WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — Richard T. Leahy of J. W. Sparks & Co. says the long uninterrupted advance, which pushed the average about 60 points higher in eight weeks, coupled with the deterioration of quality leadership, suggests the likelihood of a modest correction.

He says he is now adopting a policy of caution regarding the course of near term share prices.

Lawrence Bleiberg of Bache & Co. feels that now is the time to take advantage of any dips in the market to make commitments since the over-all trend appears to be upward.

Walt McKibben, editor of the *Investor's Group* Stock Survey, says he remains bullish, but decreasingly so as the market rises. He feels the market will probably shoot past the 740 level in the industrial average but he is "deliberately laying the groundwork for a future about-face when and if the market weakens and begins to show signs of topping out."

Graham Loving Jr. of Equity Research Associates sees no reason to doubt the current business upswing nor any reason to expect a serious economic decline.

Oregon Press Criticized

MONMOUTH (UPI) — State Sen. Walter Leth, R-Salem, Thursday criticized the press in a talk before the Monmouth - Independence Rotary Club at Oregon College of Education.

He compared the daily morning visits of newsmen to the offices of the House speaker, Senate president and governor to a baseball "triple play."

He said the interviews did not reflect the real tone of the session, resulted in headlines and story angles which did not reflect the real work of the legislature and often resulted in extensive coverage of trivia.

"If you say something significant on the floor at 11 a.m.," he said, "it doesn't make the papers. The headlines have already been written."

Unit Plan Opposed At Henley Meeting

Opposition to a proposed county-wide one unit school district was expressed at an organization meeting at Henley High School Wednesday night attended by about 200 persons.

Leading the discussion were Dr. Cliff Robinson, County Superintendent of Schools and Paul Fairclough, representing the county school board members. Also present were B. M. Antle and Lawson Kandra, board members.

Robinson, in a discussion preceding a question and answer period, outlined chief objections to the proposal, which is subject to a county election. Chief objections, as enumerated by Robinson, are:

—Increase of at least five mills in the tax structure in the rural county areas "forever" for operating budgets only.

—Cost of education will increase.

—People who have been supporting adequate education programs in the Bly, Merrill, Malin, Beatty and other areas "for the past 20 years will be hurt."

—The reorganization plan would involve a great deal of travel to maintain an effective education program.

While Robinson did not offer a plan to solve the school reorganization problem at the session, he did say (confirmed by board members present) that the county board has worked out a plan for consideration. Details of the plan must be worked out and approved by the board before it can be announced, Robinson said.

Robinson announced the plan Thursday morning and a story regarding the proposal appears on the front page of today's *Herald and News*.

Robinson said he favored a system that would involve two districts. "I believe that two districts, each of which would provide education for grades one through 12, would be the solution to this problem. Certainly, the proposed one unit system does not offer a solution," Robinson concluded.

In other action Wednesday night a committee of 15 members was organized to support and distribute information on the county board's new proposal that is outlined on Page 1.

Mrs. Jimmy Ottoman and Dr. Robinson will be in charge of the preparation and distribution of a "Fact Sheet."

Other committee members are: Mrs. Cliff Ongman, general chairman; Bill Pohl, Bly chairman; Mrs. Louis Randall, Bonanza; Lloyd Peters, Chiloquin; Mrs. B. M. Antle, Fairhaven; Dick Jessup, Gilchrist; Mrs. Bill Marshall, Henley; Charlie Duncan, Malin; Randall Pope and Harry Urem, Merrill; Billy Golden, Suburban; Mrs. Nedra Hopkins, Ken; Ben Adair, speaker's bureau; and Emil Wells, finance committee.

The elementary board felt the most important consideration regarding the date was the composition of the school board in the reorganized unit. The election date strictly governs the composition of the board.

If consolidation becomes effective prior to July 1 (consolidation is, by law, effective 30 days after the election) the new board would be comprised of seven members, five from the county unit and two from the city for the following school year.

Consolidation after July 1 would necessitate a 10-man board, five from the city and five from the county. If the election date was set anytime after June 1, therefore, the new board for the following school year would be composed of 10 men. This, the city elementary board feels, is the most important consideration.

An additional letter of protest has been filed with the State Highway Department by Carl Braathen, 3535 Quarry Street on behalf of residents of the area of Coll and Quarry streets.

Braathen again called attention of Forest Cooper, State Highway Engineer, to the access problem for residents of this area onto the approaches of the bypass and entrance to Kit Carson Way at the north area of Klamath Falls.

The petition asks for a better access from the newly constructed portion of U.S. 97 north to Coll and Quarry streets, and indicates that a traffic hazard exists at this point for these residents.

Braathen maintains that the highway department changed the alignment of the crossing once the grading was completed and the surfacing in progress.

Hoffa Backs Disbelief Of Strike Loss Suffered By East Coast Area

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Teamsters President James R. Hoffa offered today to pay for an independent audit of any company which claims it lost money because of last year's East and Gulf Coast dock strike.

Hoffa said he was willing "to put up a little reward and give it to charity" to disprove the contentions of some businesses that they suffered strike losses which never can be recovered.

The teamsters leader said audits comparing the incomes of such firms with the previous year and the year after the strike would show there had been no permanent damage.

Hoffa said he was willing to pay for the audit of any company seeking to prove irreparable harm. He said such a check would demonstrate conclusively that they experienced only "temporary losses" which would be made up.

The teamsters chief made the offer as he testified for the second day on the compulsory arbitration bill. It was introduced by Committee Chairman Herbert C. Bonner, D-N.C.

Hoffa, as well as other union and management officials, is unalterably opposed to the legislation. He left no doubt about that Wednesday.

Polite Argument

He also showed little reluctance to differ with committee members who questioned him on his stand. Hoffa and Bonner conducted what could be called a polite argument. With Rep. Thomas L. Ashley, D-Ohio, however, Hoffa engaged in a shouting match.

Ashley indicated that he was not completely sold on the measure either, but he and Hoffa clashed over such points as whether Hoffa represented Teamsters or part of the public. Hoffa said he represented the latter group.

Hoffa also tangled spiritedly with Rep. Bob Casey, D-Tex., a co-sponsor of the Bonner bill.

The teamster president's main contention was that compulsory arbitration would do away with the basic right of a union to strike and the equally basic right of a company to lock out employees.

In addition, he said, attempts at compulsory arbitration here and abroad indicated that it had been a dismal failure.

Supports Free Enterprise

Hoffa said he was "one thousand percent" behind the free enterprise system, and that unions and management — with some limited assistance from the federal government — could solve the nation's labor problems without new legislation.

Merchants Give Study Plan Okay

Over 50 per cent of the downtown merchants have indicated thus far that they support the downtown commercial area study that was okayed by the city council three weeks ago.

Bob Beach, chairman of the Klamath Falls Downtown Merchants Association, sent out 87 statements of support to association members and 45, all indicating support, have been returned to the city planning office.

The study will be conducted by Ken Blackman, planning consultant, and a Core Committee of downtown businessmen. The committee will consist of between 12 and 15 men and the appointments will be confirmed in the near future.

The study will be used to amend data to formulate a comprehensive plan based on the long term potential of the downtown business area.

Some of the specific objectives will be to:

1. Formulate a traffic circulation plan for the central commercial area.
2. Arrive at a land use and parking plan to maintain the downtown area's position as the leading regional shopping center.
3. Determine the economic impact of the outlying commercial shopping centers to the central commercial area.
4. Define the trade area and determine its economic characteristics and potential.

Resident Deputies Demanded By Barr

Chairman W. A. Barr of the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors has issued a personal ultimatum to Sheriff Al B. Cottar demanding the reinstatement of resident deputies in outlying unincorporated areas before May 14.

Barr vacated his chair to Supervisor W. C. Ealy at a board meeting Tuesday, to make a statement "not as chairman of the board." He deplored the backward step to efficient county law enforcement brought about by Cottar, who withdrew his resident deputies because of a budget disagreement with the board.

"The sheriff has committed what the board believes to be a great blunder," Barr said. "He has locked up the Happy Camp jail and brought all of his deputies to Yreka from the outlying areas. He left these areas without the protection he swore to give when he took his oath of office. He apparently plans to have his way or else, regardless of the people."

Barr's final statement at the meeting was, "If the sheriff does not put his deputies back out between now and May 14, I will call a special meeting to organize a county constabulary, using funds deleted from the sheriff's budget. If we let him get away with twisting our arm, we will be the laughing stock of the state."

Sheriff Cottar had previously pointed out that the withdrawal of his resident deputies had not left Happy Camp, Tulelake, and other areas without law enforcement protection. He said patrols are in the areas from the Yreka main office, and in many cases they might be available to trouble spots faster than before as they are already in the patrol car and not at their homes.

The sheriff declared his action was not taken because of "spite" as inferred by the board. Deputies were averaging a 50-hour work week at pay for a 40-hour week, he said, and action was taken to put them on the work schedule for which they were being paid.

The sheriff had asked for compensatory pay for the hours worked by his deputies or for additional deputies in order to insure his men a 40-hour week and still provide enough help to cover the entire county.

Chairman Barr requested an investigation committee consisting of Cottar, Supervisors Ealy and S. V. Jackson, and County Administrator Jess O'Roke to discuss the sheriff's problem and make a comprehensive report at the May 14 board meeting.

The committee had its first meeting after the board meeting on Tuesday, and the next one is scheduled May 7.

New License Plate Plan Gets Okay

SALEM (UPI) — The Senate voted 20-10 today for new reflectorized auto license plates with the word "Oregon" in letters at least as large as the license plate numbers.

Approval came after the upper House voted 22-8 to reject a move to get the measure back in committee. Some wanted to add advertising slogans to the plates; others wanted the design changed so it would be uniform with other states.

The proposed new plate drops the "Pacific Wonderland" slogan.

It approved by the House and signed by the governor, the bill would require the first of the new plates to be issued in January of 1964. One-fifth of the state's license plates would be changed every year until the transition had been completed.

Sen. R. F. Chapman, D - Coos Bay, said it was important to have "Oregon" spelled out in large letters "to let people know where the auto comes from."

Sen. Vernon Cook, D-Gresham, attempted to get the bill sent back to committee. "We have an excellent opportunity to advertise Oregon and encourage tourists to come here. We should take advantage of the advertising and public relations potential."

Sen. L. W. Newbury, R-Ashland, also wanted the bill sent back to committee—but he urged that the design be changed so the plates would be similar to those in other states.

Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland, said the committee already gave consideration to the Cook and Newbury suggestions. "We could add the slogan 'Rainy Oregon,'" he commented.

Sen. Thomas Mahoney, D-Portland, suggested the slogan should read "no sales tax."

Sen. Anthony Yturri, R-Ontario, said the committee had considered the slogan "Pearson's paradise," but we felt it would be foolish to make the plates two feet wide."

Chapman, unmoved by the mixture of serious and humorous comment, said about 10 other states now have reflectorized license plates, and they have been proved to be a safety factor.
