Ford Well, Leads Yanks By Angels

It won't require any kind of medical knowledge to establish that all is well with Whitey Ford's left arm.

It's also just as basic to baseball fans that they'll have to find another excuse if they expect the New York Yankees to lose the pennant.

Ford, a clever lefthander with a pizajish sense of humor, was bothered by arm trouble part of last season and he still wasn't feeling right when the current campaign started as he lost his first two games. Yankee batters were quick to point out that a broken-down Ford would cause the world champions to run out of gas.

The Yankees were rolling on a full tank Thursday when Ford threw a four-hit shutout at the Los Angeles Angels in a 7-0 victory. Ford, who after the game said his arm felt stronger than at any time since the 1951 World Series, now has a string of 16 scoreless innings during which he has yielded just six hits.

from first place in the American League after taking a 15-6 shellacking from the Cleveland Indians; the Washington Senators outsluged the Detroit Tigers, 9-4; the Baltimore Orioles beat the Chicago White Sox, 8-7, in a night game; and a scheduled day contest at Minnesota between the Twins and Boston Red Sox was postponed by rain.

In the National League, the St. Louis Cardinals remained in first place by edging the Chicago Cubs, 4-3; the San Francisco Giants topped the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-1; the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2; the Milwaukee Braves whitewashed the Cincinnati Reds, 8-0; and in the lone day contest the New York Mets romped over the Houston Colts, 10-3.

Ford's victory was an important one for the Yankees, who had lost two straight in Los Angeles and were threatened with a drop to the second division. After five scoreless innings, New York broke the game wide open in the sixth on a bases-loaded walk and a grand-slam homer by Joe Pepitone. Two more runs followed in the seventh, one of which came in on a Pepitone single.

Pepitone's homer was his fifth of the season, a club high, and the young first baseman also tops the Yankees in runs-butted-in with 11.

Woody Held cracked a grand slam homer to pace the Indian assault and rookie Vic Davallie contributed a homer and a double. Cleveland bombarded four Kansas City pitchers for 18 hits, including four by Tito Francona, to overcome an early 4-1 deficit. Reliever Barry Latman gained his first victory of the season and Dave Wickersham was charged with his first loss against one win.

First baseman Bobo Osborne, sold by the Tigers to Washington earlier this year, came back to haunt his old teammates with a pair of home runs as Detroit veteran Frank Lary could last only four innings in another comeback attempt. The Tigers got 14 hits off Claude Osteen and Jim Bronstad but stranded 12 runners. It was Bronstad's first success in three decisions and Lary now is 0-2.

Brooks Robinson broke a bad batting slump with a bases-loaded single in the ninth inning as the Orioles erupted for three runs to edge the White Sox. Chicago had a 7-2 lead after four innings and seemed safe behind the strong serves of Juan Pizarro, but Baltimore retaliated with two in the fifth and then narrowed the deficit to 7-5 on Bob Johnson's first home run in the eighth inning. Reliever Dean Stone was the beneficiary of the late rally for his first win and Gary Peters was charged with his second straight loss.

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Records Expected To Fall In Dual Meet At Modoc

Records could fall like autumn leaves Saturday at Modoc Field when the Klamath Union track team will host one of the state's most powerful cinder teams, if not the most powerful, when the Medford Black Tornado comes to town.

This dual meet could be one of the highlights of the season for this area in track and it is expected to produce some record performances. Some new marks to lead the state are expected.

Klamath has one athlete who leads the state in javelin thrower Walt Smith. Medford has the top broad jumper in the state in Jim Hill and the top 800-yard relay team.

They also have some of the best times in the state which are just below the best recorded times. The Pelicans will be hard pressed to stay with the Tornado in the dashes. The Tornado has Mike Debele in the 100 and 220. He has 9.9 and 22.0 clockings in the events. And Hill, the broad-jumper is right on his heels in both events.

Steve Toews has the second best half mile mark in the state with a 1:57.2 clocking. Hill has broad-jumped 22-0½. Debele's 22 flat 220 is the second best in the state.

Klamath is led by Smith who is nearing the state and national record in the javelin. The Pelican junior has hurled the spear 214-½ for the best mark in the state. He is nine feet short of the state record and national record and it is held by Glenn Winghamham of Grants Pass at 225-6½.

Arie DeGroot, one of the fastest improving boys on the KU team, will watch Hill and De-

bele in the dashes and might fool them or at least push them to even better times than they have.

Bill Mills should give the Pelicans some points in the shot put and discus. Mills has one of the best discus throws in the state at 149 feet and that should be enough to win over Medford. He has also set a new school record in the shot put with a heave of 50-0½.

Grover Dahn and Terry Eccles will lead the KU colors in the broad jump and will have to get off their best jumps of the season to match Hill. The Pelicans also should gain some points in the hurdles where Don Graham is improving constantly. He will be pushed by brothers John English and Charlie Church. Church, another youngster on the KU team, is showing promise.

The 330-yard relay team of DeGroot, Dahn, English and Eccles could push the Medford team to an even better clocking than they have to lead the state. They have been clocked in 1:30.7.

The meet begins at 1 p.m. and the freshman team will run simultaneously against the McLoughlin team of Medford. The varsity runs and the freshmen run in the heat following.

Hornets Battle R. River

The Henley Hornets, twice champions of the Rogue League in baseball, will be going after another title Saturday at Gem Stadium when they host the Rogue River Chieftains, surprise winners of the West half of the league, in the first of a three-game series.

The first game is at Gem Stadium and the second game moves to Rogue River next Saturday for one if needed. The Hornets won the second game, and third the East half of the league by downing Sacred Heart twice in succession. The Chieftains won out over Eagle Point and Illinois Valley.

Henley will enter this game with an 8-1 record. The Hornets have been hampered most of the season by bad weather. Rogue River comes into the contest with a 13-2 mark. Henley's only loss came at the hands of the Klamath Jayvees but the Hornets revenge the loss. One of Rogue River's losses was to Eagle Point, the league favorite.

Gary Durfee will start on the mound for Henley. Earl Albritton will be the back-up pitcher and the first baseman. Johnny Cume will be at second, LeVoy Young at short, Steve Reiling at third, Mike Beymer or Gary Barker in left, Ben Stoehler in center and Sam Cox in right. Steve Rund will catch.

Mike O'Brien, a big, strong right-hander, opens for the Chieftains. Bill Cooper will be behind the plate. Vic Lowe at first, Wayne Cook at second, Brad Frazier at third, Dan Dellany at short and Frank Palmerton, Bob Ragoosa, and Pat McCartney in the outfield.

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Musial Sets New Record, Gives Cards Two-Game Lead

Old man Musial ain't what he used to be but he's not yet ready to throw aside his bat in favor of a rocking chair in the sun.

Stan the Man, now 42, got off to a slow start with the St. Louis Cardinals this season after no less an authority than Branch Rickey had suggested he might be excess baggage for the team to carry.

Manager Johnny Keane, however, closed his ears to the advice and waited for Musial to supply his own answer.

That the Man did Thursday night with a three-run, seventh-inning double that lifted the Cardinals to a 4-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs and increased their National League lead to two games. The double enabled Musial to tie Babe Ruth's major league record of 1,356 extra base hits and also raised his career RBI total to 1,901.

"He was a 250-hitter (10 hits in 40 tries this season) when he went to the plate," remarked Keane in the dressing room. "I figured he was just the 250-hitter we needed in that spot."

Musial's big hit cancelled out a three-run ninth-inning homer by Ron Santo and gave Ray Washburn his fifth straight win. A single by Curt Flood and walks to George Altman and Ken Boyer filled the bases and set the stage for Musial's winning hit off ex-teammate Larry Jackson.

The San Francisco Giants beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-1, the Milwaukee Braves romped at the expense of the Cincinnati Reds, 8-0, the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2, and the New York Mets routed the Houston Colts, 10-3, in other National League games.

Juan Marichal, displaying his best form of the season, pitched a five-hitter and struck out seven. Felipe Alou provided him with the runs he needed when he clipped Don Cardwell for a two-run home run in the second inning. Bob Skinner's triple and an infield out produced Pittsburgh's run.

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
