Bidder Set By Discard

Ever so often a really unusual result occurs in a duplicate game. North opened with one club at all tables and usually South wound up at a four spade contract although a couple of pairs stopped at three.

West would make his normal opening lead of the jack of hearts and South would cash his king and queen, enter dummy with the ace of diamonds and lead the ace of hearts. East would ruff with the jack of trumps and South would discard his losing club.

Later, he would lose two spade tricks, but that would be all and he would wind up making four odd.

At one table East simply discarded a diamond instead of ruffing and then South decided he should lead trumps from his own hand. He ruffed a club, led a trump and finessed dummy's seven. East won with the king and led a low club which South ruffed also.

At this point the trap was set and South fell right into it. He was down to two trumps and he led another trump to dummy's nine. Now East produced the jack of trumps and continued with the ace.

West discarded his last diamond and East put him in with the king of clubs so that West made the last three tricks with hearts.

East had helped South work out a play for down four.

Oregon Landscape Art Scheduled At Gallery

The Klamath Art Association will climax its current season of exhibits with an exciting show from the Image Gallery in Portland called "New Landscape."

The show will be open to the public each Sunday in May from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Klamath Art Gallery in Maple Park. The gallery will be closed during June, July and August.

Most of the works included in the "New Landscape" show deal with the Oregon landscape in a general way, but several are very specific in their references.

The magazine, Artforum, in reviewing the exhibit stated, "... it was a very interesting show, rich in color, and indicated that the Oregon landscape does indeed look very different from the oriental mystic landscape of Washington and the arid horizontal landscape of California. Although many of the artists take their inspiration from specific locations, all of the paintings were seasoned with ideas and attitudes which have more to do with contemporary art than regional qualities of the landscape."

Ten artists are represented in the show, including Byron Gardner, art instructor at the Catlin Gabel Schools in Portland; Frederick Heide, head of the art department at Portland State College; Richard Muller, associate professor of art at Portland State College; and Harry Widman, instructor in drawing and painting at the Museum Art School in Portland since 1960.
