Oregon Juvenile Council Conference Scheduled In Klamath Falls Tuesday

The Oregon Juvenile Council will hold its first spring conference ever held in Klamath Falls, 8:30 a.m. through 4:45 p.m., Tuesday, May 7, at the First Presbyterian Church, according to Rosemary Lusk, chairman of the one-day meeting.

More than 100 judges, juvenile officers and welfare workers from various counties throughout the state are expected to be represented at the Tuesday conference which has "group counseling" as its theme.

Principal speaker will be Joe

Cooney, juvenile director of Washington County, who will address the group on how to conduct group counseling from the point of view of the juvenile counselor.

Speakers representing Klamath County will be Leon Clark, secretary of the Klamath County YMCA, who is to address the membership at a no-host luncheon at Molare's Restaurant and Circuit Court Judge Donald A. W. Piper, who will deliver the welcoming address.

Three other county residents will participate in a panel discussion

at 10:45 a.m., including Mildred Lowdon, Mental Health Clinic; Betty Williams, Child Welfare Division of the Klamath County Welfare Department, and Gene Stivers, instructor of psychology at the Oregon Technical Institute. Rev. Andrew A. Jarvis of the Mt. Laki Presbyterian Church will deliver the invocation.

Those among the public desiring to attend are requested to indicate their intention to the Klam-

ath County Juvenile Office (TU 2-2501) and also state in which fields group counseling would be of benefit to them.

The Oregon Juvenile Council meets twice annually with a conference in Portland each fall and another in spring at one of various other cities in the state.

Klamath County is in District 4 of the council, along with Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson, Harney and Lake counties.
