

U.S. Totals Flu Deaths At 40,000

ATLANTA, Ga. (UPI) — The chief statistician for the U.S. Communicable Disease Center said today a report that 40,000 persons were killed by the recent flu epidemic in this country "probably was a conservative estimate."

Dr. Robert E. Serfling said actual figures on deaths caused by influenza are not available. But based on preliminary reports from 100 selected cities "it would appear that between 40,000 and 50,000 deaths are directly connected with the recent flu epidemic," he said.

Another spokesman for CDC pointed out that this would make the winter of 1962-63 the worst as far as deaths in the United States are concerned since the winter of 1957-58 when the nation suffered its first Asian flu epidemic.

He said that excess deaths attributed to influenza totaled only 2,000 in 1961-62 when "Type B" rather than Asian flu hit the country.

"The report of 40,000 flu deaths is, at this stage, only a guess—but, in my opinion, an accurate one, possibly on the conservative side," Serfling said.

It was pointed out that many of these deaths were caused in part by other diseases which were aggravated by flu.

"Most deaths attributed to influenza involve persons with chronic diseases, as of the heart," a spokesman said. "This is why we try to get persons with chronic diseases to have flu shots."

Debt Limit Plan Okayed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Treasury today accepted a Republican proposal to re-define the national debt so Congress won't have to raise the legal debt limit until late summer.

The Treasury told key lawmakers that the new definition would enable it to operate until Sept. 1 under a debt limit of \$304 billion—\$1 billion less than the present temporary ceiling.

But in accepting the GOP proposal, Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon took pains to emphasize to a closed meeting of the House Ways and Means Committee that the Treasury had not proposed the plan.

Dillon apparently felt new approach might be regarded by some as a Houdini-like escape trick designed to fool the public. Although the new approach will make it easier for the administration to win congressional approval of urgently needed new debt ceiling legislation, it was proposed by Rep. John W. Byrnes, R-Wis., for an entirely different reason.

Byrnes felt the new approach would enable Congress to use the debt limit to put a check rein on spending without interfering with the Treasury's need to borrow money when market conditions are favorable. Many lawmakers agreed.

Under the plan the Treasury would subtract the cash it has on hand from the outstanding debt in computing the debt subject to legal limit.

According to the Treasury's latest calculation, the debt stood at \$304.3 billion on April 24 and cash on hand was \$5.4 billion. Under the new definition, the debt would have been computed at \$298.9 billion.

Unions Said Hypocritical

SALEM (UPI) — Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. assailed unions as "hypocritical" and the government as "timid" today for their stand against use of prison labor to build state buildings.

He testified before the Senate Public Buildings and Institutions Committee on a bill that would prohibit construction of state buildings by convicts.

The current statute centers on use of inmates to build a women's prison. A labor effort to halt it was thrown out of court on the basis of the state's immunity to suit.

The dispute started when the Board of Control voted 2-1 to use prison labor. Gov. Mark Hatfield dissented.

Appling said he was "ironically amused" that trade groups support rehabilitation, but not in their trade.

Support for a ban on use of convict labor was voiced by J. D. McDonald, president of the Oregon AFL-CIO, other labor witnesses, and by Sen. Edward Fadel, D-Eugene, sponsor of the bill.

Labor witnesses said using prison labor was an infringement on the job needs of the free labor market.

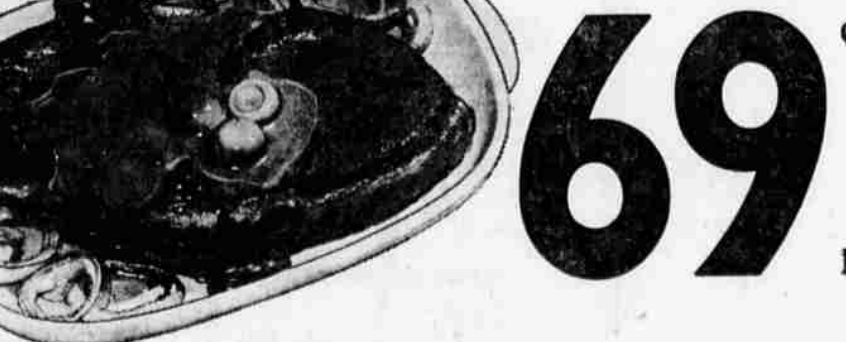

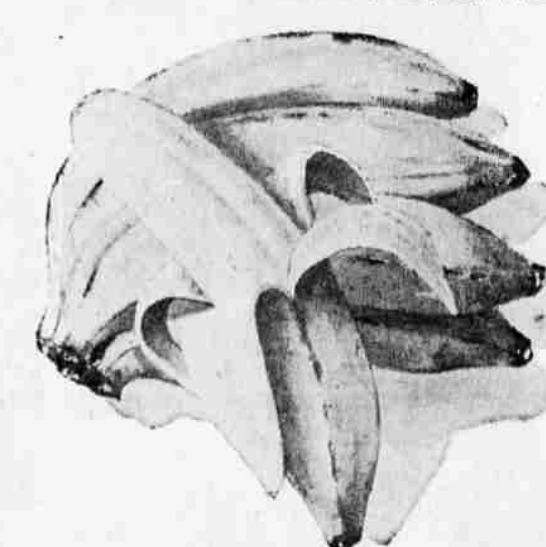
