Art Exhibit On Display At Library

The annual International School
Art Exhibit is now on display in
the foyer of the county library
building, 126 South Third Street.
Paintings from high school stu-
dents in 12 foreign countries and
an equal number from high
schools in the United States are
included.

The International School art
program is jointly sponsored by
the National Art Education Asso-
ciation and the American Red
Cross. Each year art students in
high schools are invited to submit
art work which they wish to con-
tribute to the program to promote
international understanding
through art.

Since the program's inception
in 1947 over 75,000 paintings have
been accepted as contributions
from American students to 48 Red
Cross societies throughout the
world. Approximately 15,000 paintings
have been received in re-
turn from these societies and have
been distributed among the high
schools in the United States.

From 4,000 to 7,000 students par-
ticipate in the program each year.
Eight hundred and sixty-five pic-
tures were contributed from Pa-
cific Area high schools in 1962,
including art work from students
at Fremont Junior High, Klamath
Union High School and Sac-
red Heart Academy.

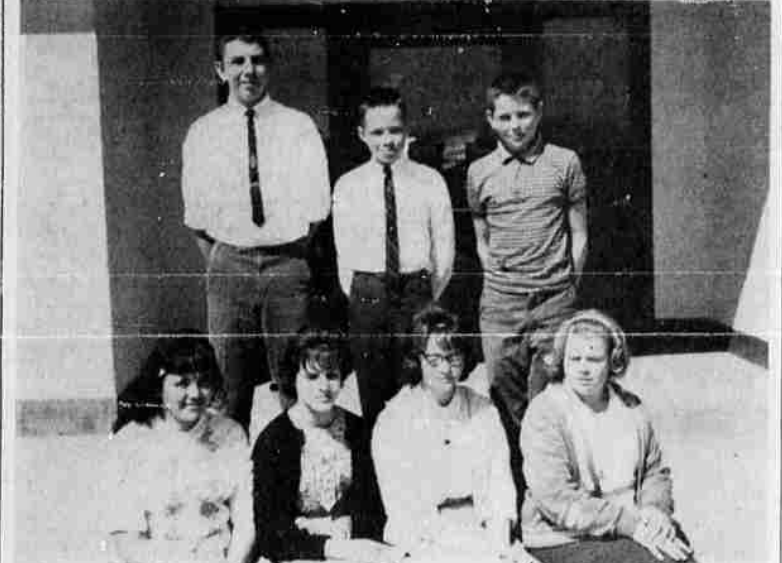
The office of educational re-
lations of the Red Cross emphasizes
that work need not be a painting
done specifically for this pro-
gram; paintings that reflect the
personal expression of the young
artists, maintaining a high level
of art quality, make a suitable
contribution to the International
School art program. Underlying
this emphasis is the assumption
that the sincere, honest art of a
teenager requires personal involve-
ment and the expression of experi-
ence.

Art contributions by two Klam-
ath Union High School students
were outstanding among the
hundreds of pictures contributed
in 1962. Jean Sterrett's "City"
and Tom Gross's "Swamp House"
were selected to be included in a
group of 37 pictures to be repre-
sentative of the highest quality of
personal and artistic communica-
tion between students of this
country and other countries.
These pictures are now on tour
throughout the United States be-
fore being sent overseas.

The public is invited to view
the exhibit which includes pic-
tures from Sweden, Belgium,
Canada, South Viet Nam, Okin-
awa, South Africa, Puerto Rico,
Thailand, Japan, Greece and In-
dia. Mrs. Stephen Walker, Red
Cross "Volunteer" chairman, is
in charge of the program for the
local chapter.

Rectal Cancer Death Toll Estimated 40,000 In 1963

Cancer of the colon and rectum
will take some 40,000 lives in 1963,
if present rates continue. This,
despite the fact that most patients
with the disease could be saved,
according to Mrs. John Dickinson,
publicity chairman of the local
chapter of the American Cancer
Society.

Today, according to the Ameri-
can Cancer Society, some three
out of four patients with cancer
of the colon and rectum could be
saved if the disease is detected
when it is localized, and before
it has infected other parts of the
body.

"When other areas of the body
are involved, the cure rate drops
drastically."

Because of the high incidence
and the high potential cure rate
of cancer of the colon and rectum,
the American Cancer Society, as a
part of its annual April fund-
raising and educational crusade,
is urging all adult men and women
to have a proctoscopic examina-
tion with the annual checkup.

Proctoscopy is a simple proce-
dure by which a physician can ex-

amine the lower colon and
rectum for possible early cancer.

"This," the society said,
"should be an integral part of
an annual health checkup."

They added that "the potential-
ities of saving lives of persons with
cancer of the colon and rectum are
so great that special efforts
should be made to inform the pub-
lic about the frequency and seri-
ousness of this form of cancer, and
also to persuade men and women
to have a proctoscopic examina-
tion which could lead to diag-
nosis of the disease when it may
still be curable."

However, the American Cancer
Society explained that despite the
excellent means we have for
controlling cancer of the colon
and rectum, there is a "highly
discouraging factor."

A study made for the American
Cancer Society has revealed that

only 13 per cent of the adult popu-
lation of the country has had the
examination which may mean the
difference between life and death.

The society explained that the
study also showed that one third
of the proctoscopic examinations
are included as a routine part
of a regular health checkup, while
the remaining two-thirds of the
examinations are performed
because symptoms suggestive of
cancer have appeared.

"The important thing is to di-
agnose and treat this type of can-
cer before symptoms disclose it,"
the society reported.

Some 73,000 Americans will de-
velop cancer of the colon and rec-
tum in 1963. Unless the education
program is stepped up, about 19,
000 men and 20,000 women will
die of the disease, many because
it was not diagnosed and treated
in time.
