LAKEVIEW—The first annual Lakeview Junior Rodeo will be held June 29-30 at the Lake County Fairgrounds. The two-day event will be sponsored by the newly formed Lakeview Junior Rodeo Association, assisted by the Lakeview Lions Club and the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Cliff Partin, first president of the Junior Association, and Ernie McKinney, secretary, have formed committees to take care of the details for the show. Fifteen events have been scheduled to provide competition for two age groups, 8 to 13 and 13 to 18.

Partin's committee is composed of Pete Johnson, Ted O'Connor, Darrell Leavitt, Ed Zarosinski, Jim Howard, Marcus Martin and Neil Friday.

The Lions Club and Junior Chamber members will handle ticket sales and concessions, but the Junior Rodeo Association will be responsible for the other aspects of the show. A dance will conclude the weekend activities.

Local interest in the rodeo has been spontaneous and a number of stockmen in the immediate area have committed themselves to donate stock in order to make the first event a success.

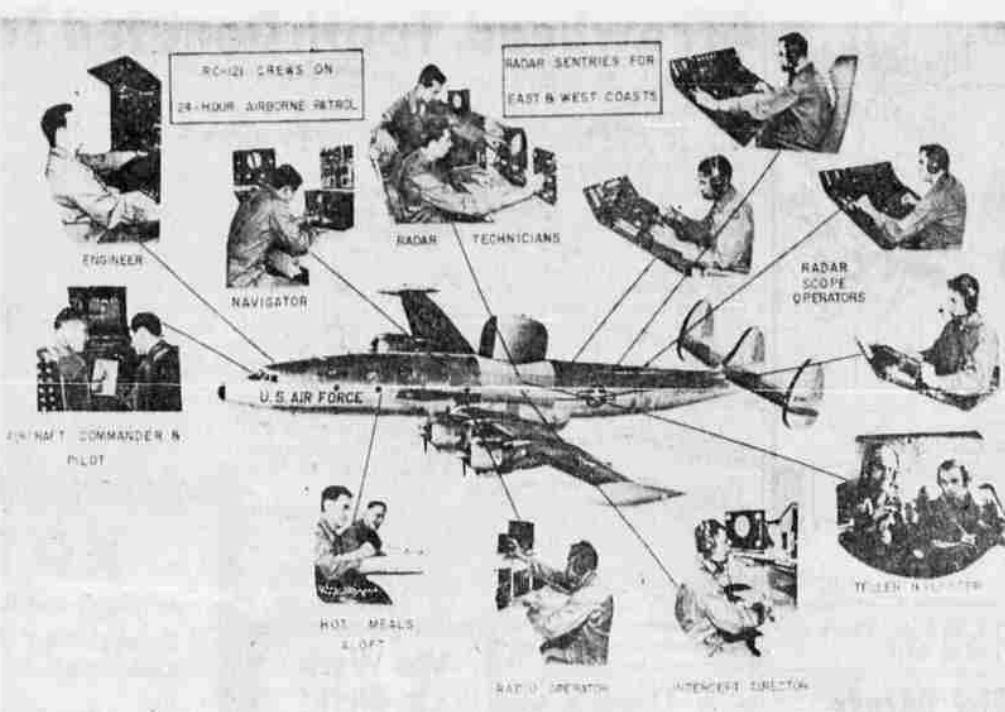

RADAR SHIP REQUESTED FOR DISPLAY—One of the nation's most valuable aircraft, an RC-121 Radar Early Warning Picket, has been requested for display at Kingsley Field during Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 18. The RC-121 "Super Connie," operated by Air Defense Command's 522nd Aircraft Early Warning Squadron, carries 125,000 pounds skyward in its detection mission. The plane has a wingspan of 125 feet and a range of more than 5,000 miles. This and other aircraft are scheduled for display on the base flight line during Kingsley Field's open house during the special observance. Also scheduled are comments from Col. Edwin J. Witzinger, commanding officer of the air field, flyovers of F-101 and F-89 fighter planes, and equipment demonstrations. The annual Armed Forces Day ceremonies will begin in Klamath Falls with a military parade beginning at 10 a.m. through the downtown area.

Aircraft Firm Competition Suggested

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. John L. McClellan said Friday a runoff competition to see which of two competing aircraft firms can produce the best TFX fighter might be in "the public interest."

The Arkansas Democrat, chairman of the Senate investigations subcommittee, made the statement as it was disclosed that another Senate subcommittee was looking into a similar situation in which Pentagon civilian leaders awarded a plane contract over objections of military officials.

Chairman John C. Stennis, D-Miss., of the Senate preparedness subcommittee, said a staff study had begun into programs involving new high-speed planes capable of taking off vertically or from short runways.

McClellan, who has been heading a lengthy investigation of the TFX controversy, also challenged Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's contention that building one TFX for both the Air Force and Navy would save \$1 billion.

McClellan declared it sounded to him like "propaganda being thrown all over the country to try to sustain this rough judgment."

Stennis said his new inquiry would involve research and development contracts for VTOL (vertical takeoff or landing) and STOL (short takeoff or landing) planes which went contrary to Navy recommendations.

He said one facet on the preparedness subcommittee staff inquiry involved a contract awarded by the Pentagon to Bell Aerospace Corp. He said the Navy had recommended that the award go to Douglas Aircraft Co.

The Navy decided that Douglas' research and development programs for the planes were superior to Bell from the standpoint of both cost and technical features, Stennis said. The so-called VTOL and STOL planes differ from helicopters that they are designed to rise sharply from the ground and then, usually by changing the engine thrust from vertical to horizontal, become high-speed planes.

Transcripts of closed door testimony taken Thursday by the

McClellan group were made public today. Witnesses were Boeing President William M. Allen and other officials of the company, the losing bidder in the fierce competition to land one of the biggest U.S. military procurement contracts in history.

Allen suggested that both Boeing and General Dynamics engage in a winner-take-all runoff, with both companies building prototype planes for comparison purposes. He offered to build two prototypes for \$105 million.

The subcommittee contends that evidence so far indicates that Boeing, unanimously preferred by four separate military boards, offered a superior plane for less money.

ALTURAS—Through the auspices of the county superintendent of schools, Clara Eddie, students and teachers in Modoc County were explained the newest techniques in the teaching of science.

Dr. Robert Maybury and Darrell McOmber, science consultants affiliated with the National Defense Education Act, spent April 29-30 in the Modoc County Schools demonstrating scientific teachings.

The science specialists met with the Modoc County teachers Monday evening and demonstrated their methods to the students at the Modoc Union High School, Cedarville High School, and the Alturas Elementary School Tuesday.

McOmber's demonstrations were based on bringing the explanation of an experiment from the student rather than from the teacher. He would demonstrate a basic experiment and then offering no explanation as to cause, search the young people's minds for the answer. Any student was allowed to ask all the questions he wanted when he had the floor, as long as the questions could be answered by yes or no.

After several trials, the young people began to evaluate each person's question and answer to

Tough Turn Predicted In Russian Policies

WASHINGTON (UPI)—U.S. authorities said Friday Russia's internal and foreign policies may well turn tougher after the forthcoming Moscow session of the Communist party Central Committee.

The meeting, beginning May 28, is to deal with ideological problems. It is expected to ratify Premier Nikita Khrushchev's recent crackdown on the revolt of the intellectuals in the Soviet Union.

There also are signs, Russian affairs experts said, that a general tightening of internal controls will be ordered, although there is no prospect of a return to anything even approaching the terror of Stalin's time.

On the international front, Russia's diplomatic offensive on Berlin and other issues may become more aggressive, these experts said, depending on two factors:—The outcome of the current policy reappraisal which obviously is going on in the Kremlin.

—Developments in the Sino-Soviet feud, which may be tackled at a May 15 Moscow meeting that Russia has suggested. There has been no public disclosure of whether Red China has accepted the invitation to meet at that time to talk over differences. The impression here is that she has or will.
