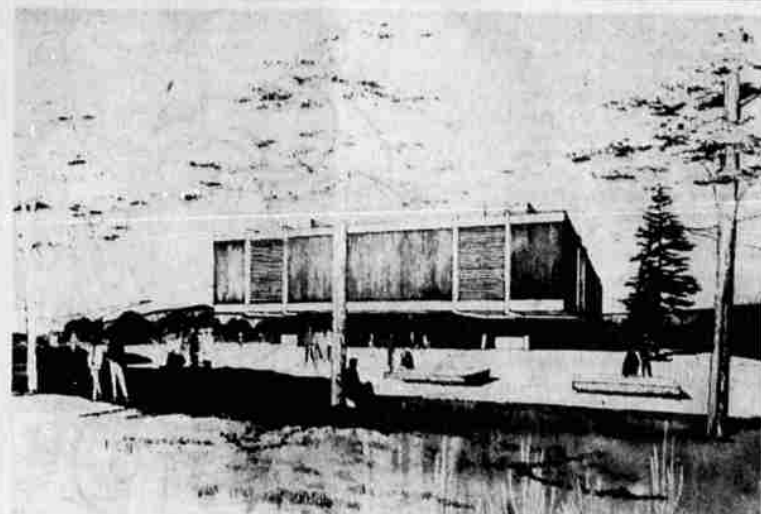
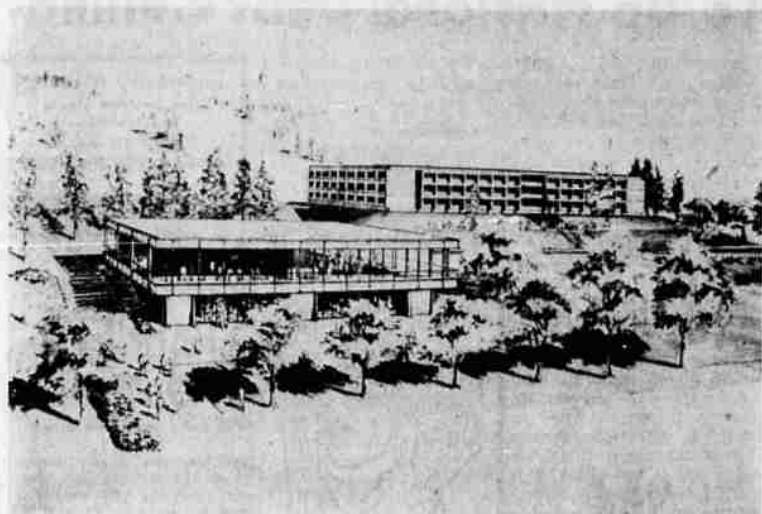

In The Day's News

The news today?

A surprising lot of it has to do with schemes to raise money enough to pay the bill for rising cost of government.

The little state of New Hampshire started something the other day when it legalized a lottery in the form of a horse race sweepstakes from which it hopes to collect some four million dollars—which will be allocated to communities throughout the state for support of schools.

The New Hampshire governor called it a "legitimate fiscal experiment" that has the backing of a majority of the state's citizens. That brought from the governor of nearby Massachusetts a statement to the effect that his state would have a lottery also if voter sentiment was favorable.

In Sacramento yesterday, Assemblyman Allen Pattee, of Salinas, said he is going to try to get California to adopt a New Hampshire-type lottery plan.

In Washington, Representative Paul A. Fino, of New York, was encouraged by New Hampshire's action to call in the reporters and tell them that in his opinion there is only one way to cut taxes, reduce the national debt and still have money enough for schools, housing, disabled veterans and health care—adopt a NATIONAL lottery.

He added: "There's no question that the New Hampshire action will have a tremendous impact on members of congress. It will provide impetus for the congress to take a second look at the national lottery bill."

The Congress of the United States of America has another way out—equally simple and just as effective. The Ways and Means committee of the U.S. House of Representatives voted yesterday to RAISE THE NATIONAL DEBT ceiling to a new high of \$300 billion dollars. This latest hike in the debt ceiling would become effective on July 1. During the interim the debt ceiling, now \$295 billion, would be set at \$307 billion, and some time before August 31 Congress would be asked to set a new, and presumably higher, ceiling for the coming year.

Everest Climb Success Laid To Teamwork, Weather

Death Penalty Action Stalled In Committee

SALEM (UPI) — Action on anti-death penalty bills was postponed by a House committee Thursday to await the outcome of Monday's House consideration of a new state constitution.

The anti-death penalty measures already have won Senate approval.

The proposed new constitution retains the death penalty.

The House Constitutional Revision Committee, which heard the death penalty measures Thursday, postponed action to Tuesday to determine if amendments would be necessary so that if the voters rejected capital punishment the prohibition could be applied to

either the present or to the proposed new constitution.

A constitutional change and a proposed change in statutes are included in the anti-death penalty package.

The constitutional change would make the penalty for first degree murder life in prison.

The statute change would require confinement for at least 15 years, and lifetime supervision under parole.

The Senate conducted extensive public hearings on both measures. The proposed constitutional change was approved 25-3, the statute revision 24-4.

Sen. Don Willner, D-Portland, was the principal witness at Thursday's hearing.

"Will you let the people vote on this issue?" he pleaded.

Willner went over testimony before the Senate committee and pointed out that the death penalty was not a deterrent, there was the possibility of error, and that capital punishment "brutalizes society."

Rep. Edward Elder, R-Eugene, former Lane County sheriff, argued that the death penalty was a deterrent to murder.

He said he believed courts appointed competent defense attorneys in death cases. He was replying to a charge that only the poor who could not hire good legal help were sent to the gas chamber.

Dominicans Pose Haiti Invasion

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — President Juan Bosch, threatening to invade Haiti if it commits any new aggression against the Dominican Republic, today sought collective inter-American action against Haitian President Francois Duvalier.

Bosch called Duvalier "a mentally sick man" Thursday night and cited a statement Wednesday by the Haitian president that only God could remove him from power.

A fact-finding team of the Organization of American States (OAS) flew to Santo Domingo from the Haitian capital of Port au Prince Thursday, leaving behind a country gripped by fear that Duvalier would resume a violent campaign against his enemies.

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI) — Members of an American mountain-climbing expedition today attributed their success in scaling Mt. Everest to thorough organization, good teamwork and favorable weather.

A two-man assault team became the first Americans to reach the 29,028-foot summit of the world's tallest peak Wednesday afternoon.

Had weather conditions at lower altitude disrupted communications and delayed announcement of the successful climb until Thursday.

Names of the two men have not been disclosed.

James Ramsey Ulman, Boston, spokesman for the group, sent word of the exploit team from the expedition base camp at Everest's slopes at 17,800 feet.

The 19-man expedition was believed regrouping today for its projected attempts to scale two sister peaks—Lhotse, the world's fourth highest mountain at 27,900 feet, and Nuptse, 23,850 feet.

President Kennedy said Thursday in Washington, "I am most pleased to learn of the success of the American expedition on Mt. Everest."

In a statement issued by the White House, he said, "These American climbers, pushing human endurance and experience to their farthest frontiers, joined the distinguished group of British and

Swiss mountaineers who have performed this feat. I know that all Americans will join me in saluting our gallant countrymen."

The expedition was the third to climb Everest. Sir Edmund Hillary, a New Zealand explorer with a British expedition, made it first in 1953 accompanied by Sherpa guide Tensing Norkay. A Swiss team duplicated the feat in 1956.

Communist China claimed it placed a team on the summit in 1960 from the north side and left a Chinese flag and a bust of Mao Tse Tung to prove it, but this has not been confirmed.

The American expedition under Norman G. Dyhrenfurth, an explorer and motion picture pro-

ducer of Santa Monica, Calif., probably was the best organized and financed ever to attack the mountain.

Dyhrenfurth obtained \$326,000 and the sponsorship of the State Department, the National Geographic Society, the National Science Foundation and the U.S. armed services.

Two members of the expedition are from Oregon. They are Dr. William F. Unsoeld, 36, on leave from Oregon State University where he is an assistant professor of philosophy and religion, and Luther Jerstad, 26, Eugene, a mountain guide and speech instructor at the University of Oregon.

Bids Opened For OTI Phase 2 Work

The apparent low bid for Phase 2 of the new OTI campus construction project was submitted in a joint bid by the Andersen-Westfall Co., Inc., Portland, and the W. H. Shields Co., Eugene.

Their joint bid for the general contract was \$2,516,000.

Bids were open Thursday afternoon in Room 210 in the OTI Administration Building by Jack Hunderup, assistant to the comptroller, Chancellor's Office, State Board of Higher Education.

The apparent low bid on the mechanical contract was \$609,892, submitted by the Temp-Control Corp., Portland, and a low bid of \$225,192 on the electrical work was submitted by Ace Electric, also of Portland.

The contracts will be formally awarded only after the state legislature allocates the funds for the buildings. It is felt that the funds will be allowed in the near future.

Phase 2 of the project includes the Administration Building, Physical Education Building, Physical Plant, Instruction Shop Building and the Library-Commons Building.

Architects Skidmore, Owings and Merrill will have plans on the residence halls and radio isotopes building completed in about six weeks.

A combined contract bid of \$3,605,000 was submitted by the Ot-Awater Company. This bid was in excess of the total low bids on the separate contracts.

Second low bidder on the general contract was the Todd Building Company, Medford, \$2,572,214.

Other electrical bidders and their bids were: Steck Electric, \$234,000; Electrical Construction Company, \$258,000; Ot-Awater Electric, \$255,000 and Montgomery Electric, \$269,643.

Representing the architect firm at the bid openings were Dave Pugh, Harry Stevens and Ned Kirschenbaum.

The Urban Plumbing and Heating Co., Portland, submitted the second low bid of \$618,871 on the mechanical contract and the Electric Corporation, Eugene, was second low for the electrical work at \$227,300.

Ot-Awater submitted a \$2,706,000 basic bid for the third low bid on the general contract.

Other bidders on the mechanical contract were: Lord Brothers, \$630,000; Willis Mechanical, \$640,137 and L. D. Copenhagen, \$713,737.

Goldwater Highlights Hospital Dedication

Dedication of the site of Presbyterian Intercommunity Hospital will be the highlight of a ceremony at the proposed site Sunday, May 19, it was announced today by Ross Ragland, president of the hospital association board of directors.

Principal speaker at the ceremony will be Sen. Barry Goldwater, Arizona. Senator Goldwater, who is an Air Force major general, will be in Klamath Falls that day as a guest of Kingsley Air Force Base at an Armed Forces Day banquet at Kingsley.

"We are most fortunate to have as our principal speaker at the site dedication this renowned American senator," Ragland said.

The public is invited to attend the dedication services which will be held in the approximate site of the hospital building, adjacent to the new Oregon Technical Institute site in McLoughlin Heights. The program will get underway at 2:45 p.m.

Senator Goldwater will fly to the site in a Kingsley-based helicopter where Armed Forces color guard will conduct him to the program platform.

Also present at the ceremony will be county and city officials, area clergymen, the hospital association officers and directors, hospital planners and architects, area Air Force officers, and others.

Air Force principals present for the dedication will include Maj. Gen. Henry Spicer, 25th Air Division commander, McChord Field, Tacoma; Col. Leon W. Grey, Portland Air Defense Sector commander, Adair Air Base, Corvallis; Col. Ed Wittenburger, Kingsley Air Force Base commander, and Col. William Pitts.

Senator Goldwater and other Air Force notables will participate in a banquet and ceremonies closing out Armed Forces Week here May 19. He will arrive in Klamath Falls from Phoenix, Ariz., shortly before the hospital site dedication.

Senator Goldwater is serving his second term in the Senate, having been elected to a Senate post in 1962, and being re-elected in 1968. He is a member of the Senate's powerful Armed Services Committee and the Labor and Public Welfare Committee.

As a major general in the Air Force, Goldwater continues to remain active, and flies the most recent type of jet planes available to the Air Force.

As a member of the Labor and Public Welfare Committee of the Senate, Goldwater maintains an active interest in projects such as the hospital. More than \$1,000,000 was raised locally in an intensive fund-raising campaign to construct the almost-\$3,000,000 project. Additional funds for the project will come from the federal government under the Accelerated Public Works program, or through Hill-Burton funds.

The senator will be introduced by William Sweetland, a member of the board of directors of the hospital.

Dr. Donald Bauer, also a member of the board, is in charge of arrangements for the dedication.

Five KUHS Board Candidates Outline Position

This is the second of a series of three articles—introducing school board candidates who will be running in the May 6 school board election.

Today's story will deal with the five candidates for the two KU school board posts. Thursday's story introduced the city elementary board candidates and the story which will appear in Sunday's Herald and News will be about the county district board candidates.

The KU board candidates were each asked what experience they had in school work, why they were interested in serving on the board and what solutions they proposed for the entire county's school problems which are most

obviously focused on the overcrowded condition at Klamath Union High School.

Each of the candidates has had an opportunity to express his views in a "Letter to the Editor" in this newspaper. The three candidates for the post vacated this year by chairman John D. Voth C. O. Borsting, Frederick (Ted) Hyde, and Bob Frederickson have

availed themselves of this opportunity and expressed their views at length in these letters. Borsting's letter is appearing in today's newspaper.

The candidates for the post in the Plevna (Weyerhaeuser-Stewart-Leno) district, vacated by Borsting, are Lou Kellison and Marvin Furlow. Some of their views will be outlined in this

story. Furlow also submitted a letter outlining his views.

Borsting, who has been serving on the KU board for four years, is vice chairman of the board and a member of the Legislative Committee of the Oregon School Board Association. He is also a member at large of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

His interest in school and youth activities is natural since he has two children presently at KU and two more in grade school.

When Borsting moved from the Weyerhaeuser district it was necessary for him to re-file for election to another district if he was to remain on the school board.

When asked why he was re-filing, Borsting said, "I have been

living with and working on the KU problem for a long while now and would like to see the job through and the solution squared away."

"Because of my work on the board I'm very close to the KU problem and feel that the best solution is the proposed single unit reorganization plan."

"The flexibility this plan has is one of its primary advantages and I feel it will up-grade the education all around. The education in the county's three school districts is of good quality now, but improvement is always possible," Borsting said.

"Some of the other plans proposed this year had merit, but I feel they were only stop-gap measures," he added.

Frederick (Ted) Hyde has two children in KU and two in Rosevelt and is naturally interested in the solution to KU's overcrowded problem.

Being a cattle rancher, he feels his experience in town and country matters has given him a good working knowledge of not only the problems at KU, but also of the problems in the county.

Hall also said the union was seeking to have certain changes made to improve the pension plan at Weyerhaeuser and travel pay for loggers who are required to travel long distances to and from work on their own time.

The wage rates for most of the employees in the lumber industry are far below the average being paid in most other types of industry, Hall stated. Last year the union passed up any wage increase and extended its contracts for another year. The present contract expires on June 1, 1963.

"There is a middle ground to meet on," Hyde said, and he
