Bill Returned

SALEM (UPI)—The Senate today reconsidered Monday's defeat of a bill to extend the marriage waiting period from three to seven days, and sent it to the Health and Welfare Committee.

Sportsmen See Stand Affirmed

DUNSMUIR—The proposed closure of district 13, northeastern California, to deer hunting by the California Fish and Game Commission confirms the wishes of James Lambert, president of the Dunsmuir Rod and Gun Club.

Hunting next fall was tentatively banned in Mdoc, Lassen, and eastern Shasta and Siskiyou counties at a meeting of the commission in San Francisco.

"This bears out the contention of the Northern Counties Conservation Association and its affiliate groups that commission policies in the past five years have decimated the deer herds beyond seasonal recovery," Lambert stated.

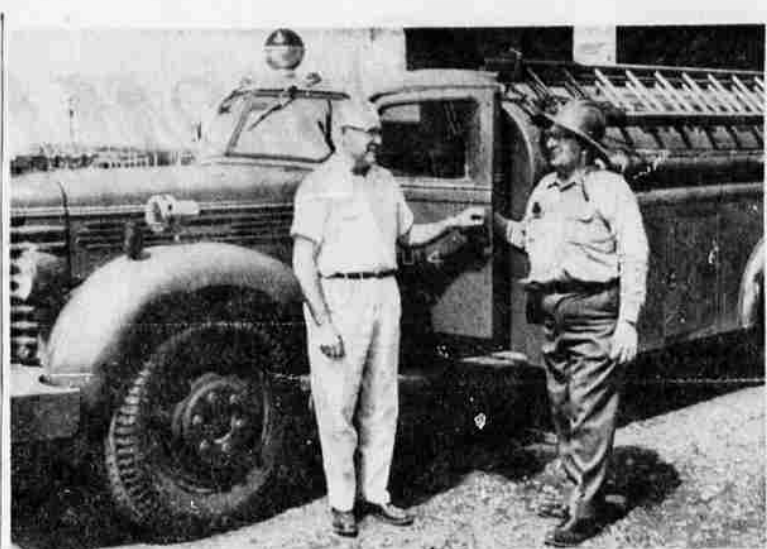
However, sportsmen in Northern California also regard the proposal with some distrust.

"It may be a move to establish hunter control after a period of closure," Paul Carter, club secretary and statistician, pointed out. He said local sports groups will fight for the right to preserve hunting as a sport and not as a harvest. They will vigorously oppose moves to limit hunters and prescribe hunting areas.

While local sportsmen have demanded curtailment of the deer kill as a conservation measure, they did not advocate such a drastic step as complete closure, the two men said when interviewed. The demand has been for return to a sensible deer season, closing not later than Oct. 20, and hunting limited to bucks of three points or better.

"We appreciate the realization of the Fish and Game Commission that desperate measures are needed to preserve the present remnants of the mule deer herd in Northern California. We have contended all along that the lengthened season has been the only basis for the heavy deer kill reported in district 13 and the deer population is actually approaching extinction," Lambert explained.

The latest step of the Dunsmuir Rod and Gun Club is to establish elk in the Mumbo Basin in western Siskiyou County. A request has been made to the Fish and Game Commission to allow the capture and transport of surplus elk from the Humboldt County herd. The Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors has approved the move and provided funds from accumulated game fine money.

Plans Laid For Lake County Fair

LAKEVIEW—The first meeting of the Lake County Fair Association was held in the county extension office on April 16, with Dr. Vic Hill presiding. Other officers are Darvin Robnett, vice president, and Virginia Crummett, secretary.

Initial plans were made for the 1963 fair. Work was begun on the premium book, and the 1963 budget was approved by Ben Vernon, fair board representative.

Silver Lake Citizens Join In Purchase Of Fire Truck

SILVER LAKE—Community spirit once again comes to the front with the purchase of a fire truck to serve this north Lake County town. The population of Silver Lake and environs is now slightly more than 200.

The truck, a 1948 Diamond T model, has a capacity of 1250 gallons and will pump 250 gallons per minute. Purchased for \$3200 at Canby, Ore., it is equipped with siren, flashing light, extension ladder, and axe. "We still need hand extinguishers for the back for use on small fires," pointed out Bill Barracks.

While still working toward organizing a fire district, men from the community began scouting for the equipment but were not ready for the purchase step. A citizen's committee quickly secured 22 signers agreeing to back the note for purchase of the truck.

Note at a special election must have the consent of one-third of the residents of the community to provide taxation to cover the expense.

The truck has not been used as yet, but two Kingsley Field sergeants gave instructions on its use. The building to hold both the North Lake County disaster unit and the fire engine was erected this past fall and winter by some 25 volunteer workers from Silver Lake and Fort Rock. The cement work was done professionally. Ed Albertsen, formerly a member of the community, donated lumber, and other materials were supplied at cost by the Silver Lake Lumber Yard operated by Doyle Haynes.

"We're looking for two used overhead doors, size 10 by 10," Henry Cook pointed out. Land for the building was donated by Cook and Earl Corum.

"So far we've been lucky enough to have mild weather," said Barracks. When the nights are too cold we've kept it across the street in Don Corum's garage. "The building is insulated but will need heat next winter. This, plus upkeep, as well as paying for the equipment itself, is to be covered by formation of the taxing district.
