The fossilized teeth were one of two objects identified for the museum by J. A. Shotwell, professor of the Museum of Natural History at the University of Oregon.

Study Dated At Alturas

ALTURAS — Summer school sessions for the elementary grades will be July 1 through Aug. 2, according to the Alturas Elementary School principal, Marshall McCuniff.

McCuniff said that to date 203 students have registered for the summer courses. He estimates that at least 250 students will take advantage of the special schooling for the third year.

"We began this year years ago and have seen improvement in students using the summer school program. It is most beneficial to the student having problems with basic subjects during the regular school year."

Classes will run from 8:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. each morning. Four courses are offered for grades one to three; nine courses for grades four to six; and 12 subjects for grades seven and eight. Swimming will be offered in all age groups and a new subject of typing will be offered this year to seventh and eighth graders.

Grades one to three will have reading, arithmetic, arts and crafts, and swimming. Grades four to six: reading, arithmetic, arts and crafts, swimming, geometry, history, geography, English, Spanish and music.

Grades 7 and 8: reading, arithmetic, arts and crafts, swimming, geometry, history, geography, English, typing, mechanical drawing, music and science.

Four Modoc Teenagers Capped As Volunteers

ALTURAS—Before parents and patrons, four teenagers from Modoc Union High School were officially capped as members of the Modoc Volunteers on April 30.

Dr. William Quinn capped the four girls who have worked a minimum of 20 hours at the Modoc Medical Center helping in the care of the old people and patients. The Volunteer program is sponsored by the Modoc County chapter of the American Red Cross and is supervised by Mrs. Joan Goodison.

The capping of the girls brings the total membership of the teenage group to 15. The Volunteers were started a year ago with seven charter members. The girls work through their high school years on a strictly volunteer basis, giving two to 10 hours a week after school, on Saturdays, and holidays to the care and comfort of the Modoc Medical Center patients.

"The girls take their work seriously and as one young Volunteer said, 'You should come to one of our parties for the old folks. They have more fun and so do we.'"

Mrs. Goodison said the Volunteers have mushroomed since its beginning a year ago and there are more and more girls interested each day. "These girls accept their responsibility proudly and give a tremendous amount of cheer to the patients." Their service dovetails with the work of the Grey Ladies.

Character development is the aim of the conference and the girls will participate in a panel discussion on accepted dress, behavior and ethics. All Northern California schools will be represented. The students are selected on scholastic ability, ability to speak in groups, and on citizenship. They must be member of GAA.
