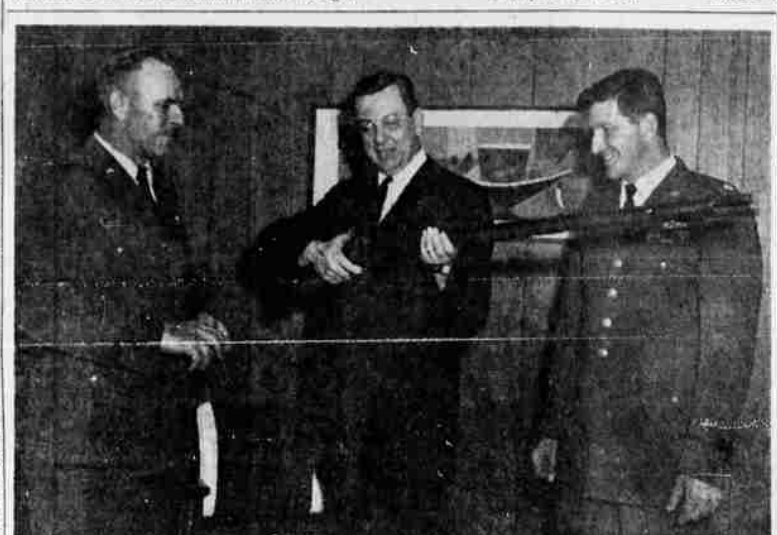

Inventor Honored By Telegraph Club

The new formed Klamath Chapter, Morse Telegraph Club, joined all of the other chapters throughout the United States and Canada to honor the 172nd birthday of Samuel F. B. Morse, inventor of the telegraph, on April 27.

Approximately 30 members and friends attended the banquet at the Eagles Hall and following dinner were guests of the Eagles for an evening of dancing, according to John L. Atkinson, president of the Klamath chapter.

The local chapter was established last February and this occasion was the first time that Klamath Falls was represented on the circuit. The club has more than 50,000 members throughout North America.

Anyone in the area wishing to join the Klamath chapter may contact Mrs. Ethelda M. Croft, secretary-treasurer, at Rte. 2, Box 535, Klamath Falls. The club's next meeting will be held in July.

A nationwide Morse telegraph circuit was installed in the club rooms through the courtesy of Western Union, and greetings were received from President Kennedy commemorating the vital role the telegraph and telegraphers have played in the development of the nation.

Congratulations on the formation of the chapter here were received from all parts of the country and Canada, with personal greetings among the members also exchanged. The circuit extended from Montreal, Quebec, to Los Angeles and from Atlanta, Ga., to Vancouver, British Columbia. Contact was made with more than 50 offices by the local chapter.

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Radio Exams Slated At OTI May 18

Examinations for operators of radiotelegraph, radiotelephone, and amateur code are scheduled in the Electronics Building, Oregon Technical Institute, on Saturday, May 18, according to the Federal Communications Commission at Portland.

The times for the examinations follow: Radiotelegraph, all code and written tests, 8:30 a.m.; Radiotelephone, all classes, 9 a.m.; Amateur written tests, general and extra, 1 p.m.

Examinations will begin promptly and no variation from the schedule will be permitted due to the limited time allowed for the tests.

Radio operators who desire credit for previous exams or who hold valid licenses must present the licenses and verification cards, if any, for credit at the time of the examination.

Pencils, pens and ink are to be provided by the applicants and those desiring code tests must also bring telephone receivers.

Blank application forms 610 (amateur), 736 and 736-B (commercial) will be furnished upon request to FCC, Room 201, U.S. Courthouse, Portland 3, Ore., and will also be available at the college before the examination.

Radio operator licenses are issued only to citizens of the United States, except in the cases of certain aircraft pilots needing radio permits. Those applicants having citizenship certificates should bring with them data relative to the number, date, name of court, and the place that the document was issued.
