## Owl Cindermen Have Tough Test

The Oregon Tech Owl cindermen will travel to Monmouth Friday for their first conference track meet. The Sturdy Six will face their toughest test against the Wolves. The OCE crew has depth and talent. It will take top-flight effort by the Owls to defeat the OCE thineclads.

OTI bases its major attack on the discus throwing ability of Norm Johns. Johns who recently broke his own school record hopes to place first in his favorite event. The Owls will have to forfeit the pole vault, the hurdles and the distance races.

Fast improving Ed Cecil will be kept busy as he performs in the 100 yard dash, the 220, shot put, and javelin and will also run one leg on the relay. John Maricich will enter the sprints and broad jump. The high jumping talent of Bob Bryant could add points to the Owl score.

Wayne Dennis, who was injured in last week's decathlon, will be ready for action. Bob Chard will be out to break his own record in the javelin but will receive competition from a highly talented OCE challenger.

Coach Larry Burleson reported that the greatest obstacle is OCE's depth. "Our Sturdy Six will be up against their Terrible Thirty," said Burleson.

The Owls will return to the mile high campus and begin preparation for their big meet against SOC here May 10.

## Henley Rallies To Defeat KU Jayvee, 4-3

The Henley Hornet baseball team, preparing for its Saturday engagement with Rogue River in the first game of a three-game playoff set for the Rogue River title, downed the Klamath Union Jayvees with a seventh inning rally Wednesday afternoon, 4-3.

The victory was a revenge win for the Hornets who were literally blasted from the park by the Jayvees last week, 12-4. The Hornets were ready for this one and won it with a rally.

The Hornets batters were held in check with only two hits for five innings but erupted for two runs in each of the sixth and seventh innings to post their eighth win of the season against the one loss.

The Jayvees scored first when Tom Schiff reached first on an error and John Jendrowski hit a pop single to right. With two out and two on, Spiker rapped a single over second base for the two runs.

The KU team scored again in the fifth when Curt Coleman, who had two hits for the Pelicans, walked and stole second. Again after two were out, Schiff looped a fly ball between Ben Stoehrs and Mapes in the Henley outfield and it dropped between them for a double.

The Hornets rallied in the sixth. LeVoy Young and winning pitcher Earl Allbritton opened with singles. Johnny Crume flamed out a pop single to right. With two out and two on, Spiker rapped a single over second base for the two runs.

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## KU's Smith Among Top Track Stars In State

Klamath Union's Walt Smith, Hillsboro's Wendell Cox and South Salem's Jim Price top the list of the state's top track prep times of the season thus far this year.

The Herald and News is instituting a weekly chart on the best prep track times in the state and hopes to continue it weekly. Some of the times may not be the best because we had to look through all the papers we could find to decipher the best marks.

There may be some better marks that we have not seen in some papers.

Klamath's Smith leads the parade of javelin throwers. He already has broken the school record, twice this season and his best throw to date is 214-4. He is just over nine feet short of the state and national record presently held by Glenn Winningham of Grants Pass. He set the record of 225-6 1/2 in 1959.

Smith, only a junior, is almost a sure bet to break the record before he graduates if his progress continues as it has this season. He is being pushed by a former teammate, Tom Huff, of Ashland. Huff threw the spear 203 feet for his best effort.

Cox and Price had a duel Tuesday with near records set. Cox raced to a brilliant 4:19.6 mile

while pushed by Price. Price, however, was the better in the shorter half mile race. He won that in 1:54.8. The state mark in the mile is 4:11.2 set by Dave Deubner last year and the half mile mark is 1:53.6, also by Deubner last season.

Mark Henningsgaard broke the old state record in the pole vault for the first state record smash of this season. He cleared the horizontal bar at 13-9 1/2 to snap the old record of 13-5 1/2 by Daryl Stanley of Oakridge in 1958.

Grants Pass' Bob Shepard is getting close to the high jump standard. The Caveman leaped 6-4 1/2 last week against the Pelicans and the state record is 6-5 1/2. He could break that record.

Cottage Grove's Alan Richards is knocking on the door of the discus record. He has heaved the platter 165-6 1/2 and the state record is 170-9 set last year by Ontario's Terry Baker.

The Klamath Union Pelicans gained a split with the Weed Cougars Wednesday in a pair of five-inning games, winning the first 3-3 and losing the second 2-1. Both were non-conference games.

Rich Grow got credit for the win in the first game and absorbed the loss in the second contest. There was very little hitting in either game. The Pelicans got only four hits in rallying to the 3-3 win in the first game while the Cougars got only three off starter Bob Moore and Grow.

The Whitebirds lashed only three hits and Weed only two in the second game. But Weed's two hits were a triple and home run. This set of games was just a warmup for the Pelicans. They travel to Grants Pass Saturday for a conference doubleheader with the winless Cavemen.

Coach Bill Mansfield didn't take his best pitchers to the game. He is saving them for the series with Grants Pass. The Pelicans had to rally in the fifth inning with four runs to win the first game. The Cougars got a pair of runs off Bob Moore in the second after two were out. He walked pitcher John Dixon and Bob Delgado reached first on an error by Mike Kitching at short. Jesse Moreno then singled to chase them home.

Klamath scored in the top of the third when Moore walked, took third on Marvin Yunk's single and second on a wild pitch by Dixon. Weed came back to regain the lead in their half of the third. Jim Poloni reached first on an error, was wild pitched to second and scored on Omri Hildreth's single.

The Pelis rallied for the win in the fifth. John Gray singled while pinch-hitting for Tom Osa. Rick Horn ran for him and moved to second on an error on the hit ball by Rich Bath. Yunk walked to fill the bags and Lanny Guyer

hit a sacrifice fly to score Horn. Kitching got on via an error for the second run and Dave Johnson singled home the other two runs. The Pelicans got the first blood in the second game. Larry Binney singled, took second on Guyer's ground out and scored on Mike Kitching's single.

Weed knotted the game in the second on a home run by Hildreth. Their final and winning run came in the fifth when Poloni reached first on an error and scored on a triple by Bill Duchi for the victory.

The Pel pitchers combined to strike out seven Cougar batters while Dennis Ruffalo won the game for Weed on a three hitter in striking out only two.

## KU Jayvee Track Team Victorious

The Klamath Jayvee track team downed the Chilquien Panthers, 71-38, Wednesday in a dual practice meet.

The Pelican juniors took eight firsts and tied for another first spot while the Panthers grabbed off four firsts and tied for one first spot.

Randy Howard led the Pelicans and got some able assistance from Mickey Bender, Gerrit DeGroot, Ernie Badger and Charles Church. Howard paced the meet with double wins in the 100 and 220 dashes. The freshman was clocked in 10.6 in the 100 and a 23.7 in the 220. He also ran on the anchor leg of the winning 800-yard relay team.

Bender won the broad jump with a leap of 19-2 1/2 while Badger was second in the 100, second in the 440 and on the relay team. Charlie Church tied for first in the low hurdles in a fine 22.8 and was second in the highs to Chilquien's Tony DiDilio in 18.3.

DeGroot took the quarter mile race in 33.6 with Badger second. Dave Vaagen won the mile in the mediocre time of 5:00.4. Terry Metter was second in that race. Walt Ash captured the half mile by holding out against the late charge of Mike Sweek to win the half mile in 2:12.2. Steve Baker won the high jump with a good jump of 3-9 1/2. Curt Peterstener was second.

The Panthers took first with DiDilio's hurdles win, and a tie with Jim Bridge in the low hurdles. Joe Kirk won the shot put with a toss of 27-2 and Tony Wilder captured the javelin toss with a beave of 149-4. A DeBortoli was second in the javelin. The Panthers also won the weight man's relay in 1:44.9 with Kirk, Oran Miller, Don Rogers and Charlie Spicer running. The final leg by Spicer won the race for the Panthers.

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Legislature Defeats Ban On Boxing In California

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—Anti-boxing advocates today abandoned all hopes of outlawing the sport in California for at least another year.

The latest assault on boxing met legislative defeat yesterday when a committee killed a constitutional amendment that would have banned the pro game.

The measure's principal author, Assemblyman Carl Britschgi, R-Redwood City, immediately dropped the other half of his boxing package: a resolution asking the State Athletic Commission to suspend all promoter licenses until the people vote whether to keep the sport.

One surprise witness before the Assembly Committee on Governmental Efficiency and Economy was Joey Lopez, former lightweight contender now attempting a boxing comeback.

The West Sacramento fighter said he had been in "about 90" fights and was "satisfied" with the protection California offered boxers.

But Britschgi said he thought the "people of California should be given the opportunity to decide whether they want to continue boxing or not."

Quoting from an earlier legislative report, Britschgi said it was "just fantastic the monkey business and shenanigans that have gone on in this field."

In support of his measure, the assemblyman brought three witnesses before the committee—a doctor, a boxer and a clergyman.

The bulk of opposition came from Jack Urech, executive officer of the California Athletic Commission.

Urech admitted boxing was a "demanding sport" and said 16 fighters had died from ring injuries since 1938. But he noted the number of football deaths last year alone was 38.

"No one asks that if football be abolished," Urech said. "But each time there is a boxing death the human cry rises."

"Outlawing boxing will not eliminate boxing in California. It will only drive it underground. We all remember our experiment with prohibition which turned out to be a complete failure."

He said young men who wanted to box professionally "should be allowed to do so."

SPAHN'S JINX  
MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves, the winningest left-handed pitcher in baseball history, hasn't had much luck with the Dodgers, who beat him 34 times and lost only 18 times, including the 1962 season.

GIANTS SIGN TUNNELL  
NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Giants have signed Emben Tunnell to work as a special assistant coach under Al Sherman next season. Tunnell, an outstanding defensive back with the Giants for 11 years and then for three more with the Green Bay Packers, will be concerned mainly with scouting future opponents and college teams for the National Football League club.

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
