The Klamath Union Jayvee baseball club continued their winning ways at Wright Field Saturday afternoon by downing the Grants Pass JV team in a double-header, 2-1 and 7-4.

The Pelicans had to rally in the seventh inning to take the first game. Steve Young was the winning pitcher. He walked only two and whiffed ten in allowing only three hits to the Cavemen.

The first game was tied at 1-1 going into the seventh. With one out Bob Williams, who had just returned from competing in the track meet, got on first by a fielder's choice which was the second out. Young reached first on an error and Dave Lyman smacked his third single of the day to drive Williams home with the winning run. Lyman had three for four on the day. Alan Kenyon and Tom Schiff each had two hits. Those three accounted for all seven hits by the Pels. Hummel got two of the three Cavemen hits.

The second game was called at the end of four by mutual agreement with the Pelicans taking a 7-4 win. Jack Patzke started, was relieved by Jim Bridges in the fourth and he got the win. Mike McKibben was the hitting hero in the second game with a bases loaded double for three runs to win the game.

The Cavemen didn't get a hit in the second game. All their runs were scored on passed balls and wild pitches.

Giants Clobber NY Mets

NEW YORK (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants exploded six home runs, two each by Orlando Cepeda and Ed Bailey, to crush the New York Mets, 17-4, Saturday for their fifth straight victory.

Felipe Alou and Jim Davenport also hit home runs as the Giants extended their road record to eight wins in nine games for the young season. Lefty Bill O'Dell, who retired after six innings because of soreness behind his right shoulder, breezed to his third victory without defeat.

All except Bailey's second homer were hit off Mets' starter Roger Craig. Alou's two-run homer in the first started the assault. Cepeda hit a pop-fly bases-empty home run and Davenport hit a three-run blast in the fourth.

Cepeda and Bailey hit back-to-back homers during a three-run eruption that routed Craig in the fifth. Bailey's two-run homer capped a five-run barrage against rookie Don Rose in the sixth. Davenport, who hit a two-run triple and two singles in addition to his homer, drove in five runs and Cepeda knocked in four.

The Mets narrowed San Francisco's lead to 6-4 in the fourth with the help of a three-run homer by Norm Sherry but were shut out the rest of the way by O'Dell and reliever Gaylord Perry.

Pirates Rap Dodgers, 5-0

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Right-hander Don Schwall shook off an arm bruise and pitched a four-hitter Saturday to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 5-0 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Schwall was hit on the pitching arm by an errant throw during the start of the sixth inning but the blow, while painful, proved not serious.

Dick Schofield provided Schwall with his biggest batting support, hitting a bases-loaded single in the second inning and touching off a two-run seventh inning with another single.

Portland State Axes Owls In Three Games

PORTLAND — The Portland State Vikings, defending league baseball champion and powerhouse this season, downed the pesky and fighting Oregon Tech Owls three times this weekend.

The Vikings won the Friday game 4-0 despite a very fine four-hit pitching job by Dave Ferres who lost another heartbreaker.

The Owls got four hits also off winner Gordon Reese, one of the leading hurlers in the league.

The Owls lost the second game after seemingly having it in the bag. They led the Vikings 2-0 going into the seventh inning when the Viks pulled out three runs and the victory.

The third game of the set went only four full innings because of

rain and the Viks were in a 7-0 lead at the time.

"We errored the first game away," said Coach Jim Partlow. "We played pretty good ball at times. We should have scored some runs but didn't. That Reese (Gordon) struck out 15."

"We probably played our best game of the season in the Saturday morning game despite rain and a muddy field. Pitcher Jim Keller, who seems finally to have found his hitting eye, drove in the first run in the third with a single and slammed a home run in the fifth for the other tally.

But the Viks came back to score three runs to win in the bottom of the seventh. Keller walked Reese and the Owls got one out on a sacrifice to move Reese to second. The next two singled to tie the game at 2-2. Another base-on-balls by Keller and a final single pushed the third run across.

"Keller pitched real good ball. It was a shame he had to lose that game," said Partlow. "The second game was all Portland State. They got to Edwards (Mac) for a couple of home runs and were tagging him pretty well," Partlow said.

This closed out the season for the Owls. They finished the league with a 2-11 Oregon Collegiate Conference record. They played only two other games against a non-conference foe College of Siskiyous. The first game finished in a 3-2 tie in 10 innings and the Eagles won the second meeting.

The third OTI player, Larry Brown, suffered a 2 1/2 to 1 1/2 defeat at the hands of Dave Pappin. Dave Elrod of Oregon Tech got one point to two by OCE's Ferguson. Greg Wilgus was the only Owl golfer shut out. He was beaten by Darrel Brandt, 3-0.

Redlegs Shutout Cards

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Home runs by Frank Robinson and Gordy Coleman backed the four-hit pitching of Jim Maloney Saturday as the Cincinnati Reds defeated St. Louis, 6-0, and dropped the Cardinals out of the National League lead.

Maloney was shaky in the first four innings when St. Louis stranded baserunners, but settled down later as the Cardinals were blanked for the second straight day and dropped into a tie for second place behind the Pittsburgh Pirates.

A walk to rookie Pete Rose and a single by Vada Pinson preceded Robinson's fourth homer of the season in the third inning. Moments later, Coleman, who had been hitless in 30 consecutive at-bats going into the game, clouted a long home run into the right field bleachers.

The Cardinals had one more chance in the seventh when Maloney hit two batters and walked one to load the bases with two out. But the young right-hander sneaked a slow curve past George Altman for a third strike to end the threat.

In all, Maloney struck out 10 in gaining his third victory against one defeat.

Cancer Defeats Old Pro

HOUSTON (UPI)—Richard H. (Dickey) Kerr, the honest hero of the 1919 World Series, died Saturday of cancer at the age of 69.

Kerr died at his home with his wife, Cora, and a few other relatives at his bedside. He had been unconscious except for brief spells since Tuesday.

Kerr, a rookie pitcher at the time, won two games in the 1919 World Series for the Chicago White Sox while eight of his teammates were trying to throw the series.

Up until the time of his death, Kerr still did not understand why he was such a hero to the public when the 1919 scandal broke.

"It always did seem funny to me that so much fuss could be made over a man being honest," Dickey would say.

Kerr discovered he had cancer when he took a hospital checkup last March. By that time it was too late to stop it. The only treatment he was given were blood transfusions to give him strength.

Kerr is survived by his widow; an adopted son, Ray Grant, of New York; two brothers, Art Kerr of St. Louis and Al Kerr of Brookline, Mass.; and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services are expected to be held sometime Monday at the Woodridge Baptist church in Houston. Burial will be in the Forest Park Cemetery.

Baltimore Tips Tigers

DETROIT (UPI) — John (Boog) Powell and Jackie Brandt each slammed two-run homers Saturday to back up Steve Barber's four-hit pitching and lead the Baltimore Orioles to an 8-4 win over the cellar-dwelling Detroit Tigers.

Barber was touched for fourth inning homers by Jake Wood and Al Kaline. Kaline also added a solo homer in the ninth. But Barber was in control most of the way while boosting his record to 5-2 and handling the slumping Tigers their 12th defeat in the last 15 games.

Yankees Top Twins, 3-2

ST. PAUL MINNEAPOLIS (UPI)—Reliever Hal Reniff put down a ninth-inning rally by the Minnesota Twins Saturday and saved a 3-2 New York Yankee victory, powered by homers by Elton Howard and Mickey Mantle.

New Yorker starter Stan Williams had a two-hit shutout going with two outs in the ninth when the Twins started their last-ditch battle. Bob Allison, who walked, and Jim Hall, who singled, rode home on Earl Battey's long double to left.

New York manager Ralph Houk summoned Reniff, who ended the game by getting Bernie Allen on a grounder.
