

## School Room Lack Blamed On Federals

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said today the Federal Office of Education simply will not let the nation overcome its school classroom shortage.

He accused the office of "manufacturing" figures to show the existence of a shortage in order to drum up support for federal aid to education.

Goldwater made the charge in testimony before a Senate labor and public welfare subcommittee which is conducting hearings on President Kennedy's \$3 billion education bill.

The Arizona Republican, a prospective candidate for next year's GOP presidential nomination, said the massive federal aid sought by the administration is not needed. States and local school districts have been rapidly meeting education needs, he said, but the Office of Education refuses to recognize this and continues to turn out "propaganda" aimed at increasing federal control.

SALEM (UPI) — Senate President Ben Musa Tuesday hinted this could become the longest legislative session in state history.

Regarding constitutional revision, Musa said "It looks like the choice may be either to delay the session, or do nothing..."

## Long Session Forecast

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Tuesday rejected a move to bar payment of federal funds to schools still segregated on the basis of race.

The action came on a 79-25 non-record vote and after debate of only 10 minutes.

Rep. William Pitts Ryan, D-N.Y., proposed the ban as an amendment to a \$3.3 billion appropriation bill for the Labor Department and the Health, Education and Welfare Department.

Ryan's amendment would have applied to a sum of about \$128 million carried in the bill to finance continued federal contributions to construction and operation of schools in which are enrolled children of military personnel who live on military bases.

A broader program of federal aid to other so-called "impacted" school districts was not covered by Tuesday's bill or by Ryan's amendment.

In considering the bill, the House was scheduled to act on proposed phony cuts of at least \$104 million in President Kennedy's budget, plus some reductions that could actually save money.

The bogus budget cuts help Congress establish an economy record without cutting off any federal services that might bring complaints from the voters.
