feels his experience qualifies him to explore that middle ground. Hyde is opposed to the single district plan because he says there is a better solution. "I feel the single county district plan has merit, but I'd rather see cooperation before consolidation. Forced consolidation will unnecessarily alienate a large segment of the community. The problem can be worked out on a middle ground," Hyde said. Hyde strongly supports the proposal submitted Thursday by the county school board. He feels that the perry-mander plan is a good equitable solution and will be good for education. Bob Fredrickson is another candidate with children in the school system. One is a junior in KU and the other is in the eighth grade. Fredrickson is interested in a solution of KU's problems because he naturally wants "the best education possible for my children." He has been in business in Klamath Falls for the past 10 years and feels that his business experience qualifies him for a school board post because, "you need good business management on the school board."

"Schools should be organized and operated like a business and they shouldn't have unlimited funds to work with," Fredrickson said. "There are many extra curricular activities at Klamath Union that should either be adjusted or eliminated. There is also a lot of overlapping that must be cut out," he said. Fredrickson is a proponent of a metro-county plan because he feels it is a logical solution to have the urban and rural schools under separate jurisdictions. He said in a "Letter to the Editor" Thursday, "As I have always maintained, our school problem is a metropolitan problem, and must be met by the people in this area. Why must we always involve those taxpayers in the county with our headaches in the metro area?" Marvin Furlow, who is opposing Lou Kellison for the post vacated by Borsting, has a son in KU and was a former member of the Seventh-day Adventist school board for 2 1/2 years. Furlow said he is still reviewing all the proposals for solutions to the school problem and has not yet decided which is the best workable solution for our needs. He feels, however, that the community must become more realistic in its approach to education.

"If the citizens want more entertainment in school, they must provide the money, the room and the teachers. In my opinion we should have the best education we can afford, and draw a sharp line between education and entertainment. I am against including golfing, skiing, bowling etc., in our high school curriculum."

"In my opinion the classroom teacher providing the actual teaching deserves more consideration and recognition. "I want the best education we can afford for our children," Furlow said. Like all the other candidates, Lou Kellison, has a child in the city school system. One of his children is at KU now and the other is a KU graduate. Lou has been a member of the county budget committee for the past two years and feels he has an understanding of both city and county school problems. He supports the proposed single district reorganization because he feels it would make for the fairest distribution of the tax burden for the majority of the Klamath County residents. "It hasn't seemed to me that any of the proposals, with the exception of the single district plan, struck a happy medium for the majority of the people."

"The single district plan would provide for better representation and a more responsible administration by putting the leadership under one roof. It would do nothing to upset the good education program we already have in all the school districts, but instead, would probably improve education for all," he said. Kellison, who has been in the retail lumber business for 22 years, feels that his experience will help him make school board decisions because these decisions, he said, must be based on sound business principles.

Bail Posted On Hit-Run

The crash occurred at 11:16 p.m. at the intersection of South Sixth and Market streets. Willie C. Judges Set Four Trial Dates

The trial dates for four people indicted by the Klamath County grand jury last week were set by Judges David R. Vandenberg and Donald A. W. Piper following pleas of not guilty entered by the defendants in the county's two circuit courts early today. In Circuit Court No. 2, Judge Piper reduced the amount of bail for Russell Wayne Long, 22, charged with attempt to cause escape, from \$2,500 to \$1,500 and set Tuesday, June 18, as the date for trial. Long was indicted for assisting a companion escape from city police last April 23 after the pair had been arrested with two others in connection with causing destruction to a service station restroom. Meanwhile in Circuit Court No. 1, Judge Vandenberg set two trial dates and continued the hearing of a demurrer filed in behalf of Ellis Ray Roache, 27, accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, until a time to be set later. Roache was to enter a plea this morning but the judge set the case aside after his attorney indicated that the demurrer had been presented to the district attorney.

In one of the other two matters, Judge Vandenberg set Monday, May 13 as the date for the trial of Harvey Blevins, 21, and Raymond Gregory, 27, accused of acting together in the burglary of a dwelling belonging to Gene Autry Sellers, 218 Martin Street. The jurist also set Monday, May 27, for the trial of Johnnie A. Phillips, 37, charged with obtaining money and property by false pretense. Phillips, currently serving a one-year sentence in the county jail for the larceny of some refrigerators from a local auto court last year, is accused of issuing worthless checks in the amount of \$48.36 to a local store, March 17, 1962. The attorney for Phillips indicated that his client would plead not guilty by reason of insanity or mental defect.

In court Thursday, Judge Vandenberg instructed Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton to appear before the bench by May 21 to show cause why he should not be cited for contempt. The charge is the result of an incident in which he discussed the trial of Robert Huit with a jurist sitting in judgment of the case. As a result of the conversation, Judge Vandenberg granted a mistrial for Huit on the recommendation of the deputy district attorney and the defense attorney. Huit had been on trial on a charge assault with a dangerous weapon.

Horse Ride Clinic Opens

A three-day riding-training clinic opens at 7:30 p.m. tonight in the Klamath County Fairgrounds Exhibit Building with the showing of a motion picture on how to make a "Flying Change of Leads." Tonight's showing is the first of a clinic being conducted by nationally known Monte Foreman and available to the public. This film shows how to break to a trot to change leads, how to start on either lead on call, what a roll-back is, how to achieve it, when to ask for a "sliding stop" and the aids to get it. The clinic continues Saturday morning at 10 a.m. when he demonstrates on two horses the items shown on the film, Manual Caradza from Southern California will assist in the demonstrations. At 1 p.m. Saturday, those desiring may bring their own horses and ride under Foreman's coaching. You can receive help with any special problem you have with your horse. The fourth session will be decided on by the group. It may be more movies, a session on cutting horses, barrel racing or roping, or a combination of two or more of them. This session will be held Sunday afternoon at 1 p.m. Those who have not registered for the sessions can do so at the time the various sessions begin at the Klamath County Fairgrounds.

Mark Sends First Veto

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield returned his first veto of the 1963 legislature Thursday. He vetoed a bill that would have added an optometrist to the State Commission for the Blind. The governor returned the bill to the House, where it originated. The veto seemed likely to stand. The bill passed the House after some debate 34-23. It would take two-thirds of the House, or 40 votes, to override, plus two-thirds of the Senate, where the bill passed 24-3. In his veto message, Hatfield said the bill "places unnecessary restrictions" on appointments to the Commission for the Blind. "It embodies a policy of giving special interest recognition to at least one professional group," he said.

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Worker Compensation Bill To Be Attempted

SALEM (UPI)—Members of the House Committee on Labor and Industries decided informally Thursday to try to get out a workmen's compensation bill this session. But they termed the Senate-passed bill before them "a mess." The House committee heard nearly four hours of testimony on a bill to overhaul the state's 50-year-old program of industrial accident benefits for injured workmen. Labor and industry witnesses, who fought bitterly over workmen's compensation in 1961, indicated they may be closer than ever to a compromise. The House committee said it plans to hold a series of hearings to hear from all interested parties: Employers, labor, the insurance industry, the State Industrial Accident Commission. Members also said they would like to visit the commission to see how claims are handled, and make similar inspections of how self-insuring employers, or private insurance firms, would deal with the injured worker. Committee members conceded it would be a big job for the few remaining weeks of the legislative session, which hopes to adjourn late this month. The Senate bill abandons the state monopoly sought by labor. On the other hand, it provides for less private insurance than management would like. It would give employer three choices: Insurance through the state system, self-insurance for a "direct responsibility employer" who could afford to post his own bond, and self-insurance with the backing of a private firm. It includes these features: Universal coverage (including farmers); a revamp of the state administrative agency and its claims procedures; appeals; a review board; jury trial; and a 20 percent increase in benefits. Labor said the bill provides for too many employers to insure outside the state system. Labor also said the claims of these employers should be processed through the state system. Management objected to a feature where an employer would be unable to initiate an appeal unless a worker carried a case to the review board level.

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Jensen Directs Music Festival

LaMar K. Jensen, director of instrumental music in Klamath Falls School System will be one of the directors of the Alturas Music Festival again this year. The festival will be held May 4. Jensen will rehearse and direct in concert a large festival massed band made up of students from the junior high and upper elementary schools in the Alturas area of Northern California and Lakeview. Jensen will also present a clinic for directors and students on problems of teaching and care of woodwind instruments. The festival is being sponsored by the Modoc County Superintendent of Schools' office, and will close with a concert the evening of May 4, in the Modoc High School gym.

Grange Slates Charter Night

The new Agency Lake Grange is to receive its charter at a meeting on Tuesday, May 7, at the hall. Allen P. Wheeler, master of the Oregon State Grange, will make the presentation of the charter to the newly formed grange. The meeting will open with a 6:30 p.m. potluck dinner. All members are urged to attend, and visitors are also invited for this important meeting.

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
