Manager Eddie Lopat insisted it had nothing to do with the gaudy new uniforms, he said it was sound pitching instead.
Well, here the season is nearly a month old and the A's are up there, prouder than peacocks, in first place.
Lopat still says the pitching is doing it.
Dodger reject Ed Rakow backed up Lopat's contention Friday night when he paced the Athletics to a 3-1 victory with a four-hit, eight-strikeout effort against the Boston Red Sox.

A's Rally In Seventh
Loser — Bill Monbouquette blanked the A's until the seventh when they rallied for all their runs to help Rakow register his third victory.
Elsewhere in the AL, the New York Yankees overcame the Minnesota Twins 4-3 in 10 innings, the Washington Senators won their third straight by beating the Chicago White Sox 5-2, the Cleveland Indians defeated the Los Angeles Angels 2-1, and the Baltimore Orioles downed the slumping Detroit Tigers 8-5.
In the National League, the San Francisco Giants defeated the New York Mets 5-3, the Cincinnati Reds blanked the St. Louis Cardinals 6-0, the Chicago Cubs outlasted the Milwaukee Braves 10-7, the Pittsburgh Pirates shelled the Los Angeles Dodgers 13-2, and the Philadelphia Phillies edged the Houston Colts 4-3.
Boyer Hits Winner
Clete Boyer's 10th inning home-

run off Dick Stigman broke up a 3-3 tie between the Yankees and Twins after Earl Battey had knotted the score with a two-run homer off winner Bill Stafford in the sixth.
Left-hander Don Rudolph set down the White Sox on five hits and contributed a double and a single to the Senators' 13-hit offensive.
Gary Bell's steady relief pitching after starter Sam McDowell was felled by a batted ball gave the Indians their victory over the Angels. Taking over in the second inning, Bell checked the Angels on five hits over the next 6 2/3 innings before yielding to Ron Nischwitz in the ninth.
Home runs by relief pitcher Les Narum, Bob Johnson, Luis Aparicio and Joe Gaines powered the Orioles to a come-from-behind victory over the Tigers. Reliever Wes Stock hurled hitless ball over the last four innings to gain his third victory without a loss.

'Bonus Baby' Bailey Drives Bucs By Bums

Bonus baby Bob Bailey of Pittsburgh says his ambition is to make the Hall of Fame and although no one has ever discovered a short cut, he sure seems in a hurry to get there.
The Pirates never have divulged how much they actually gave the 20-year-old third baseman to sign with them. Estimates range from \$150,000 to \$200,000 but Friday night he looked like a million dollars.
Bailey drove in five runs with a pair of homers and a single in a devastating one-man show that paced the Pirates to a 13-2 romp over the Los Angeles Dodgers.
Supported by that kind of an attack, Al McBean breezed to his second victory with a six-hit effort. Larry Sherry was kayoed in the fourth and went down to his second defeat.

Reds Blank Cards
The Pirates thus moved within a game of the first-place St. Louis Cardinals, who were blanked 6-0 by the Cincinnati Reds. The San Francisco Giants beat the New York Mets 5-3, the Chicago Cubs downed the Milwaukee Braves 10-7, and the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Houston Colts 4-3.
In the American League, the Kansas City A's regained first place with a 3-1 victory over the Boston Red Sox, the New York Yankees scored a 10-inning 4-3 win over the Minnesota Twins, the Washington Senators bowled over the Chicago White Sox 5-2, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Detroit Tigers 8-5, and the Cleveland Indians shaded the Los Angeles Angels 2-1.
Southpaw Joe Nuxhall held the Cardinals to five hits and fanned eight in winning his first game of the season. Leo Cardenas homered off loser Ernie Broglio (3-1) in the third inning and rookie Pete Rose highlighted a four-run fifth inning with his first major league homer.

Fisher Stops Mets
Giant pitcher Jack Fisher pitched a six-hitter against the Mets and won his own game with a two-run double off loser Jay Hook (0-4) in the seventh. Duke Snider belted a pair of homers off Fisher, who is now 2-2.
Lou Brock singled home what proved to be the winning run for the Cubs in the eighth inning of their game with the Braves. Warren Spahn started for Milwaukee but was routed in the third inning after yielding a three-run homer to Ron Santo. Billy Williams and Ernie Banks also homered for the Cubs in the ninth off loser Claude Raymond (3-3) while Hank Aaron belted his ninth homer for the Braves and Len Gabrielson connected for his second. Reliever Jim Brewer (2-0) was the winning pitcher.
Roy Sievers' pinch double with the bases loaded plus an error by second baseman Johnny Temple on the relay from the outfield comprised a three-run sixth inning rally that enabled the Phillies to nip the Colts. Loser Bob Bruce (1-2) was the victim of the rally. Jack Hamilton, third of four Philadelphia pitchers, was the winner.

U.S. Teams Fired By Anti-Yank Show
SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) — United States track and field athletes, fired up by the riotous anti-Yank demonstration that accompanied the U.S. men's basketball victory, aimed to make Saturday, the final day of competition, Uncle Sam's greatest of the Pan American games.
There are eight gold medals up for grabs — six in men's events and two in women's — and there is a chance that the United States will win 'em all. In addition, the United States can win two gold medals in boxing to add to its current overall total of 96 in the games.
Pete McArdle, upset winner of the 10,000-meter run last Wednesday, is a favorite to add to the marathon to his credit today in the first of the track and field events to start. The highlight of the program will be the duel between sub-four-minute miler Jim Beatty of Los Angeles, Calif., and Jim Grelle of Los Angeles in the classic 1500-meter run. The two stars, without foreseeable opposition from their rivals, should top the 3:49.1 Pan American Games mark set by Dyrrol Burleson in 1959 but are unlikely to beat Herb Elliott's world mark of 3:35.6.

Other Events
Other events scheduled are the hop, step and jump; javelin and the finals in the men's 400 and 1600 meter relays. The United States also has favored entries in the women's 80-meter hurdle and 400-meter relay finals.
The final day of competition — only one equestrian event will accompany Sunday's closing ceremony — comes after a day on which the United States won nine gold medals to increase its game total to 96.
The most memorable, by far, was the U.S. men's basketball victory achieved with a 78-66 victory over Brazil before a roaring crowd of 25,000 which staged a near-riot in the closing seconds of the game. The fans, many of whom paid 10 times the face value of the 30-cent admission charge, roared, sang and hammered on cymbals throughout the entire women's and men's games.
U.S. Girls Upset
The crowd was encouraged to expect a men's upset by Brazil when the Brazilian women upset the U.S. girls 63-48 and forced a playoff for the gold medal to tonight. Fans screamed, yelled and pleaded for another upset in the men's game but the U.S. men were just too tall and slick for their rivals.
Earlier, the United States picked up three unexpected gold medals in women's synchronized swimming and one in men's team saber fencing to add to the four big track and field gold medals won in the afternoon.
The victories in synchronized swimming were scored by Barbara Burke of Los Angeles, in the dual, Roberta Armstrong of Paso Robles, Calif., in the individual, and by the U.S. team on overall points.
Hurdler Blaine Lindgren, broad jumper Ralph Boston and hammer thrower Al Hall set meet records in the afternoon. A 16-year-old Cleveland high school girl, Eleanor Montgomery, added a gold medal in the women's high jump.

Yakima Team Bus Wrecks
PORTLAND (UPI) — A bus carrying the Yakima baseball team of the Northwest League to Salem was destroyed by fire on U.S. Highway 30 about 20 miles east of here Friday.
None of the vehicle's passengers was injured.
The blaze destroyed the team's uniforms and equipment along with suitcases containing personal clothing. It began in the baggage locker in the rear of the bus above the engine.
Clarence (Buddy) Hicks, manager of the Bears, placed the value of the bus at \$5,000.
A bus from Portland took the team to Salem where it opened a four-game series with a 9-2 win over the Salem Dodgers.
The Bears borrowed and bought uniforms and equipment at Salem.

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Ho Hum! Fight Delayed

NEW YORK (UPI) — The unlucky return Sonny Liston-Floyd Patterson heavyweight title fight at Las Vegas, Nev., was committed Saturday to a third postponement from June 27 to July 22, because of the removal of a "benign tumor" from ex-champion Patterson's right fist.
Announcing the postponement, promoter Al Bolan of Championship Sports, Inc., said, "Floyd consented to the postponement only when his surgeon insisted Friday that he positively refrain from using his right fist in training for about four weeks."
In Denver, Colo., the usually sullen, 220-pound Liston grunted, "It's okay with me" — a remark which amounted to a roar of approval from the champion, whose injured left knee forced the previous postponement from April 10 and the transfer of the bout from Miami Beach, Fla., to Las Vegas, Nev.
Patterson's surgeon, Dr. Edwin H. Douglass Jr., of Newburgh, N.Y., explained Saturday.
"I removed a benign tumor about the size of a dime from between the fourth and fifth knuckles of Patterson's right hand last Saturday and when he visited me yesterday I had to forbid him from using the right fist (for punching) for at least a month."
Bolan indicated it was he—not Patterson—who actually forced the issue of the new postponement.
"We realized that a three-week layoff by Patterson from any punching with the right hand probably would force an ultimate postponement and we didn't want to have a reputation of what happened in Florida."
The return bout originally was scheduled for the Miami Beach Fla., Convention Hall of April 4 and then was postponed to April 10 in order to give Liston more time to train. Then a pulled cartilage in Liston's left knee—suffered while demonstrating his golf prowess to a young admirer—forced Liston to ask for a new postponement.
Liston won the heavyweight title with a first-round kayo of Patterson at Chicago last Sept. 23.
