office has reported.

In court yesterday afternoon, Esther Lotches, 39, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, was released on \$1,500 bond after Judge Vandenberg reduced bail from \$3,500 upon the recommendation of the district attorney.

The attorney for Mrs. Lotches requested the reduction in bail during her arraignment in court Tuesday morning, but Judge Vandenberg instructed the lawyer to obtain a written statement signed by the district attorney requesting the decrease in bond. The attorney obtained the signed statement and presented it to the judge later that afternoon, when the bond was reduced.

Green County, Wis., to take a prisoner into custody, Sheriff Britton said he had not been presented with the formal charges outlined on the complaint and was not prepared to comment on them at that time.
