Adlai Talks Increasing Pay To UN

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson indicated Saturday that the United States may relent in its announced determination not to pay one penny more than its assessed 22.02 per cent share of U. N. peace-keeping costs.

He emphasized, however, that the final position would be governed by what money is paid in by U. N. members who are delinquent in their payments.

Under congressional pressure and public criticism that Washington put up close to 50 per cent of the costs of the U. N. Congo operation, the United States announced in March that it would pay only its assessed share in the future until members whose failure to pay ran the world organization's debt to \$100 million made contributions of their own.

Stevenson indicated in an interview that while the United States still holds this position, it is willing to consider a British proposal entailing voluntary contributions that would carry Washington's share above 22.02 per cent.

"The United States will certainly oppose any assessment which would involve its being mandatorily obligated to pay, for the last six months of 1963, more than its regular budget percentage of 22.02 per cent," Stevenson said.

"Other suggestions have been made, such as the 'three-bite' United Kingdom proposal that an initial sum, perhaps \$10 million per operation, be assessed on the regular budget scale; that the balance be fully assessed but with lower rates on the less developed countries; and that the short-fall be balanced by voluntary contributions by the more developed countries."

"However, the United States would be unlikely to consider favorably any arrangement such as the British proposal in the absence of a showing of more financial support for the United Nations by its members and unless a substantial number of other countries also made substantial voluntary contributions."

"The attitude of the U. S. Congress has become more and more clear lately that they don't feel the United States should pay more for peace-keeping operations than it pays to the regular operating budget of the United Nations."

"There is a possibility that the three-part approach I have mentioned will prevail."

The general assembly will convene a special session May 14 to take up financing of peace-keeping operations. Secretary General Thant's authorization to meet the \$12.5 million-a-month expenses of the Congo operation and maintenance of the U. N. Emergency Force (UNEF)—on duty since 1956 between Israel and Egypt—expires June 30.

Youth's Drink Stand Okayed

PORTLAND (UPI)—A 15-year-old boy has won the right to run a soft-drink stand at a local golf course.

Centennial Of First Degree Noted At Pacific University

FOREST GROVE (UPI)—Pacific University this spring observes the centennial of the first bachelor degree awarded in Oregon—and the memory of the man who received it.

The small struggling school in the Tualatin Valley granted Harvey Scott, then 25, the degree. One small entry in the minutes of the Board of Trustees is the only official record of the degree.

It states: "Moved and carried unanimously after remarks by President Marsh, Professor Syman and others that the degree of A.B. be conferred on Harvey Scott, he having mainly completed the regular course of study."

There was no ceremony and no fanfare "for the affairs were somewhat unsettled," recalled an historian.

But the degree was the beginning of a distinguished career for young Harvey Scott.

He became a candidate for the degree in 1893. He began the study of law and was admitted to the Oregon Bar in 1895. In that year he submitted an editorial comment to the fledgling Portland Oregonian on the assassination of President Lincoln.

A few months later he joined the staff of the newspaper. Later he became editor. He stayed with the Oregonian until 1910 with two years absence when he was with the Portland Daily Bulletin.

He began the job as editor when he was 27 and in time won fame as a man of action as well as thought. He was first president

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Decline Of Trout In Upper Klamath, Agency Lakes Studied By Biologists

The growing problem of lack of rainbow and karmloops trout in Klamath and Agency lakes is getting wide recognition this year as the fishing is at a new low peak.

"The number of fish over 20 inches being taken in the lakes has continued to drop over the years and this definitely indicates a problem," Art Gerlach, district fish biologist, said.

There are several factors that have contributed to the decline of good fishing in the lakes and among them are the loss of natural spawning areas, the increased demand for irrigation waters in the summer and illegal snagging of fish on the spawning beds.

The major spawning tributary in the past, the Sprague River, is blocked by a dam at Chilquien and the fish can no longer reach the feeder streams along the upper Sprague.

With the fish concentrated on the limited spawning areas illegal snagging becomes a bigger menace to the fish population.

These may not be the only problems by a long shot and Gerlach is continuing a study of the lakes and is looking into solutions that could restore good fishing.

Many local residents contend that the presence of chubs in the lake is the main problem. The chub population has increased, they contend, to such a great extent that the competition for food is driving the trout fishery out. Get rid of the chubs and the trout problem will be licked, they answer.

Gerlach pointed out that Diamond Lake had three pounds of aquatic organisms per acre before it was poisoned. There was an obvious problem of competition for food at Diamond.

If the trout in Klamath and Agency are in trouble it's not because of lack of food.

What can be done to restore the excellent trout fishery to the lakes? Gerlach is working on some of the answers.

The biologist feels that an increased stocking program may help or even solve the problem. A concentrated stocking program over a four or five year period was started last year.

Gerlach stocked 2½ million fish in the lake last year and plans to continue stocking 1½ million fish from 1 to 5 inches long from now on. The bigger fish have a better chance of survival and will grow rapidly in the fertile lakes.

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Finally, it is up to everyone to be concerned about game violations. The poacher can make serious inroads on the fish population especially during the spawning season.

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Scooter Crash Injures Author

TEMECULA, Calif. (UPI)—Author Erle Stanley Gardner, 73, was recuperating at his ranch Saturday from injuries suffered when his three-wheeled desert vehicle overturned in Baja California, Mexico.

The famed mystery writer suffered several cracked ribs in the mishap in the Gonzaga Bay area, California. He was accompanying an archeological expedition.

Members of the expedition gave Gardner emergency treatment, he told newsmen. He said he was incapacitated for nine days before he was flown home earlier this week. He lives near this Riverside County community.

Gardner said he planned to return to Gonzaga Bay "as soon as I can."

Beside the fact that the cost of getting rid of the chubs would be prohibitive, the actual deed would

be too difficult. It would be impossible to kill off all the chubs, and because Klamath and Agency lakes are so fertile the fish would make rapid gains back to their present population.

Despite all this, the argument itself seems to belie some of the facts uncovered by Gerlach in his investigation of the lake.

Last fall a survey was made to determine the extent of the food supply in both lakes. It was determined that Klamath Lake had 263.7 pounds of aquatic organisms per acre and that Agency Lake had 375 pounds. This is considered a very adequate food supply, enough for all fish in the lake.

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
