WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — Martin Gilbert of Van Alstyne, Noel & Co. sees the increasing momentum of the market's advance as a sign of confidence, "considering that a lot more capital is required to buy equities at current price levels."

Gilbert feels it is reasonable to conclude that the upward trend will continue to dominate the technical pattern.

Abraham & Co. says there has been a recent tendency for the market to level off. It considers a temporary breather only logical since the Dow-Jones industrial average is at nearly 20 times last year's earnings and close to one all-time high.

Goodbody & Co. says the market has been "side-stepping" its way the past few days, digesting earlier gains. It feels the market now is on firmer ground and that with signals from Washington, Wall Street and industry all generally encouraging, the course seems clear for another worthwhile market advance.

WALL STREET

NEW YORK (UPI) — Wide-spread afternoon profit taking handed the stock market its second consecutive setback today.

Steel shares were fractionally mixed despite the first downturn in industry production last week since January. Autos ranged from steady in General Motors to over a point lower in Chrysler.

International oils were heavily pressured by profit takers. Jersey Standard and Royal Dutch sinking around a point and Texaco and Amerasia more than 2. Kodak and Carbide were downsize features in a soft chemical section.

Sheriff, Committee Meet On Conflict Compromise

YREKA—Sheriff Al B. Cottar and his three-man investigation committee met Friday to reach a compromise in the conflict between the sheriff's office and the Shasta County Board of Supervisors.

W. A. Barr, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, last week requested that a committee hash out the problems and make a comprehensive report at the next board meeting. Appointed were Supervisors W. C. Ealy and S. V. Jackson, County Administrator Jess O'Rourke, and Cottar.

The committee voted in favor of a 44-hour work week for the sheriff's deputies, with commensurate pay for any overtime worked. The deputies will also receive a \$10 a month pay raise to maintain their gear, the committee decided.

The controversy arose when Sheriff Cottar withdrew his resident deputies in outlying unincorporated areas because they were averaging a 50-hour work week at pay for a 40-hour week. He said the action was taken to put them on the work schedule for which they were being paid.

Opposition to the sheriff's move was voiced by the Board of Supervisors, who had previously vetoed overtime pay for the deputies as well as the hiring of additional law enforcement officers.

Barr had stated that he would call a special meeting to organize a county constabulary, using funds deleted from the sheriff's budget if the deputies were not back on their resident posts by May 14. He then suggested the formation of an investigation committee.

Several supervisors have already voiced disapproval of the compromise suggested by the committee, including Barr. The supervisors include Jackson, Ealy, Don Avery, and Earl Ager.

They will meet at 10 a.m. Tuesday in the county courthouse at Yreka to vote on the compromise.

A city patrolman arrested four persons in a disorderly conduct fracas outside a local tavern at 2:30 a.m. Sunday, but was only able to take one of the participants into custody.

Two men and a woman escaped from the paddy wagon while the patrolman chased Joseph Beach, 36, Baldwin Hotel, down an alley and was able to catch up to him only after yelling "halt" and firing a shot into the air. At the sound of the shot, Beach, who the patrolman said had been drinking, fell to the pavement screaming, "I've been shot." The man's imagination was pierced, but his body wasn't.

The chase resulted after Beach interfered with the patrolman's duty in the arrest of Evelyn V. Miller, 42, 332 Commercial Avenue.

The woman was arrested on a charge of drunk while the patrolman was making a routine check of local bars. As the policeman was putting the woman in the paddy wagon Beach grabbed his arm.

Several other men, who were gathering on the street, started shouting loudly and taunted the patrolman who put Beach in the wagon and then proceeded to put two of the most abusive bystanders in the wagon too.

When the patrolman had everyone in the wagon two of the men started to fight him in an attempt to break free. In the struggle Beach got away and started to run down an alley. The patrolman, who felt that Beach had been the most unruly of the lot, started after Beach.

Beach was apprehended, arrested for disorderly conduct and his bail was set at \$100. Police are still looking for the three escapees.

Firemen Handle 5 Calls; Flames Destroy Garage

Fires swept through the dining room of a dwelling at 5754 Denver Avenue, 10:07 a.m., Sunday, causing extensive damage to the room, in addition to heat and smoke damage throughout the rest of the house, the Suburban Fire Department has reported.

Various personal property belonging to Mrs. Ross was destroyed in the fire but due to an act of fate her automobile was not in the garage. Mrs. Ross told firemen that she was ill when she drove her automobile home Sunday night and parked it next to the curb, rather than in the garage.
