

Land Fraud Protection Approved In Committee

SALEM (UPI)—A bill aimed at protecting the public from "fraud, deceit and misrepresentation" in land sales won approval Friday of the House Committee on Planning and Development.

The bill itself states there is a "need" for such legislation. The bill is based on providing late evaluations of subdivided lands offered for sale within Oregon.

Under the measure, a subdivider would have to file notice of his intention to sell or lease lands with the Real Estate Commissioner.

He would have to furnish information about the lands, and post a surety bond to guarantee completion of promised improvements.

The Real Estate Commissioner would be authorized to examine the lands, except in cases where a political subdivision already was equipped to do the same thing.

The commissioner then would issue a report on the lands. A copy of the report then would be furnished to any prospective purchaser.

Other Highlights

Education—A bill to phase out special scholarship treatment for college students from Alaska and Hawaii passed the Oregon House and went to the Senate.

Fish—A bill revising commercial fish processor and dealer licenses was signed by the governor, the third in a package of four.

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Armed Robber Taps Store At Weed

The Safeway Store at Weed was robbed of approximately \$500 at about 9:15 p.m. Friday by an armed robber who showed clerks a pistol and ordered them to open the safe and cash register.

David L. Dawson, chief of city police at Weed, said the thief was the last man in the store and as clerks were checking him out with a bag of groceries he showed a pistol in his belt and made them open the cash register and safe.

Police got an idea of the thief's identity when the wife of one of the clerks pulled up along side a vehicle in front of the store and

noticed there was a man in it and the motor was running. The woman, seeing that only one person was left in the store, became suspicious and wrote down the car's license number.

A road block was set up by city, county and state police from both California and Oregon as soon as the clerk reported the theft.

Weed police feel that more than one car was involved in the theft since a car of the original description was unknowingly checked through a road block at the Grenada cutoff on U.S. 99 in California.

The car was thoroughly investigated, but the officers at the road block found nothing suspicious in it. All Siskiyou law-enforcement agencies including the California and Oregon State Police are cooperating in the search.

The Weed City Police requested the state of California send a man from the California Identification Investigation Agency to Weed to make a rough sketch of the suspect from the description that the clerk could detail.

All the groceries that the robber left are being powdered for finger prints by the Weed police.

son is a graduate of Henley High and he feels that he is familiar with both city and county problems.

Flowers, who is a former master of the county grange, feels that city and rural interests aren't the same and the single district proposal doesn't appear to be logical because of the conflicting interests.

"I'm still studying the proposed solutions, however, and I can't rule out any plan yet," he said. Flowers is primarily interested in running for the board post because he wants to be sure taxes

are spent as well as they can be.

B. M. Antle, a Weyerhaeuser employe, served on the Fairhaven Elementary School Board for two terms and has been active in Parents and Patrons work. He is past president of Parents and Patrons at the Fairhaven School.

Antle was appointed to the county school board a few months ago when one of the board members resigned, and is interested in keeping the post because he has a son at Henley and a child in the first grade. An older daughter is a graduate of KU.

"The plan proposed by the Klamath County School District Board of Directors will meet the needs of all the children in the entire county. It can give the

suburban people a choice of where these children shall attend high school and do it much sooner than any other plan," he said.

"From past experience in trying to reach agreement with city boards, I believe it would be impossible to reach a decision on even a building site within a year.

"Equalization would only be in dollars and not education. I think this is one of the most serious problems facing our people and urge everyone most sincerely to consider all the people affected by their decision," Antle said.

Klamath citizens can begin solving the serious school problem by voting in their respective areas, Monday, May 6.
