Sanford Pitches Giants To Win

Jerry Lynch, baseball's highest-priced pinch hitter, operates on the theory of all or nothing at all. That's the way he dickers at contract time and that's the manner he goes up to hit when Manager Fred Hutchinson tells him to grab a bat.

Always looking to "rip one downtown," Lynch did Wednesday night when he blasted the 13th pinch homer of his career to power the Cincinnati Reds to a come-from-behind 4-3 victory over the Milwaukee Braves.

The greying 32-year-old Lynch, who draws an estimated salary of \$25,000 a year, now needs only one more pinch homer to tie the major league record of 14 held by George Crowe.

Has Two Hits
Lynch's homer off loser Lew Burdette with rookie Tom Harper on base in the seventh inning was only his second hit of the season in 10 times up. His only other hit also was a pinch homer that helped the Reds beat the San Francisco Giants, 7-4, on April 22.

Southpaw Jim O'Toole was the beneficiary of both blows, being the winner in the game against the Giants and again in Wednesday night's contest. O'Toole, now 5-1, gave up nine hits to tie the Braves before Lynch hit for him in the seventh. Al Worthington then wrapped it up by retiring the last six batters in order.

San Francisco snapped Pittsburgh's four-game winning streak, 5-1, and the Chicago Cubs came out of their batting slump with a 17-hit 13-8 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Rain washed out the game between the Los Angeles Dodgers and the Philadelphia Phillies and also postponed the Houston Colts-New York Mets game with the Colts leading, 1-0, after three innings.

In the American League, the Kansas City A's crushed the Cleveland Indians, 11-3, the Washington Senators downed the Detroit Tigers, 4-1, the Boston Red Sox drubbed the Minnesota Twins, 14-5, the Chicago White Sox swept a twin-bill from the Baltimore Orioles, 7-0 and 6-4, and the Los Angeles Angels defeated the New York Yankees, 5-3.

Jack Sanford posted his fourth victory of the season for the Giants with a seven-hitter over the Pirates. Bob Friend, victim of a three-run rally in the fourth, suffered his first loss after three victories. Willie McCovey drove in two runs with three of the Giants' 12 hits.

Ernie Banks blasted two three-run homers and drove in seven runs in all as the Cubs ended the Cardinals' four-game winning streak with a 17-hit barrage. Hom-

Yankees Good Bet To Surpass Medal Winning Efforts

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—United States athletes, pausing only briefly to cheer spectacular upset victories in the 10,000-meter run and the decathlon, expect today to win Pan American gold medals in the pentathlon and fencing in addition to setting up a triumph in basketball.

With 76 gold medals already accumulated, Uncle Sam's athletes are a good bet to equal or surpass the Pan American record of 129 gold medals won at Chicago four years ago.

Holds Team Lead
The United States is favored to start off the day by taking two gold medals in the pentathlon, can add more in the individual sabre fencing finals this afternoon and then figures to cap the day with a victory over Mexico in its next-to-last game in the basketball tournament. A U.S. basketball victory tonight will set up a "gold medal game" with Brazil, which also is unbeaten in the tournament.

The U.S. goes into today's fifth and final event of the pentathlon—the 4,000-meter cross country run—holding the team lead and running one-two in the individual competition.

At the end of four events, the U.S. team held the lead with 10,925.76 points followed by Brazil with 10,297.64 and Mexico with 10,140.32. In the individual standings, Richard Stoll of Ft. Sam Houston, Tex., was first with 3,783.30 points with Robert Beck of Boston second with 3,697.52.

Jose Wilson of Brazil, who set a world pentathlon record in the 300-meter swimming Wednesday, was third with 3,695.88 points and Jim Moore of Ft. Sam Houston was fourth with 3,445.88.

Score Memorable Triumphs
The three U.S. entries are at their best in the cross country and some experts are predicting a 1-2-3 U.S. finish in today's race. The U.S. scored two of its most memorable triumphs of these fourth annual Pan American Games Wednesday when Pete McArdle of New York won the 10,000-meter run and John D. Martin of Norman, Okla., rallied despite a painful groin injury to win the decathlon.

The U.S. also scored victories Wednesday in the women's 200-meter dash, fencing, yachting and gymnastics, making a total of eight gold medals for the day. McArdle, a 34-year old, 125-pound bus mechanic who looks like he couldn't run 10 feet without gasping for breath, had a crowd of 9,000 roaring for him as he won the 10,000-meter with a time of 29:32.1 that wiped out the Pan Am mark of 30:17.2 set by Argentina's Oswaldo Suarez in 1959.

Suarez, quite naturally, was the favorite to win Wednesday's race but the balding, spindly-legged McArdle moved off the mark at a steady pace and just kept right on going. The fans, who had come to cheer Suarez, wound up yelling for "old lady" as he swept across the finish line 250 yards ahead of the Argentine ace.

Rest Two Days
He'll rest for 48 hours and then compete in another event Saturday—the marathon.

Martin, a 6-foot, 4-inch, 200-pound teacher and former holder of the world pole vault record, won three of Wednesday's final five events in the decathlon to take the gold medal that earns him recognition as the best all-around athlete of the games.

Martin, in last place after Tuesday's first two events, won the 110-meter hurdles, the discus throw and the pole vault in succession and then finished third in the javelin and the 1500-meter run to finish with a Pan Am record of 7,335 points.

The crucial event was the pole vault in which Martin soared 14 feet, 11 1/2 inches to collect 1,122 points in one package. His 10-event point total broke the mark of 7,234 set by Dave Edstrom of the U.S. in 1959.

Bill Gairdner of Canada was second with 6,812 points, Hector Martinez of Venezuela was third with 6,751 and Russ Hodge of Roscoe, N.Y., was fourth with 6,333.

Vivian Brown Wins
Vivian Brown of Cleveland won the 200-meter women's run in 23.9 seconds; Army Pvt. Michael Desaro of Brooklyn led a 1-2-3 American medal sweep in men's individual sabers, and Doris Fuchs of Rochester, N.Y., paced the U.S. to two gold medals in gymnastics. Miss Buchs won the individual all-around gymnastics event with 77.21 points and thus led the U.S. team to the title with 323.18 points with Canada second at 375.67 and Cuba third at 345.87.

The U.S. picked up its seventh and eighth gold medals of the day-long competition when yachting judges, figuring out competition that ended Tuesday, announced victories in the lightning and star classes.

U.S. light heavyweight Fred Lewis of Vallejo, Calif., advanced to Friday's boxing finals when he beat Rubens Oliveira of Brazil. Earlier two favored U.S. boxers—Army Sgt. John Carmody, a Brooklyn flyweight, and Quincy Daniels, a light welterweight from Seattle, Wash., were upset.

Derby Hopefuls Mum On Strategy

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — The closest guarded secrets at Churchill Downs today were the battle plans mapped out by trainers for Saturday's running of the \$125,000 added Kentucky Derby.

The trainers will talk of their hopes and fears, the condition of their horses, how the animals can handle muddy or fast tracks and the trials and tribulations encountered in getting the horses to the post for America's greatest horse race.

But you couldn't torture out of them the instructions they intend to give the jockeys in the paddock prior to the 89th running of the Kentucky Derby.

"Are you going to let him run in front, come from behind or what?" innocently asked one reporter of Woody Stephens, who trains Cain Hoy Stable's Never Bend.

Stephens just grinned. Then he said, "I wouldn't even tell that to my wife."

Past Races Set Pattern
The pattern of racing to be expected of starters in the probable field of nine, with the possibility that a tenth will join them when the entries close today, is indicated by past races.

Thus Greentree Stable's No Robbery, which never has been worse than second at any stage of its races and usually goes to the front at the start, is most likely to set the pace in the Kentucky Derby.

That was the way Greentree Stable's son of Swaps won the Wood Memorial two weeks ago for his fifth victory without defeat.

Trainer John Gaver, however, insists that No Robbery does not have to go to the front at the start.

"This horse can be rated," he said. "But of course I wouldn't want the jockey to fight him if he insists on having his own way," he added.

No Robbery, wearing blinkers to keep him from running wide on the turns, also will be equipped with a special bit designed to hold down his tongue.

Hates Tongue Straps
"I hate tongue straps," said the man who saddled Shut Out for his Kentucky Derby victory in 1942. "If a horse will stand for this equipment I prefer to use it."

Other starters with a high turn of speed include favored Candy Spots, Never Bend, Bonjour, Chateaugay and Gray Pet. They can be expected to be close to the pace-maker.

On the other hand, On My Honor and Royal Tower strictly are stretch-runners.

Nicklaus, Palmer Favorites

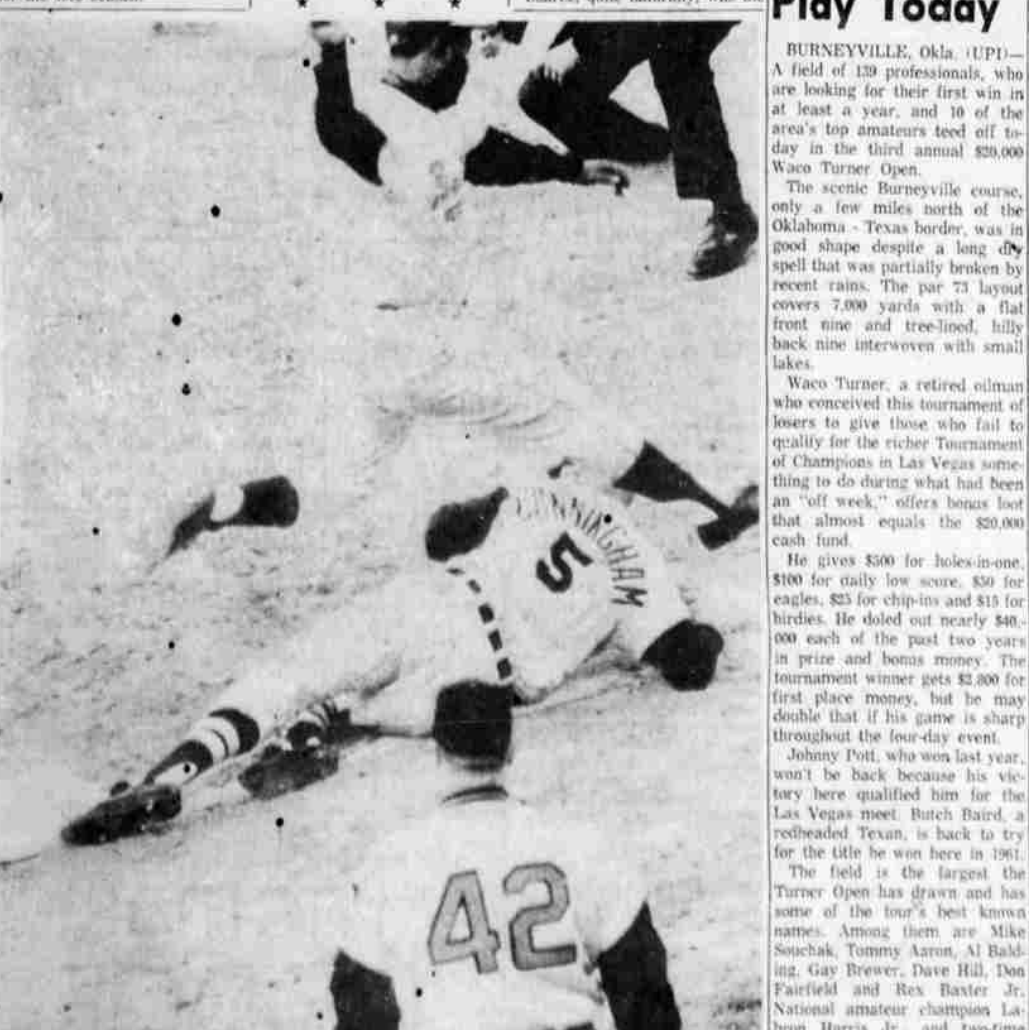

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — It's defending champion Arnold Palmer and National Open and Masters king Jack Nicklaus against the star-packed field today as the first round of play gets under way in the \$60,000 Tournament of Champions.

The crack group of 27 starts teeing off at 9 a.m. EDT at the Desert Inn Country Club course.

Palmer and Nicklaus, golf's one-two punch, are rated 4-1 favorites to capture the \$13,000 first place jackpot. Billy Casper, Tony Lema and Gary Player are next in line at 6-1; Doug Sanders is rated at 10-1 and Gene Littler, who has won this coveted crown three times already in its 10-year history, is 12-1.

The course is supposed to play easier this year because the rough isn't as deep as usual due to frost. But the temperature has been up around the 85-90 mark for the past four days.

Bo Belinsky beat the Yankees, so don't bother asking if he also managed to beat the curve.

Bo had every right in the world to celebrate Wednesday night and even M. A. N. A. G. E. R. Bill Rigney wouldn't deny him it.

The irrepressible 26-year-old southpaw not only defeated the Yankees for the first time in his hectic career but also won his first game of the season by pitching the Los Angeles Angels to a 3-3 victory.

Maybe you think of Bo wasn't happy in the clubhouse. He was so elated he wanted to buy champagne for the gang.

Belinsky, who had lost his first three games, really had it Wednesday night.

He held the Yankees hitless until Roger Maris singled with one out in the sixth, then pitched his way out of a ninth inning jam by getting pinch hitter Jack Reed on a grounder for the final out.

Allows Four Hits
Bo allowed only four hits, struck out nine and was staked to a quick lead when George Thomas clipped loser Ralph Terry for a grand-slam homer in the first inning. Driven to the showers in that 29-minute first inning, Terry suffered his second loss against three victories.

Elsewhere in the American League, the Kansas City A's clung to first place with an 11-3 triumph over the Cleveland Indians, the Chicago White Sox swept a pair from the Baltimore Orioles, 7-0 and 6-4, the Boston Red Sox mauled the Minnesota Twins, 14-5, and the Washington Senators defeated the Detroit Tigers, 4-1.

In the National League, the San Francisco Giants beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-1, the Cincinnati Reds downed the Milwaukee Braves, 4-3, and the Chicago Cubs drubbed the St. Louis Cardinals, 13-8. The games between the Houston Colts and New York Mets and Los Angeles Dodgers and Philadelphia Phillies were postponed by rain.

Pena Wins Fourth
Orlando Pena of the A's won his fourth straight without a loss by limiting the Indians to four hits and striking out nine. John Romano's eighth inning homer ended Pena's string of 17 straight scoreless innings and Joe Adcock also homered for the Tribe in the ninth. Wayne Causey, the league leading hitter, had a homer and two singles for KC.

Jim Landis tripled and homered off Oriole loser Mike McCormick and Ray Herbert hurled a four-hitter in the White Sox' opening game victory, after which Joel Horlen earned Chicago a sweep in the nightcap with late-inning help from former Oriole Hoyt Wilhelm.

Players traded by the Orioles to the White Sox during the off-

season figured in both victories. Ron Hansen had a triple, double and a single during the two-nighter; Pete Ward drove in two runs in the opener and another in the nightcap, and Dave Nicholson collected four hits. Wilhelm limited Baltimore to one hit over the last 2-3 innings of the finale.

16-Hit Onslaught
Ed Bressoud and Chuck Schilling each homered in the Red Sox' 16-hit onslaught against the Twins. Schilling had four of Boston's hits while Carl Yastrzemski and Dick Stuart had three apiece. Earl Wilson (2-2) was the winning pitcher and Jack Kralick (1-4) the loser.

Amazing Tom Cheney posted his fourth victory in a row without a loss for the Senators but yielded his first earned run of the season in the sixth inning when Gus Triandos doubled home, the Tigers' only run of the game.

Cheney struck out 12 batters and allowed seven hits. Don Leppert homered off loser Hank Aguirre (3-2) and then drove in the winning run in the seventh with a wrong field double.

Bisons Cop Calder Cup Hockey Title

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI) — It was the year of the Bison in the American Hockey League, and Buffalo is proudly displaying the Calder Cup today to prove it.

The Bisons rallied for five goals in the final period Wednesday night to trip the Hershey Bears, 6-2, and clinch their first AHL championship in 17 years. Buffalo won the best-of-seven final series from Hershey, four games to three.

To add further ammunition to Buffalo's boast as the country's best minor league hockey team, the Bisons also won the overall regular season title and the Western Division trophy.

Cliff Schmeitz was the Buffalo hero in the final game with a "hat trick," and all three goals came in the crucial third period. John McKenzie, who once played for Hershey, added two goals for the Bisons.

After a scoreless first period, McKenzie got Buffalo's first goal at 18:31 of the second session. McKenzie scored again after 22 seconds of the final period and Barry Cullen made it 3-0 a minute and a half later.

Mike Stankiewicz broke the ice for Hershey at 7:12 and Pete Conacher added another at 14:55 but the Bears couldn't cope with Schmeitz' three goals in the final 10 minutes of play.

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
