Easy Way Won't Pay

My old friend, Gordon Keel, sends this hand. As is customary with Gordon, he bids a trifle too much, but the final contract is reasonable and depends upon choosing the right play.

The simple play for six clubs is for declarer to win the spade lead in dummy, lead a spade to the ace and ruff a spade. Then he comes back to his hand with the queen of hearts, draws trumps and eventually concedes a spade or diamond trick.

That line won't work this time because East can overruff the third spade lead, but Gordon found a line that did work.

He won the first spade in his hand and played four rounds of trumps. His discards from dummy were two diamonds and the six of hearts — not three diamonds.

Then he led his seven of diamonds and played the nine from dummy. East won with the ace and led a heart. Gordon led a diamond and ruffed after East played low. West showed out so Gordon had the king of diamonds located. He returned to dummy with the king of spades, ruffed out East's king of diamonds, got back to dummy with the last high heart and made the last two tricks with dummy's remaining diamonds.

Gordon points out that this play would not have worked if West had held four diamonds or if clubs had broken five-one, but that it was a better percentage play than trying for a 4-3 spade break.

Altamont Town Sparks Question From Dunsmuir

An interesting query from a resident of Oregon outside Klamath County, came to light recently in a letter to Frank Jenkins, consulting editor of the Herald and News.

The letter, written by James D. Lambert of Dunsmuir, operator of a Texaco service station, sought information on the town of Altamont registered on a Texaco road map as having a population of 10,811, 1960 census, a few miles out of Klamath Falls on Highway 66.

His curiosity was aroused when a tourist queried him about Altamont.

Lambert called the Southern Pacific Railroad office in Dunsmuir and made some other queries with no luck.

Jenkins, in answering the letter, told Lambert of the origin of the name Altamont, derived from the Spanish, which means "high mountain." It was applied to the community by Jay Beach, a prominent horseman for the famous racehorse Altamont.

Information came from the volume "Oregon Geographic Names," compiled by Lewis A. McArthur, then director, Oregon Historical Society, and published in 1928.

Altamont, not an incorporated town, is located in the suburbs south of Klamath Falls.

Kingsley Field Enrolls Savers

Kingsley Air Field has now enrolled 64 per cent of its personnel in the Air Defense Command payroll savings plan drive to conclude June 30. Lt. Col. Thomas J. Green, personnel director of the air field, disclosed Friday.

Teaching Method Study Completed In Lakeview

LAKEVIEW — The Lakeview School District No. 7, under the direction of Rex Hunsaker, principal of the senior high school, and John Orr, superintendent of city schools, has completed its study on modern methods in secondary education which included team teaching, programmed instruction, and extended day.

The study came to an end on May 1 with reports and recommendations from each subject matter field on how the results of the study could be used. The faculty members making reports were Frank Chasni, English; Martin League, social studies; Don Shanklin, science; Ray Paxman, mathematics; Bobbie Steninger, physical education; Robert Shotwell, music; Margaret Weir, business; and Bob Elden, agriculture.

The study, which was sponsored by the State Department of Education through funds established by the Ford Foundation, started in January with faculty visitations to several junior and senior high schools in Oregon and California which were judged outstanding in one of the methods being studied.

The schools visited were La Sierra High School in Sacramento, Calif., which rates an outstanding physical education program; Stayton and Lake Oswego High Schools for team teaching; Clackamas, Lake Oswego, and Milwaukie High Schools for programmed instruction; and Lake Oswego Junior High School for modern methods in business education.

The study was highlighted by the Modern Methods Day on April 22, when Dr. Cliff Robinson of the Klamath County schools delivered the keynote address and also acted as a consultant in the seminars that were held. School was dismissed for the day and all junior and senior high school faculty members participated in the seminar.

Recommendations from the study which are being passed on to Superintendent Orr and the members of the school board include the following:

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One Timber Bid Made

YREKA—Ted Jensen of Happy Camp was the only bidder for 450,000 board feet of Klamath National Forest timber in a sale at Yreka made by sealed bid. His bid rate for Douglas fir, the principal species, was \$13.65 per M board feet. Total bid value was \$6,142.50, compared to an appraised value of \$4,725.

This sale, known as Sandy Bar Salvage No. 1, consists of two blocks of timber near Ti Bar, which was windthrown during the October, 1962, storm. Salvage of this timber will be done by clear-cutting each of the blocks which total 10 acres in size.

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Arrowhead, Tooth Donated To Museum

An obsidian arrowhead and a tooth from an Equus, a horse of the Pleistocene Period, were two of eight exhibits donated to the Klamath County Museum during April, according to curator Mrs. Lloyd Seeley.
